Yoncalla Committee Talks Landscaping Of New School

A meeting was held recently by the landscaping committee of the Yoncalla Grade School. The new school is badly in need of improvements in sidewalks and landscaping.

To Make Survey

Mrs. Freda Burns reported that the Cottage Grove Nursery would make a soil survey at their earliest convenience and make an estimate on cost and kinds of shrubs needed. Word has been received from the Oregon State College, that it would cost \$2.50 per sample for soil tests.

Mrs. Faye Weber suggested the group plant a few Oregon State flowers, the Oregon grape, and a native of this community, Pachysandra, was suggested for the ground plant.

Plans were made to tile the full length of the field at the new school house and have a grate on each end. \$3,000 was put in the school budget for some of the things needed and required by law such as tile, gravel, ramp or steps and black top to make the ground more sanitary and safer for children attending the school. It is also planned to have a better lighting system around the old school building. Word was received from the state department stating that it preferred a ramp in place of steps, when there was not more than one foot rise in ten.

Master plans will be completed before the next meeting which is early in July.

Jocko, a large Rhesus monkey, was worth 50 bucks last Saturday as he sat in a cage at Cleveland's Bellevue Floral and Pet Shop.

Then, sometime Sunday, Jocko escaped the cage and proceeded to take the inside of Cleveland's shop apart, piece by piece.

When Cleveland arrived for duty bright and early Monday the joint was a shambles. And Jocko was all tired out.

He had smashed expensive aquariums. Countless sacks of dog food were ripped open. The curious monkey emptied bottle and drawers. He tore flowers from plants.

Apparently warning to the task he threw money from the cash register and ate some. He hurled a puppy from its cage.

And he fed birdseed to the goldfish.

Cleveland figures the tab for the damage will run between \$600 and \$700. The shopkeeper said:

Former Chief Tax Collector Is Convicted

NEW YORK (AP) — Joseph D. Nunan Jr., once the nation's chief tax collector, was convicted Tuesday by a federal court jury of evading \$91,088 in his income taxes.

Nunan heard the verdict delivered by the seven women, five-man jury in a Brooklyn courthouse.

The jury found him guilty on a five-count indictment covering the years 1946-1950.

He faces a possible sentence of five years and a \$10,000 fine on each count.

An appointee of the late President Franklin D. Roosevelt, Nunan was commissioner of internal revenue from 1944 to 1947.

Still hanging over him is a perjury indictment stemming from statements he made to the grand jury in the same income tax evasion matter.
