The Giants turned in the best record ever compiled for the month of June in the modern history of the majors. They won 24 out of 28 games and moved from third place, a game and a half out of the lead, into a three-game advantage over second-place Brooklyn.

Cornell Won't Claim Regatta Win

ITHACA, N. Y. (AP) — Cornell University apparently isn't going to claim victory for its crew in the recent Intercollegiate Rowing Assn. regatta at Syracuse because victorious Navy's coxswain has been found ineligible.

Robert J. Kane, Cornell athletic director, said Tuesday night "I'm very distressed personally about the Navy dilemma, I'm sure it was an honest mistake."

In the varsity race on Lake On-

ondaga June 19, Cornell finished second to the unbeaten midshipmen after Big Red crews had won the freshmen and junior varsity events.

At Annapolis, Md., the Naval Academy announced Tuesday that varsity coxswain William A. Kennington, 23, was not eligible for varsity competition under rules of the Eastern College Athletic Conference.

In a statement, Vice Adm. C. Turner Joy, academy superintendent, said that Kennington entered Vanderbilt University in 1947 and was graduated in 1951.

Although Kennington did not participate in intercollegiate athletics at Vanderbilt, he was ineligible under . . . rules for varsity participation at the naval academy," Joy said.
