

Bonding, Operational Costs Are Compiled

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levied within the "6 per cent limitation."

With other issues outstanding, the total payment of bonds and interest next year will be \$236,220. If the subcommittee's recommendations are carried through, the bond payment and interest in 1950 will be \$340,916. In that year, because other bonds passed in recent years have been retired or paid off, a decrease in the amount for payment and interest will be noted. In 1959, the figure will have been \$343,419.

It can be seen partly why school costs will continue to rise. At the other end of the school costs, the budget, the figures are more startling. Basic needs of the district next year, including bond retirement and interest, will be \$2,102,720.36. Those are the operational expenses, plus capital outlay, bonds and auxiliary services (transportation, lunches, etc.) added together.

Operational expenses, simply described, are those necessary to keep the schools going. On the proposed 1954-55 budget, they come to \$1,615,209.04. A remainder of \$487,511.37 pays for the auxiliary agencies, capital outlay and the bonds.

The subcommittee has found that an adequate school program must include enough money for an outlay of \$375 per school child. The new operational budget would be enough for 4,300 children in the district. There actually will be 5,000 in the schools, at a cost of \$323 per child. School men describe this figure as "acceptable," but not "adequate."

The budget first submitted fell just below the \$375 sum, and the subcommittee's estimate before the budget was submitted to the voters for May 12 tallied very closely with the actual budget when it came out.

Taking the \$375 figure into the future, here is what estimates say for coming operations budgets (subcommittee enrollment estimates were used.)

In 1955-56, the operational budget will be an estimated \$1,995,000; the total budget \$2,290,000. A tax levy of 61.9 mills will be needed to run the district.

By 1960, the operational budget is expected to be \$2,550,000; the total budget \$2,890,916. The tax levy will be about 72 mills.

The levy, it may be pointed out, will have reached a peak two years earlier, at 73 mills. Assessed property valuation will have increased faster than the school budgets, so less money will be needed from each taxpayer in the last two years of the period.

In its figures, the subcommittee sees a leveling off in 1960, so the high-water mark will have been passed. It may be a rough decade. There may be a need to search for a way out.

Sellout Of Indochina By French Is Hinted

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al already have taken up defense positions farther north around Hanoi, an army spokesman said. Vietnamese efforts to disrupt the movement were beaten off with only a few French soldiers killed, he said, and there was "almost no loss of ammunition, vehicles or guns."

In Singapore, Associated Press Correspondent Larry Allen, who recently left Indochina after two years, reported that the windup of the operation would "take more than half of the strategic Red River delta in control of the Communist-led Vietnamese and put an additional four million Vietnamese under the Red flag."

The major centers abandoned to the rebels were Nam Dinh, Ninh Binh, Phat Diem, Lac Quan and Thai Binh. They spread in an arc 50 to 75 miles south and southeast of the French headquarters city of Hanoi.

Daily newspapers of the world had a circulation of 217 million in 1952 says a recent United Nations report which excludes most Iron Curtain areas.

Douglas County Is Chosen Home Safety Test Ground

Like the weather, people talk plenty about home accidents but no one appears ready to do anything about them.

That's why the state board of health has decided to use Douglas County as a testing ground for a strong campaign to make the home safer.

This was the gist of a report from Janice Westaby, health education consultant and head of the child home safety program for the state board of health.

She said the board of health is currently laying the groundwork in an attempt to place the responsibility of fighting home accidents in the laps of the Douglas County Health Dept. If this is successful, she said health departments over the state would be asked to shoulder such responsibility.

She and three other members of the state board were in Roseburg Thursday for a full day meeting with county health personnel. Miss Westaby emphasized that the plan would call for continuous program of home safety such as that carried on by the State Industrial Accident Commission for industry and the Secretary of State's office for traffic.

She pointed out that home accidents are among the worst death dealers, especially for children. She related that home accidents are the leading causes of death among children from 1 to 5 years old. She said home accidents kill more children than pneumonia, heart disease, cancer, tuberculosis and infantile paralysis combined.

One of the reasons Douglas County was picked for a testing ground is because it is one of the counties in which home accidents have risen in a year. In 1952, a total of 6 accidental deaths were recorded. Last year, the number

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lowed on Wednesday. The junta which replaced Arbenz after his resignation was in turn replaced by Monzon's group.

In addition to Castillo and Monzon, the new junta will be composed of Maj. Enrique Oliva, defense minister in Castillo's insurgent regime, and two other members of Monzon's government—Foreign Minister Col. Mauricio Dubois and Defense Minister Col. Jose Luis Cruz Salazar.

Other terms of the agreement provided: 1. Castillo's rebel forces will be incorporated into the regular army ranks for a triumphal entry into Guatemala City.

2. The junta assumes all legislative and executive powers, as well as supreme command of the army and will rule by majority decision.

3. The junta will consider whether to abolish or suspend in part the nation's present constitution and Castillo will cancel at once all decrees issued by his provisional regime.

4. New national elections will be called as soon as a new constitution is promulgated.

The new junta reportedly will fly to the Guatemala capital at 11 a.m., Saturday to take over. The signing ceremony climaxed two days and nights of negotiations that began early Wednesday.

At its conclusion, Monzon and Castillo embraced under a large portrait of Gen. Gerardo Barrios, the George Washington of El Salvador.

The new junta faced difficulties at home. Communist supporters of deposed President Jacobo Arbenz Guzman were reported inciting peasants outside the capital to rise against the country's new rulers.

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stirring up peasant opposition to his conquerors.

In the weeks just before and after Col. Carlos Castillo Armas' "liberation" army of exiles invaded from neighboring Honduras, the police rounded up hundreds of anti-Communists and opponents of Arbenz's red-backed regime.

Of those picked up, the bodies of some 60 so far have been brought to the capital—torn, battered and broken by police torture.

Six of these, brought in yesterday from the little village of Villa Lobos, were typical. After several days of working over by the police, they were machine-gunned on June 24 and left in a shallow grave.

All were men. Their bodies were purple from beating slashed and cut by floggings. Eyes were gouged out and teeth were kicked in. The groins had been a favorite target.

Each man's hands were tied behind him. Why they were tortured was not known. Probably they had refused induction into the army of peasants Arbenz tried to recruit to fight the onrush by Castillo Armas' insurgents, the hastily armed farmers who now are threatening whatever regime the rebel chief and the current military government set up.

Possibly they were just overly active against the Communists, who were strong in the Villa Lobos area.

Anyway, they are dead, horribly so.

In Guatemala City, most victims of the police were opponents of Arbenz's Communist backers. Many of their bodies already have been recovered—tossed in front of their homes or left in the streets. More are being discovered daily.
