Surplus Disposal Bill To Provide Cutting Inventory

WASHINGTON — The one-billion-dollar farm surplus disposal bill which Congress sent to the White House Wednesday will not provide American farmers with a new market for that amount of additional products.
Rather, it will provide mainly a new means for the government itself to get rid of some of the 8 1/2 billion dollars worth of surplus commodities it has acquired in recent years in carrying out price support promises.

The bill will permit the Agriculture Department's Commodity Credit Corp. (CCC) to use one billion dollars of its funds to sell surplus to friendly countries in exchange for their own currencies.
Such sales would be carried out through commercial dealers and exporters. These private traders do not now accept foreign currencies for goods they sell abroad. They want dollars. But many foreign areas do not have the dollars, so they are unable to buy U. S. products.

Under the disposal bill, the government would offer surpluses from its stocks at cut-rate prices that would enable private exporters to compete in foreign markets. These exporters would take foreign money. The government would give them equivalent dollars for the foreign money.
The government would use the foreign currencies thus obtained for a number of purposes, including the purchase of strategic materials for national stockpiling, the construction of military establishments abroad, to pay for services and goods obtained by the government in countries where the farm products are sold, and to provide economic aid to such countries.

Bears Become Latest Worry To Foresters

SALEM — State forestry officials here bared a new source of worry Thursday — bears.
Reports have reached the department that bears are doing considerable damage to small second growth timber in some Western Oregon areas.
The damage appears so serious that Forestry Department officials have made an extensive airplane survey to determine the extent of depredations.
The bears seemingly have acquired a taste for the tender inner bark of the young firs with the result that many of them have been completely stripped. Deep claw and teeth marks are left on the mutilated stems of saplings. In some areas, damage runs to 90 per cent of the stand of trees.
Currently, damage appears south of Tillamook and in two somewhat larger areas of Clatsop and Columbia counties.
In the Fortuna district of California, the Hammond Lumber Co. has reported that damage by black bears is putting them out of the tree farming business.

Georgia Pacific Buys Big Mill

PORTLAND — The Georgia-Pacific Plywood Co. announced completion of a big timber deal which President Owen R. Cheatham priced at 12 million dollars.
Georgia-Pacific acquired a large timber stand in Western Oregon — and to get it, bought all the stock of three firms.
These were the Inman-Poulsen Lumber Co., Western Logging Co. and Saginaw Timber Co. Dant & Russell, Inc., was a large owner in Inman-Poulsen and in the big timber stand, known as the Grand Rapids tract.
Georgia-Pacific indicated the timber would be milled at the C.D. Johnson Lumber Corp. at Toledo, which is near the tract. The Johnson mill, one of the nation's largest, was purchased by Georgia-Pacific in 1951. Georgia-Pacific said the purchase price of that mill was \$16,500,000.
The Inman-Poulsen mill in Portland, which has employed 300 men, probably will be closed, Georgia-Pacific indicated.
One of the largest of plywood producers, Georgia-Pacific operates 14 plants in this country.

Little Chance Seen For Tax Reduction

WASHINGTON — Any chance for a general income tax cut in the big tax revision bill appeared dead today after rival Democratic and Republican proposals both were beaten in a crossfire of political maneuvering.
The twin defeats assured the Eisenhower administration of one of its biggest victories of the 1954 congressional session — enactment of the tax bill just about as it was recommended to the Capitol.
Senate passage may come late today after numerous minor amendments have been considered. The measure then will go to conference with the House, which has already okayed the bill in somewhat different form.

Portland Business Picking Up, Despite Slow Start

PORTLAND — Business in Oregon's largest city for the first half of 1954 had an encouraging tone despite a slow start. The lumber strike, though, put a question mark on the future.
June bank clearings indicated Portland business in that month up 8 per cent over the month before and building permits went up 30 per cent in valuation over May. The city's permits totaled \$4,634,433 in the month. The clearings were \$700,811.
The year started slowly and jobless pay claims in the state have been running 40 per cent greater than last year. In May there were 14,700 jobless — but there also were 454,000 at work. Portland business has reflected this condition.
This is the way some of the city's businesses report the start of the year:
Department stores, 7 per cent under last year, due chiefly to very slow January and February and a rainy June.
Construction, only small projects in the first half of the year, with only three over \$200,000. However, a number of larger projects are in sight for the second half and home building — with the lumber strike a factor — has shown signs of picking up, with mortgage money easier. In the six months, home building has been about 25 per cent down from the \$28,610,495 a year ago.
There are some more apartment house vacancies and some store vacancies, but rental agencies say they are about at the pre war level.
Shipping was down 10 per cent in cargo tonnage in the first half of the year and again the lumber strike holds the key to the rest of the year. In the six months, 739 ships entered port.
New car sales are thought to be off a little more than they are nationally. In the country as a whole the sales are down 12 to 15 per cent. Dealers say long trades have cut heavily into profits, too.

Foreign Aid Cut Proposal Defeat Is Now Predicted

WASHINGTON — Sen. H. Alexander Smith (R-NJ) predicted Thursday an effort will be made — and defeated — in the Senate to slash "one to two billion dollars" from President Eisenhower's 3 1/2-billion-dollar foreign aid program.
The House Wednesday passed by a 260-125 vote a \$3,368,608,000 authorization for the new fiscal year.
Rep. Vorys (R-Ohio), House floor manager for the bill, said in a separate interview the House in effect has told America's allies there is "no excuse to quit the fight against Communism."
At the same time, he added, it has told potential enemies the United States intends going ahead with its program of creating armed bulwarks against Communism, "despite current uncertainties and doubts."
Vorys said he thought these were main reasons why the House cut only 100 million dollars — 3 per cent — from President Eisenhower's foreign aid requests.
"It was a bit of psychological warfare," Vorys added. "It was also a vote of confidence for the President and Secretary of State Dulles."
The bill merely sets a ceiling on new funds for the year. Vorys said he expects deeper cuts to be made when the actual appropriations are voted later.
Smith has been presiding at closed-door sessions of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee on a companion to the House authorization bill, in the absence of Chairman Wiley (R-Wis.). Both Wiley and Smith said the Senate group should have a foreign aid measure ready for Senate action late next week.

Wounded Man Urges Stemming Communism

TRAVIS AIR FORCE BASE, Calif. — Other Western powers should join more actively to help France hold back communism in Southeast Asia, says one of the wounded men being flown from Indochina to Paris via the United States.
Sgt. Auguste Lamboley, 29, said at a rest stop here Wednesday that he saw Chinese soldiers after the fall of Dien Bien Phu where he was a prisoner for 18 days before he was evacuated.
"The Chinese have Russian equipment," he added.
The first plane of Operation Wounded Warrior arrived from Honolulu Wednesday with 47 men. It left early Thursday morning for Westover Air Force Base, near Boston en route to France.

Oregon To Join Nation's Greatest Traffic Jam

SALEM — Oregon is expected to share in the greatest Fourth of July traffic jam in the nation's history this weekend, but state traffic safety officials hope the state won't join in its traffic fatality list.
State officials made no predictions on the holiday toll for Oregon, but reminded that on the last three-day holiday weekend over Memorial Day, eight were killed in highway mishaps.
Rain may add new hazards on the jammed highways, officials said, reminding drivers that slippery roadways call for reduced speeds.
H. G. Maison, superintendent of state police, announced Thursday that all available patrol units, including motorcycles, will be pressed into service for the weekend. Strict enforcement measures will be in order, Maison warned.

West Coast Shipyards Wage Agreement Made

PORTLAND — A strike in West Coast shipyards was averted with agreement reached late Wednesday night on a 6 cent hourly wage increase.
Some 14,000 AFL workers are affected. The old contract expired at midnight and Thomas A. Rotell, San Francisco, secretary of the AFL Pacific Coast Metal Trades Council, said it was after that that the finishing touches were put to the agreement.

Bickering May Kill Atomic Energy Program

WASHINGTON — Rep. Hollifield (D-Calif.) said Thursday President Eisenhower's atomic program may be killed in this Congress in a fight over the authority of the Atomic Energy Commission to make contracts for private power.
The fight has become an offshoot of a broad new atomic bill which the Senate-House Atomic Energy Committee approved unanimously Wednesday. The measure will be ready for congressional action in about two weeks.
Hollifield told newsmen that Democratic pressure against the AEC's contract authority, particularly in the Senate, may be enough to kill the entire bill.
The measure is designed to carry out the President's program for exchanging some nuclear secrets with foreign allies and for permitting private industry into the atomic field.
It also would continue the AEC's authority to conclude broad 25-year contracts for private power.
