Japanese Air Force Trained By Americans

CAMP MATUSHIMA, Japan — Former Japanese air aces—in uniform again — stood shoulder to shoulder today with American flyers who will teach them to fly jets.

About 100 Japanese airmen stood at attention with U. S. Air Force men at ceremonies opening a new Japanese air force flight school here.

Daylight poured through hundreds of bullet holes in the big old imperial navy hangar, riddled by strafing U. S. Navy planes a decade ago. Japan's new 6,000-man air force, which came into existence only last Thursday, is equipped with 40 light trainers and helicopters. But the Japanese expect the United States to supply Sabre jets and other modern planes later this year.

No Fires Occur Over Holidays; Lookouts Manned

Forests in Douglas County were left untouched by fire after heavy usage over the holiday weekend. Douglas Forest Protective Assn. suppression crews stopped a three-acre grass fire near Dixonville on Saturday, however. It was the only blaze reported by either DFPA or the Forest Service.

Forest lookouts began manning 22 stations on the Umpqua National Forest last week, according to Ray Hampton, fire control officer. A few were manned last week to provide coverage over the weekend, and more are being put into operation this week. Hampton said that it takes two or three days to man some stations because of pack trips. About 90 people are in the fire protection force in the forest this year.

A high wind over the weekend knocked a tree down across a power line to the Morrison-Knudson camp near Tokette, and electrical service was cut off for a time. The tree also blocked traffic on the North Umpqua Road.

The Dixonville fire started, according to Correspondent Jean Radcliffe, when Clifford Howland started a fire in trash on his ranch. The fire jumped a small ditch and raced up a hillside. Neighbors rushed in to help DFPA crewmen squelch the blaze, which covered three acres.

Canyonville Man Accident Victim

Lou Lady, 68, Canyonville, died Monday at Canyonville from injuries received in an accident earlier in the day near Tiller. Born at Days Creek on March 13, 1886, Lady grew up in that area. He lived at Dillard from 1915 to 1947, moving to Canyonville in 1947. He was employed by the South-east Pacific Co. for 15 years and the Forest Service for 15 years in the Rogue River and Siskiyou national forests. He worked at the Keystone mill, Canyonville, until his retirement.

Movie Stunt Man Shot For Remarks On Texas — LOS ANGELES — Philip E. Ahlm, 49, movie stunt man shot a week ago during a Hollywood party after making derogatory remarks about Texas, died last night in general hospital. The shooting took place during a party at the home of oil heiress Barbara Clampitt. Charged with intent to commit murder was Ed Neely, 61, of Texas. He is the husband of the former Leah Clampitt, sister of the hostess. After his arrest, he told officers the shooting occurred after Ahlm "kidded" him about his Texas accent and made derogatory remarks about that state and Sen. McCarthy (R-Wis). Neely is free on \$10,000 bail.

(Continued from Page One) over the cab of the pickup, was pitched off when the driver had to stop quickly to avoid a car which stopped in front of him. The accident was on the Cape Arago highway near Coos Bay, state police said.

Christie was one of several people from the Roseburg and Glide areas who had been to the coast to fish. Christie, who lived in a cabin near Glide, stayed off and on with Mr. and Mrs. Ed Nichols, who were also in the party. The body was to be taken to Seattle for burial.

Lou Lady, 68, Canyonville, died at Forest Glen Hospital Monday afternoon, about four hours after he slipped off a rocky bank on the South Umpqua River about 6 1/2 miles east of Tiller. It was the only fishing fatality in Oregon over the weekend.

Coroner Powers said death came from a fractured skull. It was reported Lady was looking for a good fishing spot when his footing gave way, tossing him 30 feet down on some jagged rocks.

Ganz ambulance, Myrtle Creek, rushed Lady to the hospital after Mrs. Lady found her husband. It was about a half hour before she heard his screams, she told officers.

Southeast of Roseburg, 16-year-old Jimmy Fenwick died when he hanged himself with a rope about noon Sunday. Coroner Powers said he apparently slipped on some hay, causing the accident. A sheriff's deputy who investigated said the youth was found in a barn on the Carl Becker ranch about four miles east of Kelly's corner, south of Roseburg.

He was spending his summer vacation with his grandmother, Mrs. Carl Becker. The youth had attended school at Vernonia, but his father, B. G. Fenwick lives at Roseburg. It was reported. Mrs. Geraldine J. Van Duyn, 30, who apparently fell from the fourth floor of the Hotel Rose onto the roof of the hotel kitchen two floors below, last Wednesday night, died Saturday afternoon of her injuries.

Exact cause of the death was not known Monday morning, according to Coroner L. L. Powers. (See obitaries, page 2)

Libbey pointed out, however, that the purchase program for chrom at Grants Pass expires on June 30, 1957, or when 200,000 long tons have been purchased, whichever comes first. He says this means that in most cases capital expenditures will not be returned in time to make possible erection of a "substantial plant."

Two other mining industries were started this year. Work was under way near Camas Valley to start operation of a brick plant, and it was just announced that mining had started on a lime deposit on the Clark's Branch Road southeast of Roseburg Friday. The deposit was estimated to contain a million tons. The lime will be used for agriculture and possibly later for paper mills.
