Close-up photography has much application in the fields of medicine, crime detection, and science, but if you are just a plugging camera fan and interested only in the simple, but dramatic impact of this technique, let's see what makes it tick.

Don't shy away from close-up work in the belief that it requires a trailer-load of special equipment. Actually there are only three basic methods of handling extreme close-ups: with supplementary lenses; extension tubes, and double or triple-extension bellows. Regardless of your camera, even if it be the simple, fixed-focus variety, you can apply at least one of these methods in the with the punch and dramatic making of close-ups.

Space doesn't allow us to go into the common practices which make for effective close-up photography, but, like most phases of camera work, it is really little more than a case of practice and imagination. However, don't confuse the result gained by a greatly enlarged image of a distant subject detail of a true close-up.

Seems that some form of restitution should be made to two Douglas County athletes of another day whose district track records were allegedly broken, according to the sports pages of newspapers in this district after the district meet back in May.

WITH NO previous experience in the running of District Four meets and no line of district records in our hands, this sports page went along with the general after-meet belief that seven district marks had been snapped instead of what turned out to be only four.

In each of the three cases where a record was reported to have been broken and was actually not, a Douglas County record-holder was involved.

Rand Holder's 15.5 high hurdles was equaled by Elmiria's Dave McKinney and not broken as was reported. Holder ran his final year for Roseburg in 1933.

TWO MARKS set by Bob Thompson for Sutherland in 1933 still stand in the district record books. Thompson's times of 10.0 in the 100-yard dash and 20.4 in the 150-yard high hurdles were better than the 10.2 and 20.5 times which won those events at the district meet this year.

Spring Chinook Migration Still Highest Since 1946

The migration of spring chinook salmon in the Umpqua River continues far ahead of all past seasons since studies began in 1946, reports W. E. Pitney, game department field representative in charge of Umpqua River studies.

Size of the season run is encouraging as it gives indication that experiments designed to rehabilitate the depleted salmon run are meeting with success, Pitney states.

Fish tallied to date at the Winchester counting station to 6-202, as compared with the previous high record of 4,131 by July 1 in 1952. Based on past experience, the migration still is from 10 to 15 per cent short of the final total.

This year's migration includes the first return from experimental hatchery plantings in which salmon were held for 18 months prior to their release.

Summer steelhead movement is about average for the report up to and including last June 30. A very interesting feature of the report, however, is the very large movement of salmon trout. A total of 244 salmon trout had been counted through June 30, as compared with 12 fish of this species recorded by the same date in 1951, the previous high record.

Big league ballplayers celebrated Independence Day with a home run barrage that rocked eight baseball stadiums from dugout to bullpen and sent the hard-nosed, defenseless pitchers running to cover.

The day of double-headers rebounded with 35 home run blasts, only five short of the major league record for most homers in one day. A total of 315 hits were peppered about the parks and 75 pitchers were used. That's an average of almost 20 hits and more than 4 1/2 pitchers a game.

Cleveland's Bill Glynn was the merriest celebrant. The normally light-hitting first baseman, exploded three home runs in the 13th opening victory over Detroit and Wayne Belardi homered in Detroit. Glynn's bat, along with the rest of the Indians, was silenced in the second game, which went to 10 innings.

The eight American League starters, announced Sunday night, are Al Rosen, Cleveland, first base; Bobby Avila, Cleveland, second base; Ray Boone, Detroit, third base; Chico Carrasquel, Chicago, shortstop; Orestes Minoza, Chicago, left field; Mickey Mantle, New York, center field; Hank Bauer, New York, right field; and Yogi Berra, New York, catcher.

Each of these eight top vote voters must, according to the regulations governing the game, start and play a minimum of three innings.
