National Loop Hurlers Named For Big Game

CINCINNATI (AP) — The National League all-stars go after their fifth straight victory next week at Cleveland with one of the best all-around crews in the history of the classic.

"I think this is the strongest squad the National League has ever had," said league president Warren Giles Wednesday. "I think we'll make it five straight."

Walter Alton of the Brooklyn Dodgers, manager of the Nationals, and Casey Stengel of the New York Yankees, pilot of the American all-stars, announced their pitching selections Tuesday and rounded out their roster with additions to all positions.

The starting berths, except for the pitching assignments, were selected by the national pastime's fans in a nationwide poll.

Alton, the first freshman manager to handle an all-star squad, named four right-handed hurlers and three lefties with a combined 67-36 won-loss record for the July 13 game.

The nine American League hurlers, including two left-handers, have posted 80 wins and 38 losses. They are: Dean Stone of Washington, and Whitey Ford of the Yankees, and righties Mike Garcia and Bob Lemon of Cleveland, Bob Keegan and Virgil Trucks of the Chicago White Sox, Bob Porterfield of Washington, Alie Reynolds of the Yanks and Bob Turley of Baltimore.

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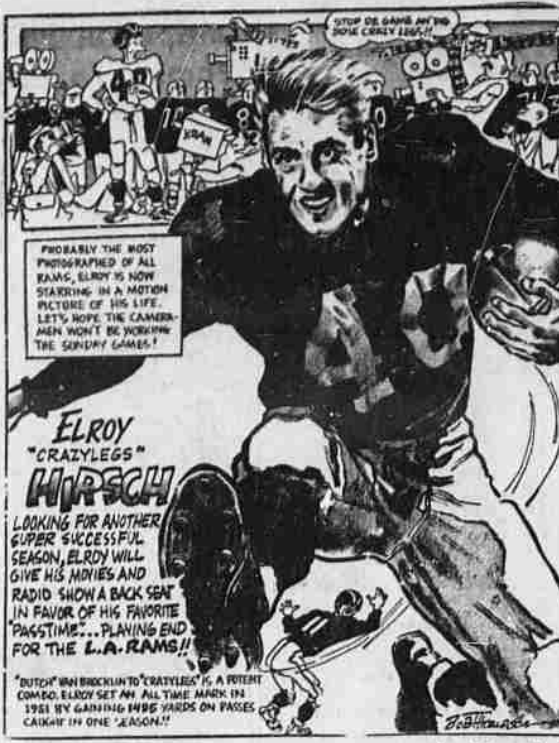
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GETTING READY to snare passes against the New York Giants

ANOTHER SKULL buster. Guess my identity by No. 2 and you qualify as a nature expert; No. 5 makes you an average outdoor observer; more than No. 7 calls for skull work.

1. Though an expert swimmer, I am a professional submerger. I build hills and never climb them; I have eyes but I can't see; my ears are not visible but I hear acutely; what I have of a neck is next to nothing; my tail is ridiculously short; and altogether you might say I give the appearance of an animated pork sausage covered with fur.

2. Of all mammals, surely my body is the most admirably adapted to its existence, in my case admittedly narrow. To perform the work I'm cut out for, my body is cylindrical with heavy shoulders and thick-set, short stout limbs—the forelegs being much more massive than the hind pair, with palms turned outward.

3. Destined to live a life in darkness, I avoid social affairs—frankly, they bore me. I'm seamy, yet volubly curious, and I discuss wherever I live and that is in almost every part of North America as far south as the Mexican border. I have relatives in Europe and Asia.
