Soviet Forces Being Told B29 Is Not So Tough

MOSCOW — The Soviet armed forces are being told that the American B29 is not so tough and that Chinese fighter pilots can knock it down.

This is put forth in an article published in Red Star under the by-line of Chou Bao-tun, Hero First Class of the Communist Chinese People's Republic.

The propeller-driven B29 was an air giant in World War II and saw action in the Korean War. But it has been outclassed by much bigger and faster bomb-carrying jet planes now in service in the United States.

Fighter pilot Chou writes: "At first we could not achieve good results against the enemy heavy bombers. Many of our fighters could not learn to gauge the distance for opening fire. The B29 is such a big plane that it seemed to us to be closer than it was. In fact, while the distance was very great our fire was not accurate and fell short and did no damage."

"But combat experience showed that American fighter pilots were in no hurry to help their bombers. They thought much more about escaping themselves to get out of our fire. Then a careful analysis of the tactics of the invaders showed that with skill and bravery our fighters could soon score good results in the fight against the Flying Fortresses."

Army Engineers Want To Sell Apartments

PORTLAND — The Army Engineers want to sell some two-story apartment buildings in the Lowell housing area of the Lookout Point reservoir project in Lane County. Bids will be opened July 22 for removal of the buildings by Sept. 15.

U. S. Farm Surpluses Now Exceed \$6 Million
WASHINGTON — The Agriculture Department reported Tuesday its investment in surplus farm commodities under price support programs totaled \$6,109,295,000 on May 31, a decline of \$79,443,000 from April 30.

In February, the investment came close to \$6,500,000,000. The decline since then has largely reflected farmer redemption of wheat and cotton stored under price support loans.

The department's May 31 investment included \$2,648,243,000 in loans to farmers on crops and \$3,460,050,000 in commodities owned by the department.

QUESTION OF LAW
LONDON — The independent, influential Times strongly deplored Tuesday a proposal by Sen. Knowland (R-Calif.) that the United States cut off financial support of the United Nations if Red China is admitted to membership.

"On the whole, British opinion looks at the problem of Peking's admission as one of law, not of morals," the Times said editorially.

Ambassador Job In Paraguay Going Begging

ASUNCION, Paraguay — A U. S. Government job worth \$15,000 a year and allowances is going begging.

It is the post of ambassador to this small South American nation. The job has been vacant since last October.

In recent years most of the work has fallen on a series of counselors of embassy—Archibald Randolph, John Shillock and now David H. Maynard. But they have lacked the rank to deal most effectively with tough problems.

Wealthy U. S. Campaign contributors looking for a likely embassy quickly pass over Asuncion after one hurried look at the State Department's report on the post. The capital has a bare 300,000 population and the nation only 1,300,000.

There is almost no public entertainment, no good hotel, no good private clubs, and there is no public sewage disposal system. Electricity and automatic telephones function irregularly. Mail, radio, telegraphic and telephone communications to other countries are slow.

To fill such an unattractive post in a hot, sea-level community, the State Department may have to draft an unwilling career man for the ambassador's job.

Paraguay is friendly to Uncle Sam, who has poured funds into the country for a tuberculosis hospital and for valuable farm projects to help raise the nation's low standard of living. This friendship has stood the strain of a violent April revolution, the subsequent selection of a provisional president and the nomination of a new strong-man general, Alfredo Stroessner, for the remainder of the presidential term.

Grand Jury Refuses To Reindict Joe Poggi

SALEM — Joe Poggi, who served 25 years in the state prison on an illegal life sentence and was arrested here on a burglary charge shortly after his release, is a free man again.

A Marion County grand jury refused to indict Poggi, now 57, on the charge after a previous indictment had been thrown out on a technicality.

Poggi, who now has a job on a chicken farm near Oregon City, won his freedom last year from the prison after attorneys found his sentence, based on the habitual criminals' law, was illegal.

South Korea's Cabinet Retracts Resignations

SEOUL — South Korea's cabinet turmoil stirred in new confusion Tuesday when Prime Minister Pyun Yung Tai and his entire state council retracted the resignations sent to President Syngman Rhee within the past 24 hours.

The latest development was announced at a Liberal Party caucus by National Assembly chairman Lee Ki Pung.

He told newsmen the en bloc resignation of the cabinet following Friday's non-confidence vote would create "an unhealthy political vacuum."

Scientists Criticize Ruling On Oppenheimer

WASHINGTON — The Federation of American Scientists has called on President Eisenhower to order a new look at the whole government security program because of "doubts and apprehensions" raised by the Oppenheimer case.

Dr. J. Robert Oppenheimer, famed scientist who supervised development of America's first atomic bomb, was declared a security risk last week by the Atomic Energy Commission (AEC). Four of the five commissioners held Oppenheimer's connection with the federal nuclear program should be ended because of "defects of character" and association with Communists.

The science group criticized the majority ruling in a statement Monday, saying the commissioners had seized on "a handful of incidents, relating in large part to events of over 10 years ago, taken out of the context of a distinguished career and a record of brilliant loyal service to the nation."

Paralysis Victim Finally Succumbs

PENDLETON — Lowell Lester Rogers, 85, who refused to let paralysis keep him out of his wheat and pea fields, directing operations there for years from a wheel chair, died Sunday night.

From 160 acres bought years ago with the help of his mother, he built an empire from the land. Rogers Canning Co., of which he was president, was reputed locally to be one of the largest independent pea canning plants in the country with two operations, one at Pendleton-Freewater and the other at Athena.

Oregon was always his home. He was born at Silverton and moved, when 7, to the Weston area with his parents. His first land was bought at an auction and was located just south of Adams.

Paralysis confined him to a wheel chair struck nine years ago.

Survivors are three daughters.

Suspender Industry Not Self-Supporting

LONDON — The British suspenders industry says it can't be self-supporting if trousers are.

Feeling the pinch since a recent trend here toward elastic waistbands, the National Assn. of Brace, Belt and Suspender Manufacturers, has sent 100,000 leaflets to British men's shops. It warns the retailers they will lose the profits on eight million dollars worth of suspenders sold each year if they go out of style.

Also, the association contends, it is unhealthy to constrict one's waist. And it asks: What will happen when the elastic gives out and a citizen is left with no suspenders?

DIES OF INJURIES

OREGON CITY — Frank Towell, 65, Estacada, died in a hospital here Sunday from injuries suffered when hit by a motorcycle June 28 at Estacada.

It was Clackamas County's eighth traffic death of the year.

Pilot Credited With One-Man Air War On Reds

CHIMICULA, Guatemala — An affable young rebel pilot is credited with waging a one-man air war that helped blast Guatemalan President Jacobo Arbenz Guzman and his Communist friends out of power.

The airman — whose identity is a closely guarded secret — played havoc with Arbenz' forces from a tiny Cessna single-engine plane whose designer never dreamed it would be used as a dive bomber.

The pilot opened his air campaign the day the rebel invasion began — June 18 — by swooping low over Guatemala's port of San Jose. He riddled fuel tanks with machine gun bullets, sending up flames much of Arbenz' fuel supply and forcing the government to put a quick ban on use of gasoline by private cars.

Later the young airman sneaked in over Guatemala City and blasted the army's main garrison of Matamoros.

A few days ago, he zoomed over a government troop train speeding reinforcements from the capital to the embattled city of Zacapa. He stopped the train with a few well-placed bombs then proceeded to strafe soldiers fleeing from the train.

On some missions the pilot took along a bombardier. The latter leaned out of the window when the little plane passed over the target and tossed out a bomb.

Sometimes a 20-pound fragmentation bomb was used, but more often the missile consisted of several sticks of dynamite wrapped around a grenade. A string was tied to the grenade. As the parcel dropped earthward the bombardier jerked the cord, this setting off the blast.

Autopsy To Determine Andy's Child's Death

SANTA MONICA, Calif. — An autopsy today is expected to determine if the son of radio's Andy suffered a fatal kidney ailment because of accidental poisoning.

John Joseph Correll, 7, succumbed Monday after being hospitalized four days. He was the son of Charles J. Correll of the Amos 'n' Andy show.

A coroner's office said the boy may have contacted an insecticide or some other poisonous substance that affected his kidneys, but only the autopsy could provide a definite answer.

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
