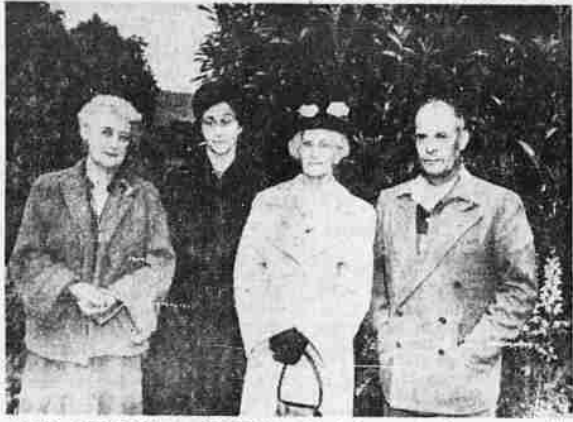

Historical Society Picnic And Meeting Held At Clough Home

Miss Bess Clough and her brother, Huron, entertained the Douglas County Historical Society at Clough Ranch near Canyonville Sunday. A potluck picnic, to which members brought covered dishes, was enjoyed by about 150 of the county's pioneer families.

Among those present were descendants of Governor Lane, Oregon's first territorial governor; Elberta Brown, first white woman to arrive in Oregon by wagon train in 1846; Commodore Stephen Douglas County in 1847, and Congressman Binger Herman, for many years the state's only congressman. Also present was Mrs. H. A. Crow, oldest resident of the county who is 93 years old. A close second was Mrs. Ben Nichols, who is 89 years old. Both ladies now live in Riddle.

Anecdotes were told of the early day settlers who robbed some of the grimmest from their hardy lives with a sturdy sense of humor. The prolific Weaver family of Myrtle Creek was the source of

many such stories. Former Municipal Judge Ira B. Riddle recalled the laying out of the town of Riddle by his father over 75 years ago and who at that time hoped for an early building of a nickel plant, which in the past year has at last become an actuality.

The entertainment was presided over by Bert Riddle, Mrs. V. J. Miceli, president of the society, conducted a short business meeting at the conclusion of the picnic. The present officers were re-elected to serve the coming year with the addition of two new directors who are A. W. Bashford and George Churchill.
