

Television Writers Study Strike Over Pay

HOLLYWOOD (AP) — The Executive Board of the Television Writers of America says it will meet tonight to set a strike date unless the TV networks grant a union shop and make a satisfactory offer for scripts.

Negotiations between TWA and the three networks have been under way since October 1953. Union officials say the networks and TWA still are far apart on minimum scales for scripts.

Lightning, Twisters Sweep Through Midwest

The Midwest cooled off Wednesday after a half-hour of rain and a half-hour of lightning. The storms were general over the Great Lakes region and southwestward over the central plains to the southern Rockies. The storm was expected to move into southern Ohio during the day.

Fair weather prevailed over nearly all other areas although there were thunderstorms in Florida and along the Gulf coast and light rain along the north Pacific coast.

A series of small tornadoes hit Wisconsin Tuesday. Winds up to 100 miles per hour were reported in the storm area. Several persons were injured. Milwaukee's rainfall in 12 hours measured 2 1/2 inches.

Temperatures again were high over the central and southern plains and eastward to the Mississippi River Tuesday, with 100 degrees readings in many cities. It was 107 in Russell, Kan. and 106 in Wichita. The days top readings were in the southwest desert region with both Blythe and Thermal, Calif., reporting highs of 116. It was a little cooler over parts of the northern Rockies. Coolest section was along the north Pacific coast.

Warship Restoration Bill Back In House

WASHINGTON (AP) — The bill to restore the USS Constitution and dispose of the famed warships Constitution, Hartford, Olympia and Oregon, has gone back to the House for approval of a few minor changes made by the Senate.

The measure was passed Tuesday by the Senate and returned for approval of the changes.

It provides for restoration and maintenance of the Constitution and turning over of the Constitution and Hartford to the cities of Baltimore and Mobile, Ala., respectively.

The Olympia and Oregon are to be kept one year. After that time, if no one bids for their care, they may be disposed of by the secretary of the Navy.

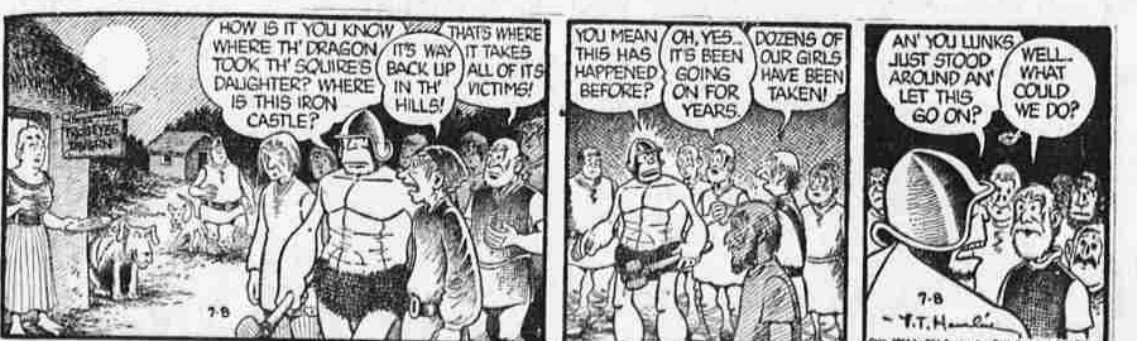
