

Government Defendant In Plane Crash Suit

SPOKANE (AP) — The federal government was named defendant in a suit for \$36,463 filed in Federal Court here as an outgrowth of a B-36 plane crash at Fairchild Air Force Base last March.

The suit contends that materials stored at the base by J. G. Gookstetter, Spokane plumbing contractor, were damaged when the 10-engine bomber crashed into them and burned. Plaintiffs with Gookstetter are The United States Fidelity and Guaranty Co., a Maryland corporation, and the National Fire Insurance Co. of Hartford, Conn.

Seven airmen were killed in the plane crash.



Study Shows State Growth In Population, Employment

A recent economic study indicates that Oregon's population has increased 50 per cent and its non-agricultural employment has grown by 72 per cent in the period 1940-1953.

A 20 per cent increase in population and a 55 per cent increase in employment is the national average for that period, it was stated.

The Northwest Research Council of the National Assn. of Manufacturers said the state's per capita income increased 201 per cent from 1940 to 1953.

In 1940, Oregon's population numbered 1,089,584, while the latest Bureau of the Census estimate places the 1953 figure at 1,630,000. The number of non-agricultural workers in the same period jumped from 271,700 in 1940 to 467,600 in 1953, the NAM stated.

Per capita income in the state rose from \$375 in 1940 to \$1,733 in 1953. National average per cap-

Unemployment Board Planning Industry Study

SALEM (AP) — A survey of Oregon's manufacturing potential will be made soon by the State Unemployment Compensation Commission, Gov. Paul Patterson said Wednesday.

The research, to be done in cooperation with the Oregon development commission, will include data on plant facilities, occupational diversification and the possibilities for expanded employment.

"State, federal and local agencies will make good use of the material in promoting more year-round jobs for everyone," Patterson said. Representatives of the 26 local state employment offices will gather much of the material as a supplement to their regular employer visiting program.

Wilhelm Governor For Next 10 Days

PORTLAND (AP) — Rudolph Wilhelm Jr. will be acting governor of Oregon for some 10 days starting at about 9 p. m. Wednesday.

He takes the position because he is speaker of the House and second in line of succession.

Gov. Patterson is going to the governors' conference at Lake George, N. Y. Nominally his successor would be Eugene Marsh, president of the Senate—but Marsh is going with Patterson part of the way and will return with him. This is the first time Wilhelm has been acting governor except for occasional weekends.

Keep Expenses Down, Budget Director Warns

SALEM (AP) — State Budget Director Laverne Young Wednesday advised the heads of state departments and institutions to keep their financial demands for the next biennium within their current requirements.

Young met with the heads of state agencies in the Salem area. A similar meeting will be held in the State Office Building in Portland Thursday for departments with offices in that area.

Young told the Salem group the state will be in no financial condition for expansion during the 1955-57 biennium. He also asked that departmental budget estimates be filed with him as soon as possible so the budget estimates can be printed before the next Legislature which meets in January.
