

Actors, Writers Lose Huge Suit For Damages

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Twenty-three film actors and writers have lost their \$51,750,000 damage suit against major studios which denied them employment for refusing to say whether they had Communist affiliations.

Superior Judge Ellsworth Meyer threw the suit out of court Monday and ordered judgment in favor of the studios and other defendants, including members of the House Committee on Un-American Activities.

The 23 charged that they had been penalized for exercising their right under the Fifth Amendment. They argued they had been black-listed by studios after being subpoenaed by the House Committee in 1952.

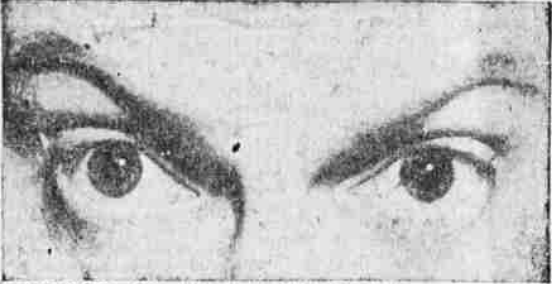

Army Still Hunts For Informant

WASHINGTON (AP) — Secretary of the Army Robert T. Stevens said Monday that the Army will "never give up" its search for the officer who allegedly provided Sen. McCarthy (R-Wis) a summary of a classified FBI document.

McCarthy produced the 2 1/2 page document at the McCarthy-Army hearings, and said it had been given to him by a young Army intelligence officer whom he identified as name. He dealt with the possibility of espionage at Ft. Monmouth, N. J.

Stevens, returning from a two-week tour of Army units in Europe, was questioned about comments made Sunday by Atty. Gen. Brownell in a television appearance. Brownell said that whoever gave McCarthy the document violated the law but the officer has not yet been identified. He said the search was continuing.

Portland Restaurant Hit By \$70,000 Blaze

PORTLAND (AP) — Fire swept through the second floor of a restaurant southwest of here Sunday. The owner, Bob Harrington, estimated the loss at \$70,000 to \$75,000.

Three firemen from the Beaverton-West Sione fire department suffered minor injuries in fighting the blaze, which Chief Harvey Williams said apparently started behind a stove on the lower floor. Flames climbed the kitchen wall to the second floor.

Oregon's Fruit Crops Will Be Under Average

PORTLAND (AP) — The Federal Crop Reporting Service expects Oregon's main fruit crop yields to be about 10 per cent less than last year.

The yields should not be too much below average.

A cold spring, late frosts and relatively dry weather in some parts of the state during April and May were blamed for the anticipated drop.

The agency expects total tree fruit output to be 28 per cent below last year and 32 per cent below average. Tree fruit suffered several weather setbacks, the worst being the severe May 1 freeze.

Wheat prospects improved in June, the service said. The crop now is forecast at some 24 million bushels, 30 per cent less than last year and 4 per cent below the 10-year average. An acreage cut under government controls is the chief reason for the smaller crop.

Wife, Others See Man Drown In Columbia

HERMISTON (AP) — Thomas Ray Orr, 25, an employee of the Umatilla Ordnance Depot, drowned in the Columbia River near here Sunday night. The body was not recovered, and search continued Monday.

Orr, his wife, Lorraine, and Dr. and Mrs. Kenneth A. Elliott had picnicked near the shore. About 11 p.m., Orr decided to go swimming. Soon after, the party heard his cries for help, and they rushed to the water with a lantern.

The picnickers said they saw Orr once in the darkness and that he continued to shout for about 15 minutes. Orr's wife said he was a fairly good swimmer, and believed he had been stricken by cramp. She was being treated for shock in the Umatilla hospital Monday.

Besides the widow, three children survive.
