Attorney General Lunacy Hearing Stated August 9

BIRMINGHAM, Ala. (AP) — Alabama Atty. Gen. S. Garrett, under indictment for voice fraud, faces a lunacy hearing Aug. 9. The state's chief law enforcement officer accepted service of the vote fraud indictment Monday and posted \$1,000 bond. He came here from Gaiveston, Tex., where he had been undergoing psychiatric treatment.

Shortly after the 41-year-old Garrett was arrested, Jefferson circuit solicitor (prosecutor) Emmett Perry filed the lunacy proceedings. The petition asked that the court "immediately institute a careful investigation, call a respectable physician and other capable witnesses, and thoroughly investigate the question of the insanity or mental condition of this defendant."

Presiding Judge J. Russell McElroy set a hearing for July 21 but this was postponed to August on agreement of opposing attorneys. Garrett was the third officer arrested on indictments returned June 30 by a Jefferson County grand jury which is investigating a fraudulent change in official returns here from the runoff for attorney general June 1.

Three Men Forfeit \$50 Bail Following Brawl

Three men forfeited \$50 bail apiece, another was fined \$35 and a fifth fined \$25 Monday as the aftermath of brawls which broke out early Sunday morning in Roseburg.

Robert W. Nault, 39, Brockway Star Route, and Wilmer Ray Nordling, 25, Sutherlin, each failed to appear on charges of disorderly conduct and thereby forfeited their \$50 bails. They were involved in a fist fight in Chuck's Coffee Shop, 121 N. Stephens St.

Edward E. Mellessa, 49, Brockway, accused of being drunk in a public place at the same time also forfeited his \$50 bail. A fourth arrested there after the same fight was fined \$25 when a disorderly conduct charge was reduced to a drunkenness count. He is Michael W. Kniska, 27, Douglas Hotel.

Large Community Center Building Asked By Leaders

The Douglas County 4-H Leaders Assn. has come out in favor of building a large community center in the Roseburg area.

A committee made up of Mrs. Alice Knutson, Kenneth Knechtel, C. R. Clumpner and Wilbert Anderson, has been studying the possibilities for such a building. It would be used for conventions, banquets, square dances, large 4-H gatherings, indoor sports events and other functions.

The committee expressed an opinion that the community building be located at the Douglas County Fairgrounds. Beside being centrally located for county functions, an added asset of the position would be its proximity to full-time personnel who would be available to manage it.

The committee estimates the center would cost about \$55,000. It has advised a building 100 by 108 feet, including kitchen facilities and seating space to serve 600 people. For an event such as a stage play, the capacity could be increased to 2,500.

The 4-H Leaders Assn. has called for all organizations to aid in the effort. It hopes to call a meeting this month to discuss financing of the building. It cited one possibility as borrowing the estimated amount from the extra O&C funds which the county will shortly receive and repay the loan from operating proceeds of the building.
