Air Force Now Seeking Added Academy Funds

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Air Force is seeking an initial appropriation of \$14,338,000 for its new academy, the counterpart of West Point and Annapolis, to be built near Colorado Springs, Colo.

Congress has authorized an expenditure of 28 million dollars during the current fiscal year, one million of it on a temporary academy to be occupied until the permanent one is ready. This authorization was contained in the bill creating the academy.

Testimony on the actual money bill, taken by the House Appropriations Committee behind closed doors, was made public Tuesday. Maj. Gen. Lee B. Washburne, assistant Air Force chief of staff for installations, testified the Air Force estimates the academy will cost about 125 million dollars but "it might go, in some of our thinking, up another 20 million dollars."

Householder Grapples With Prowler, Stabbed

GRANTS PASS (AP) — A householder grappled with a prowler in a darkened bedroom early Tuesday and despite being stabbed in the chest, continued the fight until the two rolled against a crib and knocked a baby to the floor. The Householder, Robert A. Seward, then turned to care for the baby and the prowler fled.

Seward was taken to Josephine General Hospital where his condition was said to be "fairly good." State Police Sgt. C. R. Borgman said the intruder—who fled without loot—entered by a window, went through a bedroom in which three children were sleeping, then entered the bedroom in which Mr. and Mrs. Seward and the infant were.

Seward awoke, leaped from bed and began the fight which foiled the prowler but put him in the hospital.

British, American Efforts Launched On Defense Block

WASHINGTON (AP) — A British-American effort will be made to break Europe's defense deadlock by proposing immediate sovereignty for West Germany while postponing German rearmament, Congress was told Wednesday in a letter from Secretary of State Dulles.

Dulles advised the lawmakers that the French government and British parliament will be asked in a day or two to support this alternative, to be employed in case the French Assembly adjourns Aug. 15 without ratifying the proposed European Defense Community.

Dulles' letter, dated July 12 before he flew to Europe on his current trip to talk to British and French leaders about EDC and the possibilities of peace in Indochina, was addressed to Chairman Charles McNamara and the House and Senate Foreign Affairs Committees.

The secretary said the alternate proposal would "afford an opportunity to complete arrangements for bringing German troops into European defenses — a key point of President Eisenhower's program."

The long-awaited alternative to EDC was discussed during the Churchills-Eisenhower conversations and the details worked out during the past week in London during talks between representatives of the State Department and the British Foreign Office, Dulles said.

Visiting Oregon Girl Found Dead In Bed

SPOKANE (AP) — A 16-year-old girl visiting here from Grandview, Ore., was found dead in bed Tuesday morning at the home of her sister.

The girl, Norda Erickson, went swimming Monday and watched television Monday night. Coroner Francis Burns said he would conduct an autopsy to determine the cause of death.

Miss Erickson arrived here Saturday to visit her sister, Mrs. Robert Brown. Mrs. Brown said the girl didn't come out of her room this morning and that she found her dead when she investigated.

Atomic Submarine Power Adequate For Complete Trip Around World, Says Report

WASHINGTON (AP) — The land-based model of the world's first nuclear submarine engine "has already produced more than enough power to send an atomic submarine around the world, fully submerged and at full speed."

The Senate-House Atomic Energy Committee said so in a report to the Senate and House recommending a series of changes in the basic Atomic Energy Act.

The engine, a land-based "prototype" of the atomic engine now installed in the USS Nautilus, is located at the Atomic Energy Commission's testing site in eastern Idaho.

Speaking of prospects for economic atomic power for industry, however, the committee said only that such an objective "is on the horizon, though not within our immediate reach."

The legislation which the committee recommended would generally carry out President Eisenhower's recommendations for changes in the 1946 Atomic Act to allow exchange of some nuclear secrets with Allied nations and permit private industry to enter the atomic power field.

The bill as a whole was unanimously approved by the 15-member committee, but some members expressed sharp dissents on some sections. The Senate may be

in debate on the measure late today or tomorrow.

The bill would:
1. Authorize the negotiations of agreements with foreign nations in the area of peacetime uses of atomic energy. The committee said this would provide "a mechanism to implement the President's peacetime international atomic pool plan."

2. Permit the AEC to transfer to another nation participating in such an agreement atomic materials in quantities needed for the development or utilization of atomic energy for nonmilitary and research purposes.

3. Allow transfer to another nation, or to a regional defense organization, secret data concerning the tactical employment of atomic weapons — but not including any information on their design and fabrication.

The committee said such information would include "data necessary to the development of defense plans, the training of personnel in the employment of, and defense against, atomic weapons and the evaluation of the capabilities of potential enemies in the employment of atomic weapons."

4. Permit the AEC to license private industry to possess and utilize atomic materials and to own atomic reactors or "furnaces" designed to produce and utilize such materials.

Yesterday, his mother, Mrs. Elizabeth Brunetti, filed suit asking \$100,000 damages from the government. She charged Brunetti suffered a permanent brain injury when he bounced against the tank's steel turret.

Brownell Asks Bar Be Placed On Ex-Employees

WASHINGTON (AP) — Atty. Gen. Brownell Wednesday asked that Congress bar former federal employees from ever handling for private interests any government matter with which they were associated while in government.

His proposal, sent to Vice President Nixon and House Speaker Martin (R-Mass.), would involve a rewriting of the "conflict of interest" laws.

Brownell described the existing statutes as inadequate. He suggested that the present penalty for "switching sides" after leaving federal service be increased from one year in prison or \$10,000 fine to two years or \$10,000 fine.

The present law forbids such "switching" for a two year period after a government employee has left government service. The statutes are so written as to appear to apply principally if not solely to attorneys.

Application of these laws was further narrowed by a district court ruling last year that the prohibition against an ex-government employee's representing a private employer in dealing with the government only applies in cases where there is a claim for money or property against the United States.
