

Attacks Against Yankees In South Investigated

MONTGOMERY, Ala. (AP)—Police and Air Force authorities investigating a series of attacks here on "Yankee" military personnel charged four teen-agers Wednesday with burning an airman with lighted cigarettes.

The arrests followed a series of eight reported incidents since June 22 in which northern airman stationed at nearby Maxwell and Gunter Air Force Bases have clashed with teen-agers.

Glenn E. Hunter of Harbor Beach, Mich., an airman from Gunter, said he was held and burned with cigarettes Saturday after a group of teen-agers called him a "Yankee" during an argument over racial segregation.

The four youths arrested Wednesday admitted thrusting burning cigarettes against Hunter's arm but said they urged them to do it as a "test of guts."

Scars from cigarette burns were also found on the arms of two of the young civilians, police said.

Judge Dismisses Suits Brought By Employers

SACRAMENTO (AP)—Federal Judge Oliver J. Carter Wednesday dismissed damage suits for more than \$500 a day brought by five Eureka area lumber firms against the striking AFL Lumber and Sawmill Workers Union.

The judge said the dismissal was requested by the companies.

The firms sued June 22, contending the walkout of union workers during a reopening of the wage sections was a breach of contract. They each asked upwards of \$500 a day as of June 16.

On July 2, Judge Carter denied another company request—for a strike-halting injunction against the union. He said his court did not have jurisdiction to issue such an order.

The firms involved are the Soun Brightwood, Precision, Albrite and Durable fir lumber companies.

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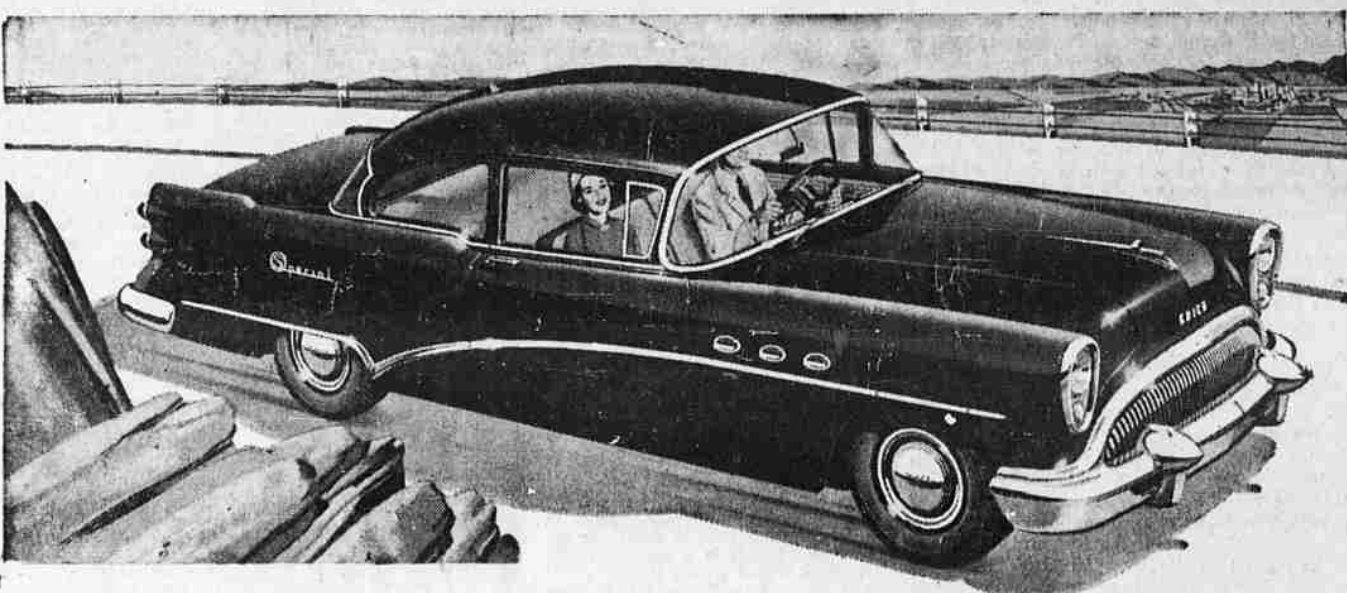
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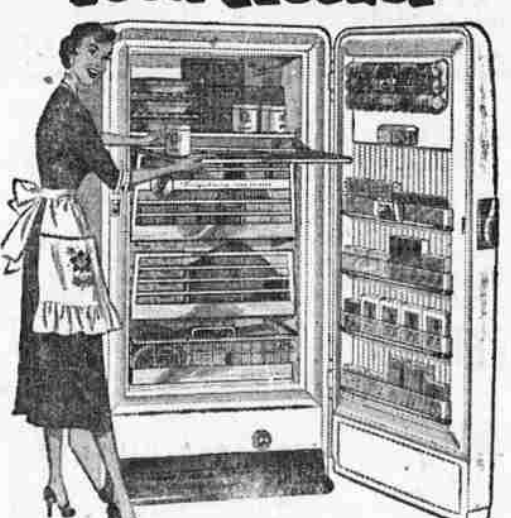
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
