

House Votes Opposition To Admitting Red China

WASHINGTON (AP) — The House went on record unanimously Thursday as opposed to admission of Communist China to the United Nations.

It passed by roll call vote of 381-0 a resolution reiterating its previously expressed position and supporting the President "in his expressed determination to use all means to prevent such representation."

The resolution does not require Senate action, being simply a demonstration of how the House feels about Communist China.

Injured Forestry Man Brought Into Hospital

SALEM (AP) — A forestry worker, who lay severely injured on a mountain trail for 6 1/2 hours while woodsmen chopped a rescue trail to him, was recovering in a Salem hospital Thursday.

Condition of Lloyd Williamson, 30, Salem, was reported "satisfactory" by hospital attendants.

Williamson and a partner were in the rugged Kinney Creek area near Detroit Dam Wednesday morning making preparations for salvage logging in the Sardine Creek burn when Williamson fell on the steep trail and suffered a broken back.

His partner, James White, went for aid and it took rescuers over five hours to chop through brush to Williamson who lay on the trail from 9:30 a. m. to 4 p. m.

He was taken to a Stayton hospital by forestry truck and brought to Salem Wednesday night.

Huge Pulp Mill Opens In Alaska

KETCHIKAN, Alaska (AP) — Alaska's first pulp mill, representing the largest single industrial investment ever made in the territory, was dedicated Wednesday amid official predictions that it marks a new era in northland development.

Gov. B. Frank Heinzelman spoke at ceremonies at which the United States and Alaska flags were raised over the 50 million dollar Ketchikan Pulp Co. plant at Ward Cove, six miles northwest of Ketchikan.

"This plant represents a turning point for Alaska," the governor said.

"In the industrial history of America, each new development has usually brought others and this is almost sure to happen in Alaska."

Union Withdraws Pickets At Piers

SEATTLE (AP) — Pickets representing the striking CIO-International Woodworkers of America vanished from Piers 28 and 38 Thursday and longshore crews resumed loading two ships.

American Mail Line officials said the Mormacree, carrying 500 tons of wood pulp from Bellingham and other cargo, would sail Wednesday night, 24 hours late. The Kazukawa Maru, a Japanese vessel, was being loaded with pulp trucked here from several Puget Sound mills.

The pickets, carrying placards announcing their strike against the Scott Paper Co., Everett, and the Puget Sound Pulp & Timber Co., Bellingham, tied up all operations on both piers Wednesday, but at 7 p.m. pickets were withdrawn from all cargo excepting pulp. Longshoremen began loading other cargo and Thursday morning the piers were entirely free of pickets.

Their withdrawal followed filing of charges of "secondary boycott" against the union.
