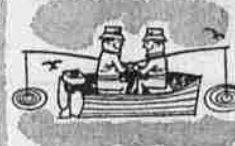
Band-Tail Season Stays Unchanged In Northwest

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Fish and Wildlife Service announced Monday the 1954 shooting season on band-tailed pigeons will remain unchanged in Washington and Oregon — from Sept. 1 to 30.

The daily bag and possession of six birds also will be the same as last year.

The agency said state game departments will select a season on mourning doves of 40 consecutive days or two periods of 20 days each.

Fishing Forecast Good Statewide

PORTLAND (AP) — This is a week-end on which anglers can go in just about any direction in reasonable hope of good luck.

There has been good coastal fishing, especially around Winchester Bay and Coos Bay for salmon and the Siuslaw and Alsea for cutthroat. The McKenzie and the Rogue and adjacent streams have been responding well for fly and bait fishermen. The Deschutes has been improving. The Willamette trails are free of snow and excellent waters now are open.

Two new rules became effective Thursday: The closure below Soda Springs Dam on the North Umpqua is extended to a marked point 150 feet below the power house, to protect salmon concentrated in the area; and the daily limit at Unity Reservoir near Baker is increased to 30, to permit a maximum catch before the October chemical treatment of the water is undertaken.

Citizenship May Be Denied Reds

WASHINGTON (AP) — The House Judiciary Committee Thursday approved and sent to the House a bill to strip citizenship rights from persons convicted of conspiring to overthrow the government by force or violence.

At the same time, it formally consigned to the wastebasket two administration anti-subversive measures which would give the government authority to ban suspected spies and saboteurs from defense plants and dissolve Communist-led unions and organizations.

The citizenship measure was advocated by President Eisenhower and is part of the anti-subversive program sent to Capitol Hill by Atty. Gen. Brownell.

It would provide for automatic loss of citizenship to anyone convicted of violation of the Smith Act by conspiring to overthrow the government by violent means.

In junking the two Brownell security bills, the committee adopted a substitute proposal by Rep. Walter (D-Pa.) to create an 18-member commission to study the question before recommending new legislation.

Republicans Hopeful Of July 31 Adjournment

WASHINGTON (AP) — Republican leaders refused Thursday to give up their plans to adjourn this election-year Congress on July 31, despite Democratic contention that it is an impossible early goal.

Sen. Lyndon B. Johnson of Texas, the Democratic leader, said Wednesday "we will be lucky if we get out early in August. I suspect it will be nearer Aug. 15."

Contending that the Democrats are only "being realistic," Johnson said their policy committee had appraised the situation at a luncheon meeting. He said the Democrats are willing to cooperate but believe "full and complete debate" must be had on a number of pending controversial measures.

Sen. Knowland of California, the Republican floor leader, told newsmen he believes Johnson "is unduly pessimistic." The date of adjournment hinges largely on Senate progress, since the House is further along with its work.

Woman Jailed In Fatal Shooting Of Laborer

PENDLETON (AP) — A woman was held in jail here Thursday in the fatal shooting of Loren Courland Wheeler, 56, at a labor camp at Milton-Freewater.

Dist. Atty. John E. Walker said he would file a charge of involuntary manslaughter against the woman, Mary Casabos Valdez, 33, later Thursday.

The shooting occurred Wednesday morning. Walker said Wheeler and the woman had argued and scuffled over a 22-caliber rifle which discharged accidentally. The bullet hit Wheeler in the abdomen and he was dead on arrival at a Walla Walla hospital.

Sheriff Roy Johnson said the couple had been living together at the labor camp since coming to the area June 7 from Port Hueneme, Calif. Wheeler worked as a harvest hand for the Rogers Canning Co.

Labor Federation 'Striving' For 30-Hour Week

SPOKANE (AP) — The Washington Federation of Labor went on record Thursday to "eventually" strive to attain the 6-hour day and the 30-hour week now enjoyed by some unions affiliated with the AFL.

These "eventual" goals were contained in an amendment to a substitute resolution which merely said the federation "reaffirms its traditional position of striving for a shorter work day week."

The substitute was offered for two other resolutions which flatly endorsed the 6-hour day and 30-hour week. They were presented by the state machinists' council and the building and construction trades section.

The amendment to the substitute was presented from the floor by Harry C. Plummer of the Spokane Falls Typographical union and was passed overwhelmingly.

The substitute resolution indicated negotiations of some AFL unions might be hampered if the federation approved the two original proposals.

Discussion on the amendment came as delegates neared the end of their 52nd annual convention.

Other resolutions among the 80 drawn up for consideration was one in support of the AFL Marine Cooks and Stewards Union.

In other resolutions, the federation called for repeal of the Taft-Hartley Act, a national health program of the kind proposed by former President Truman and was critical of so-called "right to work" laws.

Test Borings Begun For Columbia Bridge

ASTORIA (AP) — Test borings have started to determine a feasible site for a bridge spanning the Columbia River from Astoria to the Washington side.

The work got under way, the port commission reported Thursday, on the basis of still-not-final agreement of four agencies to finance the survey. The Astoria port, Oregon Highway Commission, Pacific County, Wash., and Washington Toll Bridge Authority, are to share costs. Agreement was reached although the toll bridge authority had not signed, the survey was started.

First borings will be on a route running northwesterly from the west end of Astoria to just west of Point Ellice.
