Two More French Posts Fall To Vietnam Forces

HANOI, Indochina (U) — Two French defense outposts fell before Vietnam attackers as monsoon rains came to the Red River delta Wednesday night. Vietnamese defenders abandoned the post of Chiquan, 25 miles west of Hanoi, after a brief fight against 400 to 500 Vietnamese attackers, a French briefing officer reported. Thirty-five miles northwest of Hanoi, a second small post on the edge of delta defenses crumbled under another Vietnamese attack. The briefing officer said Vietnamese defenders of both posts were beating their way back to Son Tay through guerrilla-infested territory inside the French defense line, northwest of Hanoi.

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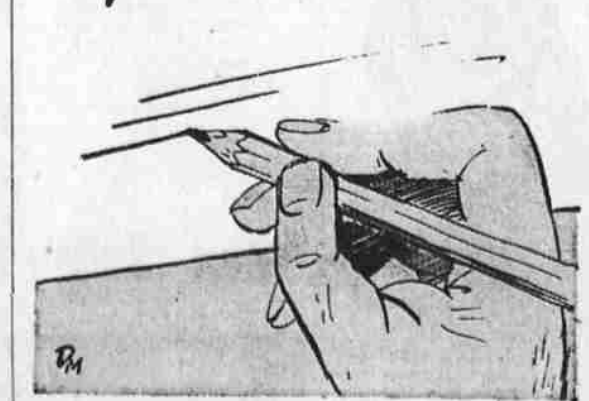

Hugh Windfall In Housing Job Told At Hearing

WASHINGTON (U) — Alfred Gross, the builder with the biggest "windfall" profit yet reported, told Senate investigators Thursday that FIA officials advised him to increase the cost estimate in his Glen Oaks Village, N.Y., application for mortgage insurance.

And, said Gross in response to Democratic questioning, the tax counsel who advised his family-held corporation to treat the six million dollar profit as a capital gain—taxed at a much lower rate than income—is associated with the law firm of which Atty. Gen. Brownell was a member until he took the cabinet job.

The Internal Revenue Service has challenged the use of the capital gains tax, it was testified, and the case now is pending in New York.

Gross said that in applying to the Federal Housing Administration for insurance on the first \$485,000 mortgage on the 25 million dollar project, he included in his cost estimates 5 per cent for "architect's fee" and 5 per cent for "builder's fee."

Actually the architect's fee was 1 per cent and the builder's fee nil, he said. But in asking the bigger allowances he simply followed a sample application shown in a brochure distributed to builders for illustrative purposes by the now-defunct National Housing Administration.

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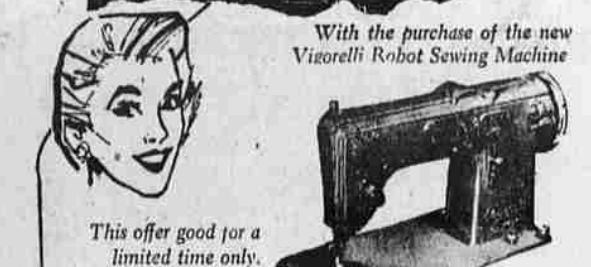
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
