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Marked, Native Fish Gain In Count At Winchester

Fish migrations through the
 counting station at Winchester
 dam are continuing to produce
 smiles on faces of game depart-
 ment biologists.

Closely watching the return of
 chinook salmon, marking the first
 year for collection of data from
 experimental hatchery plantings,
 William E. Pitney, in charge of
 Umpqua River studies, reports

that counts show not only a high
 percentage of hatchery-reared,
 marked fish, but also a very sub-
 stantial gain in native stock.

Salmon trout continue to move
 at a record pace, while the steel-
 head movement is above average.
 Reporting the count through the
 first two weeks of July, Pitney
 supplies the following comparative
 figures:

Boros Picks Up Cash-Won Lead

CLEVELAND — Golfdom's
 touring brigade had a new money-
 won leader Monday, big Julius
 Boros stepping out front Sunday as
 he picked up the \$5,000 top prize in
 the 72-hole Manakiki Open.

Boros defeated George Fazio,
 Pine Valley, N.J., veteran, in an
 extra hole playoff to pick up the
 heavy end of the \$25,000 purse.
 They had tied at 280, eight under
 par, as series of last-round mis-
 fortunes swept the other contend-
 ers aside.

The \$5,000 fee moved Boros up
 to \$15,120 for the year, jumping
 him into the lead over Mr. Cary
 Middlecoff's \$13,883. Boros, in-
 eligible for this week's PGA tourna-
 ment at St. Paul despite the fact
 he won the 1952 National Open,
 said his next tourney start would
 be at Kansas City.

Boros finished with 71-70-68-71
 and Fazio had 72-68-72-70 for their
 280's.

Canadian Takes Open; Cudd Loses In Playoff

VANCOUVER, B.C. — Pat
 Fletcher of Saskatoon, Sask., who
 "felt like jumping in a river" for
 a moment Saturday, was wading
 in a river of acclaim Monday as
 the man who brought the Cana-
 dian Open golf championship back
 to Canada after 40 years of alien
 domination.

His four-round score of 280—
 fur under par for the 6504-yard
 Point Grey course—won him a
 \$3,200 share of the \$15,000 prize
 money and the Seagram Gold Cup,
 emblematic of the title.

Brydson, who went sour on two
 holes after he seemed to have the
 tourney won, tied for second with
 Bill Welch of Kennewick, Wash.,
 at 284. One stroke back were Rudy
 Horvath of Windsor, Ont., and two
 amateurs, Bruce Cudd of Port-
 land, Ore., and Doug Bajus of the
 home course.

Bajus won a sudden death play-
 off for the amateur title with a
 par on the first hole. Cudd lash-
 ing his second shot into the trees
 to waste a stroke.

 Chicago Cubs in 1894.



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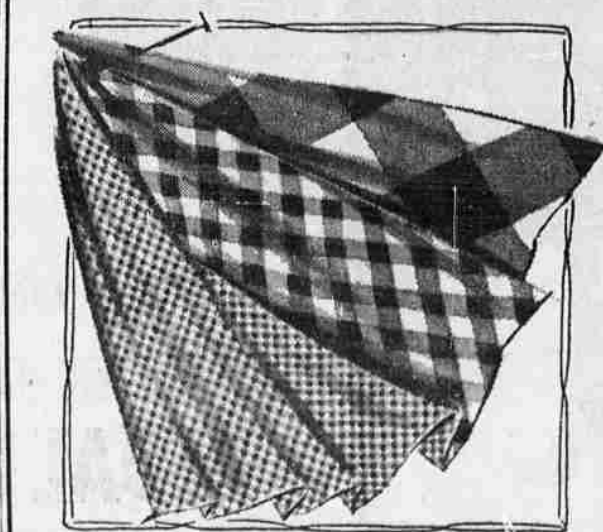


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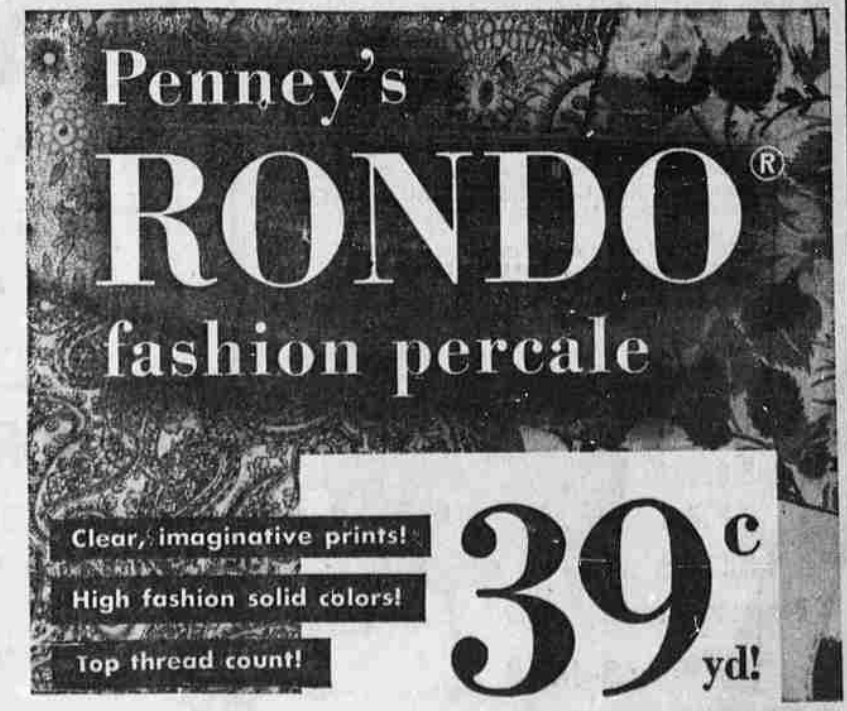
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
