Funeral Services Pend For Albert Parrish

Funeral arrangements for Albert Parrish, who became Douglas County's eighth logging fatality Friday when a felled tree struck the cab of the pickup he was in, have not yet been completed, according to Deputy Coroner Robert Ganz.

The condition of L. R. Kinsey, the other occupant of the pickup, is reported as "pretty good" Ganz said. Kinsey was transferred to Eugene's Sacred Heart Hospital Monday afternoon from Myrtle Creek Hospital for additional treatment by specialists. His wife and two children live in Days Creek.

Showers Are Forecast Locally For Saturday

It might be a good idea to take a raincoat or umbrella along if you plan to be outside Saturday. According to the local weather bureau, there is a chance of showers about Saturday. In the five-day weather outlook for western Oregon issued today, the bureau predicts rather cool days through Sunday with temperatures averaging below normal, except somewhat warmer Thursday and Friday.

Fire Destroys Elks' Picnic Counters

A fire, apparently started late Sunday evening by a smoldering cigarette or hot ash from the barbecue pit, completely consumed the plywood serving counters and a portion of a picnic table at the Rod and Gun Club's picnic area.

The blaze was believed to have started in wooden shavings around the base of the counter. It also singed a nearby jackpine and scorched grass in a surrounding area of some 20 feet. Damage was negligible, according to W. A. Gilchrist, manager of the local Elks Club.

The counters had been built by members of the Elks Lodge. They were used as a serving area where those attending the annual Elks picnic could get some of the beef from the 900-pound steer barbecued at the picnic.

According to Gilchrist, the counters et al were intact when the last people left the picnic area at 10:30 p.m.

However, he said, when another party came back to the area at 1 a.m. to search for some lost keys, the fire damage had already occurred. "It just seemed to stop," said Gilchrist, who'd examined the grounds Tuesday.

He added that it was fortunate that the fire had burned itself out, before causing considerable damage and attributed the demise to apparent lack of wind and high humidity.

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Sanitary, Storm Sewer System Cost \$2 1/2 Million (Continued from Page One)

9,000. To bring the plant up to specifications of the Oregon Sanitary Authority would cost \$140,000.

Growth in the outskirts of the city is recognized and the engineers recommend that main lines and treatment facilities should be adequate to serve an eventual population of about 18,000.

Population of the city itself is taken into consideration. By 1969, it is forecast the city will contain 13,000 residents. Estimated population now is 11,360.

The report now is in the hands of the health and sanitation committee of the city council. City Manager George Farrell said that council action on the first phase of the program may start sometime in August.

In viewing the sanitary problems outside the city, the firm says they can be met best through annexations. But, it adds, annexations may be difficult in some areas, so "suitable financial arrangements" should be made between the city and sanitary districts outside the city limits.

A new treatment plant, it is recommended, should be connected to all systems, with each district and the city sharing in the cost of the plant.

Work on sanitary and storm sewers to begin at the same time is "feasible," the engineers think, in view of the city's "good financial standing." Work should be programmed carefully, they say, so that street work won't be interrupted.

and Plywood Corp. and Medford Door Corp. prepared to get back into operation. Agreement was reached Friday between the operational settlement terms, but Kenneth Davis, executive secretary of the Northwestern Council, AFL-LSWU, said here that it was for an increase of 5 cents and 7R cents an hour — some workers getting one figure and some the other.

The strike, by both AFL and the CIO Woodworkers, was to get an increase of 12 1/2 cents. There have been a number of settlements, ranging all the way from renewal of the old contract without change, to the full 12 1/2 cents. These, though, have been chiefly in the smaller operations.

At Redmond, where CIO Woodworkers went through their local picket line Monday to resume work at the Ponderosa Lumber Sales plant, a moulding mill, there were more pickets and more returning workers Tuesday. A company spokesman estimated 30 to 35 pickets and about 75 employees who went past them without incident.

At Springfield Monday night at a closed meeting of CIO sawmill division employees of Weyerhaeuser Timber Co., it was reported that negotiations through a local committee were turned down by a 3-1 margin. The union spokesman, who said 600 of 800 affected employees attended, reported that the regional committee will continue to speak for local workers.
