Indian Reservations To Get Funds For Roads

WASHINGTON (AP) — Washington, Oregon and Idaho will share in a 10-million dollar program for improving and maintaining Indian reservation roads announced Monday by Secretary of the Interior McKay.

Allocations proposed in the program include \$850,000 for the three Northwest states. The program was outlined in a request to Congress for a supplemental appropriation of \$3,900,000. The Interior Department said it already has \$2,897,000 for road construction and \$2,897,000 for maintenance on reservations. In addition, it also plans to use contract authority totaling \$1,181,000 provided by the Federal Aid Highway Act.

Develop Your Own Resources, McKay Tells Alaskans

ANCHORAGE, Alaska (AP) — Secretary of the Interior McKay continued his whirlwind tour of Alaska Monday, scheduling a visit to near-by Elmendorf Air Force Base and a flight to Cordova and Valdez. McKay told the Seward chamber Sunday: "Alaska is in a better position than ever before to demonstrate her ability to take her rightful, eventual place as a state in our great union."

He cautioned at Anchorage Saturday night, however, this cannot come about until Alaskans assume the responsibilities for developing their own resources. "The federal government can no longer maintain its colonial role," McKay said. McKay called for a "working partnership" with Alaskans and listed goals he said should be factors in the territory's growth and development. The program, he said, should include return of more land to the public domain, rehabilitation of the Alaskan fishing industry, development of Alaskan oil lands, expanding Alaska's tourist industry, attracting new industries, turning more services over to the territory from federal jurisdiction, and extending the joint federal-local public works program.

Child Beater Found Sane; To Be Sentenced

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Mrs. Trintad Vera, convicted of beating her 9-year-old daughter Celia so severely that the child suffered two skull fractures, numerous fractures of the arms, loss of teeth and impairment of vision, has been found sane.

The 28-year-old mother collapsed when she heard the result of her sanity trial, on the basis of which she becomes liable to a possible sentence of 4 years on six counts of assault and mayhem committed against her crippled child.

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
