Ellsworth's Indian Bill For \$3 Million Passes

WASHINGTON (AP)—A bill by Rep. Ellsworth (R-Ore), aimed at dividing more than three million dollars among Oregon Indians, was passed by the House Monday. The bill, which goes to the Senate, calls for the secretary of the Interior to prepare a roll of members of the confederated bands of Umpqua and Calapoosias, the Tillamook, Coquille, Tootootney, Chetco and Molalla tribes. The rolls would provide the basis for distribution of the three million dollars which the United States Court of Claims awarded the Indians in 1951.

New Company Formed For Riddle Gang Mill
