Harry Grunewald Indicted On 10 Counts Of Lying

WASHINGTON (AP) — Henry W. (The Dutchman) Grunewald, reputed Washington wire-puller, was indicted here Thursday on charges that he lied repeatedly in denying tax-fixing activities under the Truman administration.

The indictment, returned by a federal grand jury, accused Grunewald of committing perjury 10 times in recent appearances before the jury itself and in testimony during April 1953 before a House ways and means subcommittee investigating tax scandals.

Accident Victims Out Of Hospital

Syngman Rhee Leaves Saturday; Dream Shattered

By MURRAY FROMSON SEOUL — Stubborn old President Syngman Rhee leaves Saturday for Washington, probably to be told that there is almost no hope of realizing his fondest dream—a republic of Korea embracing the Communist-ruled north.

Obviously the 79-year-old president is going to Washington to discuss a new unification policy with President Eisenhower, since the Geneva conference failed. And publicly he still rallies South Korea's 22 million people with the cry "Go north."

But an informed government source says privately Rhee has all but abandoned hope of seeing this divided and war-shattered peninsula reunited before he dies.

President Eisenhower's Far East advisers almost certainly have told him that North Korea must be written off as a loss to the Communists, observers here say.

Intelligence reports from North Korea indicate Red China has turned the area into a vassal state, tied lightly to Peking both politically and economically.

Death On Utility Pole Ends 30-Year Partnership

COLUMBUS, Ohio (AP) — Death, high on a utility pole on a storm-swept country road, has ended the 30-year partnership of two veteran electric linemen.

Sixty-eight-year-old Reber Brown lost his last fight to save his buddy, Harry Finks, 69. Finks was on a pole near Reese Station early Wednesday, repairing broken lines during a thunderstorm, when a swinging wire sent 6,900 volts of electricity through his body.

Brown called for help on the repair truck radio. Then he climbed the slippery, wind-tossed pole to his partner's dangling body and tried to give him artificial respiration. When help arrived Finks was taken to a hospital. He was dead when he got there.

35 Acres Burned In Melrose Area

Douglas County's biggest fire this year, which consumed 30 to 35 acres on Woodruff Mountain, was brought under control late Wednesday evening, according to the Douglas Forest Protective Assn.

The blaze, caused by a cigarette thrown down by a careless smoker, the DFPA said, was discovered at 4:35 Wednesday.

Twenty men from the DFPA and farmers and loggers in the area south of Umpqua, between Umpqua and Melrose, worked to control the fire. A pumper truck from the DFPA in Roseburg with a 10-man crew was called out, also the crew truck from Hinkle Creek with a 10-man crew.

As the men battled to control the blaze, a second fire in the same area was discovered at 10:05 p.m. This one, located across the road from the first, burned only one eighth of an acre. It was on the Pankey and Berry Logging operation. Cause was unknown.

Men on the logging operation and DFPA men, when the Woodruff Mountain blaze was controlled, soon brought the second fire in hand.

8,000 Acre Fire Raging In Redding, Calif., Area

Redding, Calif. (AP) — More than 8,000 acres of rangeland was burning near here Thursday, some of it said district forest ranger, Jesse Graves "intentionally set off."

All the blazes were under control, Graves said.

One fire of 1,200 acres was under control near Cloverdale, 15 miles southwest. Backfires set by the State Forest Service had merged and put under patrol blazes totaling 6,400 acres about 10 miles east on Highway 44.

At least a dozen other small fires were either out or under control.

At least six houses were reported destroyed in a 2,800-acre fire near Redding municipal airport, 10 miles southeast of town and three houses were reported burned near Ingot—a ghost town—20 miles northeast.

Phantom Killer Gives Self Up

SHEREVEPORT, La. (AP) — Detective Capt. Wayne Bateman said Wednesday night a man who identified himself as the "phantom killer of Texarkana, Ark.," surrendered to police because his conscience "was bothering" him.

Bateman identified the man as Robert Martin Chandler, about 36, of Stamps, Ark.

The man's arms, Bateman said, were scarred from the finger tips to the shoulders. Chandler told officers he had punished himself for the crimes by burning his arms with cigarettes, Bateman explained.

Bateman said the crimes which Chandler said he committed involved the brutal beating of one couple, and the killing of five other persons. Another person, who was shot after her husband had been killed, recovered.

For weeks after a second double slaying in 1946, the city of Texarkana blacked out and called a voluntary curfew which kept everyone off the streets at night.

Police Chief Max Tackett of Texarkana, who arrived here to question Chandler, said the man's statements could be "nothing more than those of a crank, but we can't take any chances."

No charges were filed against Chandler.

Eisenhower To Attend McNary Dam Dedication

WASHINGTON — President Eisenhower Thursday accepted an invitation to attend the dedication of McNary Dam on the Columbia River Sept. 23.

The White House announced the President, who expects to be vacationing in Denver at that time, will arrive at the dam between Walla Walla, Wash., and Pendleton, Ore., about 10:30 a.m. (PST) on the day of the dedication.

The announcement said the President will speak at the ceremony.

The subject was not disclosed. The President received an invitation to take part in the dedication earlier this week from Sen. Cordon (R-Ore.) and other members of the Washington and Oregon congressional delegation.

Oregon Republicans have been eager to have the President visit their state in the hope he will help Cordon's re-election campaign.

Southwest Asia Defense Alliance Will Be Mapped

WASHINGTON (AP) — The United States, Britain and other friendly nations have agreed to call an international conference late next month to write a defensive alliance designed to protect the non-Communist lands of Southeast Asia against Communist conquest.

Highly placed diplomatic authorities said an announcement of the meeting is expected shortly.

The agreement was reached, these officials said, among Secretary of State Dulles, Undersecretary Walter Bedell Smith, British Foreign Secretary Eden and others at Geneva after it became certain that the fighting in Indochina would be ended by negotiated peace with the Communists.

Some officials told a reporter the meeting probably will be held some place in the Asian area and that the level of representation—foreign ministers or persons of lesser rank—is yet to be determined.

The United States originally proposed that 10 nations make up the Southeast Asia treaty organization. They were the United States, Britain, France, Australia, New Zealand, Thailand, The Philippines and the Indochinese states of Viet Nam, Laos and Cambodia.

The British wanted to bring in as many additional Asian nations as possible, including India, Burma and Pakistan.

The makeup of the projected meeting remains to be worked out. If Laos, Cambodia and Viet Nam are permitted by the Indochina peace terms to agree to attend they will undoubtedly be included.

But even if it is finally decided they cannot attend, American officials said privately that the defensive alliance can be written to protect them as well as countries like Thailand which would be members.

The Premier first kissed his attractive wife, then moved on to greet other members of his family and Finance Minister Edgar Faure acting Premier during his weeks of bargaining with the Communists in Geneva.

Leaving Geneva earlier today, Mendez-France said he believed the results of the conference were "worth the efforts we had made."

"I have read," he said, "that yesterday was the first day of total peace in the world in many years."

Before he left Geneva, Mendez-France heard the United States arguments for and against the international army plan to rearm West Germany.

First Russia's V. M. Molotov caught the French Premier's ear yesterday to remind him of Russia's objections to the defense community idea. The Soviet foreign minister apparently hoped the Reds' agreement to an Indochina peace at Geneva would persuade the French the Red bear now is so docile German troops are not needed.

But at dinner last night U.S. Undersecretary of State Walter Bedell Smith drew Mendez-France aside to remind him that the EDC is the key to West Europe's defense against Communist aggression.

California Bank Purchases Bonds For Elkton Job

The Bank of California was the successful bidder with its 5 per cent interest rate for purchase of \$16,000 in water bonds for the city of Elkton, reports Correspondent Mrs. C. W. Henderer. The bonds will be paid off in eight years.

Charles Martin and Lloyd Bros. of Coquille and Coos Bay was the successful firm for construction of the water system. Its bid was \$11,200. This will cover furnishing and installing of a four-inch pipe line from the steel bridge across the Umpqua River to the city reservoir on the hill.

Water will be pumped from the river and forced into the reservoir at the rate of about 40 gallons per minute. The direct line from the river will not serve consumers. But it will be connected to several fire hydrants through the city. The chlorinator will be installed at the river near the pump.

Although not a part of the construction bid, the city is installing 2,000 feet of two-inch service pipe in the same ditch as the four-inch pipe.

The water project is expected to be completed by Aug. 15, Mrs. Henderer says.

Cease-Fire Not Popular Among Leaders Of War

By JOHN RODERICK SAIGON, Indochina (AP) — The French and Vietnamese military commanders in Indochina issued orders of the day Thursday deploring the partitioning of Viet Nam but they declared the fight for freedom was not lost.

Gen. Paul Ely, commander-in-chief and French commissioner general, told his troops and the people of Viet Nam the Geneva cease-fire was an "anguished peace." He added, however, that it was the solution "which safeguards best the major interests and the future of the state, the army and the Vietnamese nation."

Ely said France reaffirmed solemnly her policy "aimed at bringing Viet Nam as well as Cambodia and Laos to total independence."

"With the suppression of the state of war," he said, "France intends to fulfill very quickly this evolution at the same time as the side these countries, notably Viet Nam, in the immense work of social, economic and national reconstruction."

Gen. Nguyen Van Hinh, Vietnamese chief of staff, in his order of the day said partitioning had not been wanted and "there will be no peace in our hearts until the country once again is united."

"The cease-fire is not peace," he said, adding "The enemy will profit by it to prepare his peace which will place us under the Communist yoke. Be ever more vigilant, because we too are preparing our peace—one of honor and true liberty."

Cool Fronts Push Heat Wave Into Southern States

By THE ASSOCIATED PRESS Two separate cool fronts advanced across the northern half of the nation Thursday depressing the July heat wave mostly to the Southern plains states.

One area of cool air stretched from the Pacific Northwest across the Rockies and the other extended from the Great Lakes, southward to the Ohio Valley and eastward to New England.

The northern edge of the swelter-belt extended from Virginia across Kentucky and southern Illinois northwestward into the Dakotas.

Daytime temperatures in the hot area were 90 or above with 100 plus readings in Kansas, Oklahoma, Missouri and Texas.

The July heat wave, which has caused more than 300 deaths across the nation, has been centered principally in the southern and central plains.

Wichita, Kan., had a high of 106, Oklahoma City, 101, Kansas City, 101, Abilene, Tex., 101.

In the cool belt, Chicago had a high reading Wednesday of 78 compared with 98 the previous day. The high at St. Louis was 86, down 19 degrees.

The temperature drops in 24 hours ranged from 20 to 37 degrees over parts of Montana. Havre, Mont., had a high of 64 compared with 101 the preceding day.

Showers or thunderstorms occurred over most of the Rocky Mountain region, the northern plains, Iowa, Missouri, and throughout most of the eastern third of the nation.
