

Radio War Purchases By Air Force Criticized

WASHINGTON — A House subcommittee reported Wednesday the Air Force ordered more than 100 million dollars worth of radio sets of an "untested model" which thus far has been "so unreliable as to be of no practical use."

The sharply critical report said that "during some periods of the Korean crisis numerous Air Force aircraft were without long-range radio equipment" because of Air Force reliance on the untested model.

The report was filed by a subcommittee on military operations headed by Rep. Riehlman (R-N.Y.) and approved by the full Government Operations Committee.

The subcommittee said the Air Force first contracted with the Radio Corp. of America in December 1950 for 307 "revolutionary" long-range combination receiving-sending sets although the sets were still unproven.

SALEM — The Oregon Highway Commission warned Tuesday of construction delays on six state highways.

YOUTH DROWNS

MEDFORD — Samuel Charles Wedell, 18, of Ancho, N. Mex., drowned in the Applegate River near here Tuesday after rescuing a girl from mid-stream.

State police said incomplete reports indicated that Wedell went to the rescue of a member of a swimming party and after a struggle brought her near shore where others waited. The others reached shore with her without noticing that Wedell, apparently exhausted, had himself gone down. His body was recovered.

Oak Ridge Strikers Vote End To Wildcat Walkout

OAK RIDGE, Tenn. — Striking AFL laborers voted Tuesday to end a 9-day wildcat walkout on two atomic plant construction projects, a union official announced.

W. J. Broom, assistant business agent of Laborers' Local 818, said the strikers had decided to remove picket lines at the six gates to the plants' area and return to work on the afternoon shift.

The end of the crippling work stoppage came as a back-to-work movement on the jobs picked up momentum.

Officials reported that more than 3,000 AFL craftsmen crossed wildcat picket lines posted by striking AFL laborers. This is about half the normal day shift force on the two jobs.

After rejecting a 5-cent increase their leaders had negotiated for them, the laborers, members of Local 818, struck July 12 for a 15-cent hourly wage boost over their present scale of \$1.40 hourly.

Disabled Vets Payment Boost Voted In House

WASHINGTON — The House voted unanimously Wednesday to boost compensation payments to war veterans—and some dependents of veterans—who have service-connected disabilities.

The increases, approximately 5 per cent for veterans and 25 per cent for some dependents of deceased veterans, were provided in a bill passed by roll call vote of 399-0 and sent to the Senate.

The legislation provides for no increases for veterans, or dependents, whose pension payments are not based on service-connected disabilities.

In a separate action and by an identical 399-0 tally, the House voted to extend for another year the deadline for veterans of the Korea fighting to start and complete their education under the GI assistance act.

Korea veterans now must start their GI educational training by Aug. 20, or no more than two years after discharge from the service. And they must complete it within seven years of their discharge.

The House-passed bill would extend the deadlines from two and seven years, to three and eight years respectively.

Veterans with service-connected disabilities would be given an additional four years, from 9 to 13 years, to complete vocational rehabilitation training delayed because of illness or other reasons.

Roosevelt Says He Is Proud Of Slum Clearance

NEW YORK — Rep. Franklin D. Roosevelt Jr. says he is proud of his efforts to get slum clearance projects for New York City and has made no personal profit from them.

The Democrat-Liberal Party congressman issued a statement on the matter Tuesday after the New York World-Telegram and Sun linked him with the projects, which the paper said are under congressional investigation.

The newspaper, however, said a Washington investigation had uncovered what were described officially as "questionable practices" in connection with the proposed Manhattan and Washington Square Southeast projects.

Roosevelt said he and his law partners worked without fees for sponsors of the \$7 1/2-million-dollar Manhattan and Washington Square Southeast projects.

His partners in the firm of Roosevelt, Freiden & Littauer worked without him on the Washington Square development, he said.

Roosevelt said he himself would not share any fees they might get from backers of the \$5-million-dollar project, which is outside Roosevelt's district.

Red Imperialism Greatest Menace, Says Gen. Dean

COOS BAY — The greatest menace facing the United States today is not communism but "Soviet imperialism," Maj. Gen. William F. Dean told the Oregon department convention of the American Legion here Wednesday.

Dean, highest ranking American officer captured during the Korean War, said Russia is engaged in "carrying out a program of world conquest designed more than 200 years ago" by the Russian Czar, Peter the Great.

Dean told the legionnaires the last will and testament of the czar "gives historic evidence of the true nature of the Russian conspiracy for world domination."

The document, Dean added, advocated use of a dogma to conceal the program for world domination.

"Not only did they adopt Marxism as their dogma to mask their world ambitions in presenting themselves as a friend to each enemy," Dean said, "but they also have established the Communist Party as a high priesthood in their own country."

He then quoted at length from the purported will.

The convention opened Wednesday morning and continues through Saturday. About 1,200 delegates were registered, and more were due during the day.

Strike's Affect Upon Welfare To Be Studied
