World War II Veterans Borrow Over \$60 Million

SALEM (AP) — Veterans of World War II and Korea have borrowed 60 million dollars to acquire homes and farms in Oregon, the State Department of Veterans Affairs announced Tuesday.

The loans have been made to 12,827 veterans. The loan program has been in effect since 1945.

A new record was set in the year ended June 30, with 2,655 veterans borrowing \$17,084,550. That is more than twice the previous high, established in the 1949-50 fiscal year.

Of the 60 millions loaned, more than 16 millions in principal and 4 millions in interest has been repaid.

The department has issued 53 millions in bonds to finance the loans. The maximum loans are \$15,000 for farms and \$9,000 for homes.

TO STRIP CITIZENSHIP

WASHINGTON (AP) — The House shouted approval Wednesday of a bill to strip citizenship from Americans convicted of advocating the overthrow of the government by force or violence.

The House action, which sends the bill to the Senate, was taken without a record vote.
