called the fire department. No men were working at the mill at the time the fire got under way.

A house and its contents were destroyed by fire Thursday evening at about 7 o'clock near Eden Lutheran Church, 10 miles from Roseburg on Melrose Road.

The house was occupied by Bill Stafford, Douglas Forest Protective Assn. crewmen were called out, but arrived too late to save anything.

Mrs. Thelma Hanson, garage correspondent for News-Review, said it was the fire was caused by faulty wiring.

The flames spread to grass and brush near the house, also burning a tree.

That was only one of a rash of blazes which called out DFPA crews Thursday. Fire fighters still were patrolling the Woodruff Mountain fire, which had swept over about 35 acres of brush Wednesday night and Thursday morning.

Another fire was controlled in logging slash south of Riddle after it had covered two acres. It started when a tractor used on the logging operation backfired.

An acre of grass and brush was burned when fire spread from a burner of a mill just west of Elkton, DEPA said.

Roseburg city firemen were called out four times during the night, but there was little damage.

A \$5 loss was noted in an automobile belonging to Hugo Fredrickson, Roseburg, when a smoldering cigarette started a blaze in a seat of the car late Thursday night. The car was parked at Oak and Main streets. Other alarms were for a smoldering pile of sawdust at Chadwick and Washington, an unattended permit fire at Washington and Kane, and a false alarm at Benson School. The latter fooled the person who phoned firemen, for the "blaze" was a window reflection from burning trash at the old Roseburg Lumber mill on Second Avenue South.

Roseburg Rural firemen were called out Thursday afternoon to put out a grass fire which started near the burner at Associated Plywood mill.
