President Eisenhower To Stay At Walla Walla

WALLA WALLA (AP) — President Eisenhower will stay overnight in Walla Walla before going to McNary Dam for dedication ceremonies Sept. 23, Rep. Holmes (R-Wash.) notified The Union-Bulletin by telephone Thursday.

Plans call for him to arrive here between 8 and 9 p.m. Sept. 22 by plane from Montana, Holmes said. The President and his party will leave by motor cavalcade about 9 a.m. the next day, drive to the dam for the dedication, and then go to Pendleton, Ore., to board his personal plane and fly either to Denver or east.

The President will be met at the airport here by Holmes and Harlan Peyton, GOP national committeeman who has worked with Holmes in arranging the visit. Gov. Langlie will be present to welcome him to the state.
