Beria's Henchman Shot By Soviets

MOSCOW — M. D. Ryumin, henchman of executed Soviet police boss L. P. Beria, has himself met death before a firing squad nearly 15 months after he was tagged with the blame for the "doctor's plot."

His execution was announced today by Pravda, the Soviet Communist party newspaper. Pravda said the Military Collegium of the Soviet Supreme Court tried Ryumin in July 27 and ordered him shot on charges of forcing the doctors to "slander themselves and other people." It also accused him of treason.

There was no explanation why the courts took so long to deal with Ryumin, who was arrested in April, 1953, as the scapegoat in the bizarre case.

The Internal Security Ministry first announced details of the doctor's plot in January, 1953. It accused nine physicians, several of them Jews, of plotting to kill Soviet leaders and charged they already had done away with Politburo member Andrei Zhdanov with reverse therapy.

Raymond P. Botch of Pendleton, Ore., association president, spoke on the theme "As Others See Us" in the highlight of the morning program. Both discussed the problems facing the council-manager government in carrying out its program.

Tacoma's City Manager, Frank H. Backstrom, gave the more than 40 delegates from the four Pacific Northwest States, Canada and Alaska a welcome as official host. Reports of leagues and associations rounded out the morning session.

Backstrom, gave the more President and general manager of the Pacific Telephone and Telegraph Co. of Portland, was scheduled to speak at the noon meeting on "Human Relations and the Job of Management."

Over 250 Unfair Labor Practices Charges Filed

SEATTLE — More than 250 unfair labor practice charges have been filed with the National Labor Relations Board against individual employers by the CIO-International Woodworkers during the lumber strike, Regional Director Thomas P. Graham said Friday.

In addition, numerous charges have been filed against employer associations with from 50 to 75 employers in their membership, he added.

All of the charges are substantially the same, that employers have illegally withheld economic data the union needs in bargaining wage increases, Graham said.

Doctor Repeats Story About Wife Being Slain

CLEVELAND — Dr. Samuel Sheppard returned to the witness stand Friday at a coroner's inquest into the killing of his wife. Outwardly calm and speaking carefully, the 39-year-old Bay Village osteopath spent an hour and 15 minutes on the stand as the inquest began Thursday.

He told a story similar to one he gave authorities after his 31-year-old wife, Marilyn, was beaten to death July 4. After dinner he fell asleep downstairs, he said, and later heard "her say my name loudly, screaming my name. It wasn't actually a scream. I really can't explain it."

He said he ran upstairs, grappled with "a white form of an individual," heard his wife moaning loudly and felt that he was struck down from behind.

BOOTLEG CHARGE

PORTLAND — A charge of possession of bootleg whiskey will be filed against Duane Ritzloff, Grants Pass, Ken Brown of the Internal Revenue Bureau Alcohol and Tax Unit said here Wednesday.

Ritzloff was convicted of drunken driving in Grants Pass municipal court, Brown said, and nearly a gallon of moonshine was found in his truck.

Texas Primary Contest Looms

DALLAS, Tex. — The Democratic campaign for governor, featuring incumbent Allen Shivers and Attorney Ralph Yarborough, today overshadowed all other contests in Saturday's Texas primaries.

Shivers and Yarborough each predicted a victory without a runoff last night. Democratic victory usually means election in Texas. This year, both Democrats and Republicans are holding the nominating primaries. The Democrats have for generations, but it is the fourth primary in Texas history for the Republicans who must hold primaries this year because they polled more than 200,000 votes for governor two years ago when Shivers ran on both tickets.

The governor, who led the drive that in 1952 saw Texas' Democratic party organization go over to Republican Dwight Eisenhower, is bidding for an unprecedented third term. Yarborough, defeated by 300,000 votes by Shivers in 1952, is making this third attempt for state office.

He ran unsuccessfully for state attorney general 15 years ago.

Chrysler's Production Now Stalled By Strike

DETROIT — All of Chrysler's Detroit automobile production was at a standstill today in the fifth day of a strike now idling 44,850 workers.

Assembly lines went down completely Thursday with the layoff of 8,850 machinists, motor builders and maintenance employees in mounting idleness from Monday's strike of 10-700 Dodge main plant employees.

Only an approximate 21,000 hourly employees, including defense workers, were still on the job.

All the affected employees are members of the CIO United Auto Workers. The Dodge main strikers walked out in protest of what they called a speed-up. Management denied there was a speed-up.

The only assembly plants left in operation were those in Evansville, Ind., and Los Angeles.

TREE KILLS FELLER

ALBANY, Ore. — A tree he was helping to fall toppled on Everett Gilmore, 44, Hillsboro, Thursday and killed him outright. Survivors include the widow and four children.

He was cutting timber for the Eliason Lumber Co. of Forest Grove at a logging site on Blowout Creek, 17 miles east of Idanha and about 60 miles east of Salem, when the accident occurred.

Oxygen-Loaded Truck Rides Wildly Into City

WESTON, Ore. — A truck loaded with oxygen and acetylene tanks rumbled through the business district of this community Thursday, demolished one automobile and damaged two others, then came to a halt on the library lawn.

Its driver, Charles R. Bunting, of Pasco, said the air brakes failed to hold on a steep approach to the town. He suffered cuts and bruises when he leaped for safety. The truck had a rated gross capacity of 14 tons.

The demolished private car was rammed 68 feet into a power pole by the careening truck. None of the damaged machines was occupied.

Cool Front Dips Southeastward

Surges of cool air from the Northwest and Northeast put a pincers squeeze Friday on remnants of the nation's July heat wave.

The main bulge of cooler air pushed rapidly southeastward over the Rockies and the Plains and into Northern Oklahoma, the Texas Panhandle and Northern New Mexico.

The second cool front dipped to the southern border of Virginia and Kentucky.

Temperatures were 10 to 29 degrees cooler than the previous day over Eastern Montana, Montana, Colorado, the Dakotas, Wyoming, Nebraska and the northern two-thirds of heat-baked Kansas.

Plus 100 degree readings were recorded again Thursday in Missouri, Kansas, Oklahoma and Arkansas, before the arrival of cooler air.

This area bore the brunt of intense heat which has caused at least 324 deaths in the nation in the last 16 days.

Temperatures of 95 to 105 also prevailed through the Gulf states. Badly needed rainfall continued throughout the night and early Friday in Western Kansas, Western Oklahoma and Southeastern Colorado.
