



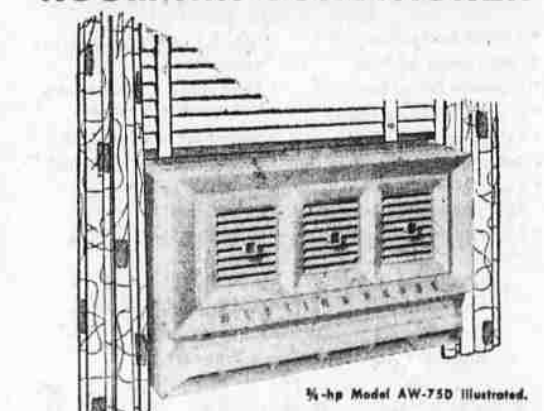

Russian Pilots Ahead Of U. S. In Privileges

WASHINGTON (AP) — Air Force Magazine said in a story Russian pilots are far ahead of U. S. Air Force fliers in pay, benefits, privileges and comparative prestige.
John F. Loosbrock, managing editor of the official publication of the Air Force Assn., said the Soviet pilot's typical monthly pay is \$765, compared with \$655.80 for an American Air Force pilot.
Both figures, he said, are based on the pay and allowances of a married captain—a jet pilot and flight leader with 10 years of service.
In addition, the magazine said, the Russian flier enjoys a standard of living vastly higher than that of the mass of the Russian people. He gets free food, cigarettes and 50 per cent discounts at civilian stores and restaurants. And he pays no income tax.
The article added:
"In contrast, the average USAF pilot is a second class citizen in our economy. He has lost most of his fringe benefits. He must buy his food from a usually inadequate subsistence allowance and is taxed to 'help foot the bill for his own services.' Many USAF pilots are discovering they can earn more money 'outside.'
"The American pilot has a great many reasons for wanting to leave the service, while the Red pilot has even more reasons for wanting to stay in."

Malay Rebels Ambush, Slay 2 British Citizens

SINGAPORE (AP) — Ambushed by Communist guerrillas as they toured a palm oil estate in Johore state, two Britons were killed and three were wounded yesterday.
The wounded included Christopher Shawcross, brother of former British Army Gen. Sir Hartley Shawcross.
These killed were W. A. Gibson, 56, manager of the estate, and P. Gregoire, 39, an official of the Colonial and Federal Building Society.
The guerrillas opened fire as the Britons drove along a road 25 miles from Singapore. Police fire finally drove off the Reds.

Congressmen Approves Postmaster Choices

WASHINGTON (AP) — Rep. Coon (R-Ore.) has recommended the appointment of postmasters at Sisters in Deschutes County, Ore., and Joseph in Wallowa County.
Both are third class offices.
Mrs. Nellie A. Bembray, who has served in an acting capacity since Jan. 15, 1952, was recommended for the Sisters postmastership, and Joseph D. Naughton, a World War II veteran, was recommended for the Joseph position. Coon has recommended the appointment of Mrs. Mary J. Rugg as regular postmaster at Pilot Rock, Ore. She has served in an acting capacity since May 31, 1953. Mrs. Rugg would succeed Fred L. Hartman, retired.

Lung Disease Placed As Thorne Death Cause

CHICAGO (AP) — Mail order heir Montgomery Ward Thorne died of a lung disease — probably pneumonia, one of the four pathologists assigned to a second post-mortem reported yesterday.
The report of the pathologists that the 2-year-old heir to a \$2,600,000 fortune died of natural causes will be given this week to Coroner Walter E. McCarron. The medical expert who told this to the newsmen is Dr. Otto Saphir of the University of Illinois.
The report probably will end the official inquiry into Thorne's death. His shorts-clad body was found on the bed of his \$75-a-month apartment June 19.

HIGHWAY DEDICATED

ARCATA, Calif. (AP) — Instead of cutting a ribbon, they sawed a big redwood log in two to open the first portion of the \$4 million dollar Burns Freeway.
The log rested on two trucks, one of which drove north and the other south to open 2.9 miles of highway here in the redwood country.

Ill-Fated Raft Crew Eyes New Hawaiian Trip

LOS ANGELES (AP) — The captain and two crewmen, who were rescued in the Pacific from a raft on which they were attempting to float from San Francisco to Hawaii, say they want to try it again.
Capt. Devere Baker, 38, of Petaluma, Calif., arrived here day and said he hopes to recover the five-sided raft in four or five days. It has been sighted adrift and said he hopes to recover San Clemente Island.
The captain wants to repair and re-outfit her and resume the attempt to drift with the currents 2,400 miles to Hawaii. The only hitch, he said, is lack of funds to tow the 32-foot craft to port.

REJECT CONSOLIDATION

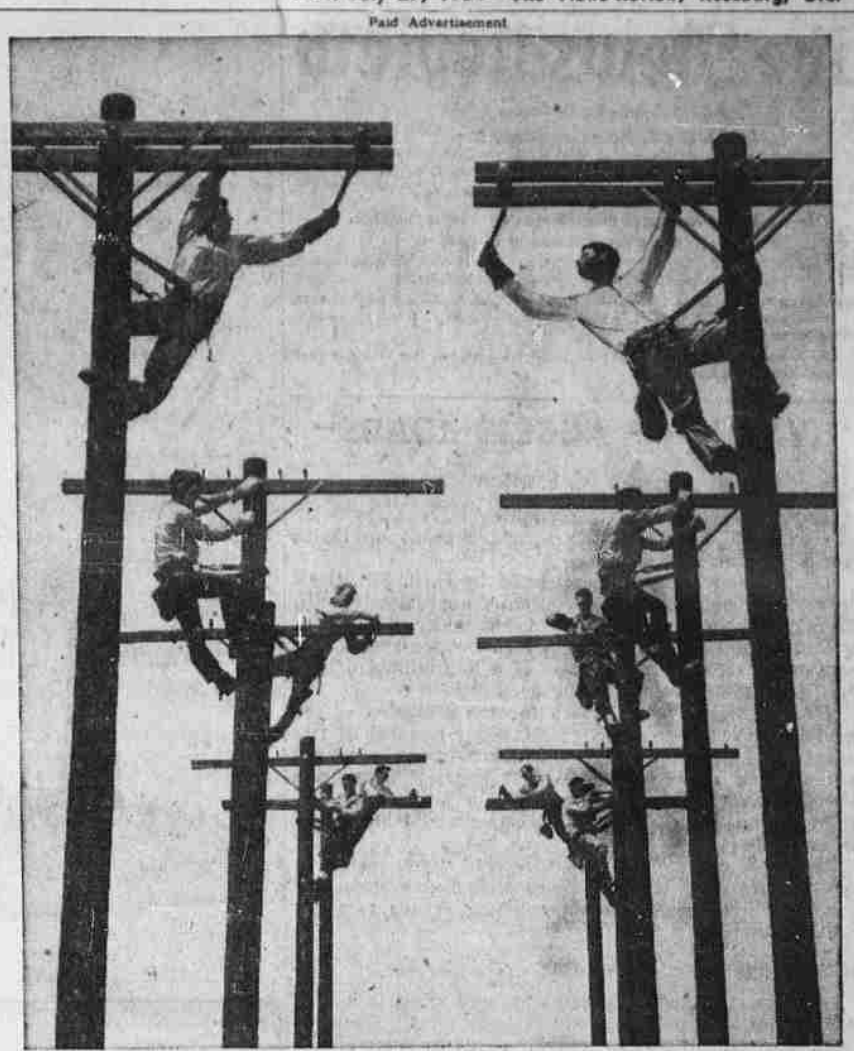

Indian School Funds Given Committee Okay

WASHINGTON (AP) — The House Interior Committee has authorized \$200,000 for school construction on the Klamath Indian Reservation at Chiloquin, Ore.
The committee also approved several Senate bills aimed at ending federal control over some 6,000 Indians in three states.
Provisions of the bills included:
Termination of supervision over property of the Klamath tribe and its individual members.
Termination of federal supervision over 2,100 Indians in several Western Oregon tribes and bands.

The circus will replace the Rodeo, and will be held in the fair stadium.
