Lost Feet Five Years Ago, Now Does Farm Work

LOUISVILLE, Ky. (AP)—G. Errett Mills is one of the happiest men in Jefferson County. Why?

It's been nearly five years since his legs were severed just above the ankles—except for heel cords and main arteries—but he's still carrying on farm work on his natural feet.

The accident occurred while he was watching the demonstration of a portable circular saw. The machine bucked and the saw blade left his feet dangling.

At the hospital where he was taken, orthopedic surgeons were divided as to the best course of treatment. Some did not think his feet could be saved. Others were convinced the effort was worthwhile.

After rapid blood transfusions and more than four hours' work by two teams of surgeons—one team for each leg—the operation appeared successful. A close check showed that blood circulation had been re-established in the feet.

Braces Discarded
After the casts were removed, a series of skin grafts completed the job. Later, Mills' legs were encased in braces to support his weight of 165 pounds.

Two years ago the braces were discarded and Mills went back to work on his 10-acre farm.

He usually walks about two miles daily, cares for three cows and cultivates his crops.

"I get farm fever," he said. "I believe I could handle a bigger farm, but my two sisters think this one is large enough. It is hard to get help I'd need on a larger farm."

His case was written up in medical journals. The half-bushel basket of letters the farmer has received came from many countries and all asked the same question:

"How are you doing?"
"You never know how many good people there are in the world, until you get in trouble," he says. "I hope the press services will tell these people how well I'm getting along. I never got around to answering all those letters."

Homebuilding Boost Indicated
WASHINGTON (AP)—The government forecast here that on the basis of a new jump in the already booming homebuilding industry, 1954 production will be the largest since the 1950 record year.

The Bureau of Labor Statistics said the number of home and partment units placed under construction in June totaled 120,000, a 12 per cent rise over May. Ordinarily there is a decline between May and June.

The new burst of homebuilding activity in June—nationwide in month this year and on a seasonally adjusted basis are running at an annual rate of 1,206,000.

The 1950 peak housing output for the country was 1,396,000. It was 1,091,000 in 1951, 1,127,000 in 1952 and 1,103,000 in 1953.

Air Force Academy Designers Are Hired

Judge Walker, who sits in both Yamhill and Polk Counties, got the case on a change of venue.

Cahill was one of the leaders of a group charging vice and enforcement laxity in Lincoln County, which brought a lengthy grand jury hearing. The only person indicted was Cahill. It was charged that he made personal use of water district money, a charge which he denies.
