New Portland TV Channel Approved

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Communications Commission Tuesday granted the application of Oregon Television Inc. for a channel 12 TV station at Portland, Ore.

The commission denied competing applications of Columbia Empire Telecasters Inc. and Northwest Television and Broadcasting Co. for the grant.

The action was in line with recommendations last November by hearing Examiner Elizabeth C. Smith.

Oregon Television is headed by Henry A. White, a retired businessman, as president, and is organized to apply for the channel.

The FCC noted that none of this company's stockholders now have any broadcasting properties or other media of mass communication.

On the other hand the order said two of the principal stockholders of Columbia Empire are the Oregon Journal Publishing Co. and its wholly-owned subsidiary, KTOJ, operating the standard and FM stations of that call in Portland.
