Rescuers Locate Missing Sailor

DARRINGTON, Wash. (AP) — A Pennsylvania sailor missing since Friday on a bear-hunting trip in the Cascade Mountains near here was rescued Tuesday after a helicopter spotted him frantically waving from a log.

The missing enlisted man, Jay Vernon, 25, Irwin, Pa., suffered a leg injury after he became lost last Friday while he and two other sailors from Whidbey Island, Wash. Naval Air Station were hiking up 5,600-foot Prairie Mountain, 12 miles east of here.

The pilot of the Coast Guard helicopter, Lt. R. E. Bracken, said Vernon was lying in a small clearing. Unable to land there, Bracken hovered over the spot and lowered aviation machinist mate R. H. Wheeler from the 'copter to the spot, then directed a ground party to the rescue.

Bracken put down nearby and later flew the injured man back to Whidbey.

Vernon had become separated from his two companions when he stopped to rest while they went ahead to look for a camp site. He was alone when they went back for him. Vernon was carrying the pack containing the party's food.

Eisenhower Approves Tariff On Watches

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Eisenhower Tuesday authorized increases up to 50 per cent in the tariff on certain imported watch movements.

In a proclamation, the President approved recommendations the Tariff Commission made last May.

The increase is effective Wednesday, but will not apply to articles which were shipped from the country of origin before that date, provided they are cleared through the United States customs on or before Aug. 26.

The increase applies to the rate of duty on imports on non-jeweled watches and those containing not more than 17 jewels.

Blind Motorcyclist Finds Ride Dangerous

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — Ronald Carlos Taylor, 25, always wanted a motorcycle.

He had an opportunity to buy one from a friend last week, one that could do 100 miles an hour. The fact he had been drawing the full state pension for the blind eight years didn't deter him. He bought it.

He rode several interesting blocks before he made a left turn and ran into Miss Barbara Murphy, 25-year-old pedestrian. Yesterday, Municipal Judge Charles Peery gave Taylor a 30-day suspended sentence for driving without a license, 30 days suspended for violating a pedestrian's right of way and six months on probation.

McKay At Home For Short Rest

PORTLAND (AP) — Interior Secretary McKay, who has just completed an official tour of Alaska, hopes to spend the next few days resting at his beach cottage at Neskeon.

The former Oregon governor, obviously tired, said on his arrival here Tuesday night that he hopes "people will let me alone."

Asked by reporters for comment on the dismissal of 600 employees from the Bonneville Power Administration, McKay said he had not heard that it had been announced. But he added, "If it's all approved it's a good deal. There's probably room over there for some more cuts, if they've been over-stuffed."

Cutback In Steel Seen By Fairless

NEW YORK (AP) — Benjamin F. Fairless, board chairman of United States Steel Corp., believes his own company and the steel industry will operate at between 70 and 75 per cent of capacity for the rest of the year.

The outlook for the nation's economy is "good, for peacetime," says Fairless.

His company, greatest steel producer in the world, reported Tuesday that its second quarter net income was more than four million dollars higher than net income for the first quarter.

The second quarter figures were \$49,020,738 or \$1.63 a share compared with the first quarter's \$44,830,376 or \$1.48 a share.

In booming 1953 the second quarter was \$55,640,806 or \$1.89 a share. The first six months of 1954 showed big steel with a net income of \$93,851,114, or \$3.11 a share compared with \$105,016,764 or \$3.54 a share for the first half of '53.

U.S. Steel declared its usual quarterly dividend of 75 cents a share on common stock payable Sept. 19 to holders of record Aug. 6. The regular quarterly dividend of \$1.75 on preferred is payable Aug. 29 to holders of record Aug. 5.

Peron Pledges News Service For People

BUENOS AIRES, Argentina (AP) — President Juan Peron says his aim is to place all newspapers enterprises exclusively in the hands of a single organization of newspapermen pledged to the service of the Argentine people.

His views were expressed at a luncheon when he spoke to newsmen who cover Government enterprises exclusively in the hands of a single organization of newspapermen pledged to the service of the Argentine people.

"It has been said we seek a monopoly over newspapers," the President said. "I would like a monopoly over newspapers in order to place it in the service of the country."
