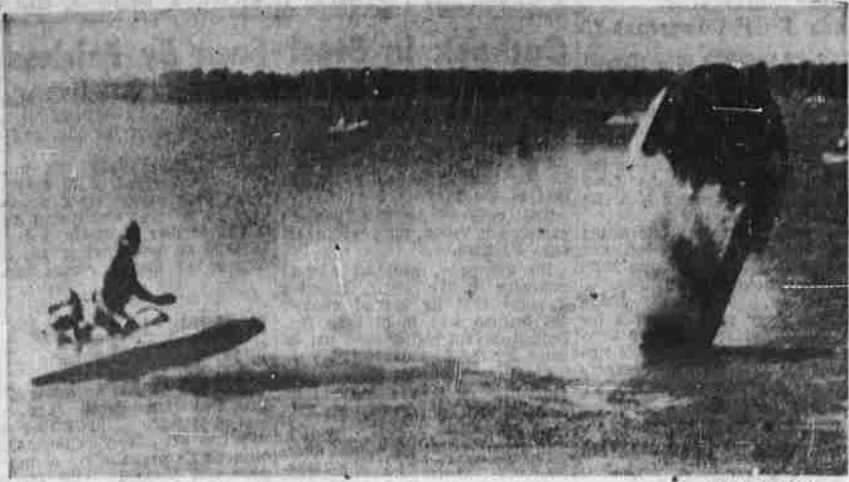

playing minor league ball has shrunk from 268 to 249. The Florida International in Class B, the Mountain States in Class C and the Tar-Heel in Class D are no more.

George Trautman, head of the minors, was in town early in the week for a series of meetings. Although he was trying to keep his chin up, he obviously was disturbed by the foldings.

"We're not going to die on the vine," he said. "The situation is not that desperate. But obviously it is a cause of concern when you drop from 59 leagues in 1949 to 34 halfway through 1954."

39-Year-Old Chick Harbert Wins First National PGA Golf Crown

ST. PAUL, Minn. (AP) — At the age of 39, with the years beginning to show in greying hair and a slight paunch, Chick Harbert yesterday won his first national golf title, beating out Walt Burkemo.

The onetime boy wonder, now a part-time tournament player and vice-president of a golf club manufacturing concern, said before the PGA tournament began that "if I reach the final I'll probably make the same danged mistakes I did when I went to the finals before."

It looked as if that prediction might come true yesterday when Chick knocked his second shot out of bounds into a cornfield.

For three holes he was the same old Chick, the fellow who could hit them a mile but often hit a half mile into the rough. He was under a tree on the second hole, but recovered. He fought the rough and buried his ball in a sandtrap for a double-bogey 7 on the third.

The PGA tournament began yesterday at 10 a.m. at the Los Angeles Country Club. Harbert, 39, of Los Angeles, was the fourth hole in the first round, and on the way to a successful defense of the title he won last year.

That's when he stopped making mistakes and started playing the kind of golf which he is capable of at his brilliant best. For the next 30 holes, he never was over par and he lost only two of them. At the finish he was on top by 4 and 3 margins.

It was the ninth time Harbert had tried for the PGA title. It was his third trip to the finals. He tried to match his booming, uncontrolled drives against Jim Ferrier's putter in 1947 and lost. Five years later he hit a wild drive under a tree at Louisville and lost to Jim Turnesa.

"It's the only national title I've ever won," he said. "Naturally I think it's the most important. Wally is a great player and a great fellow to play with."

Harbert said he thought the 10th hole was the turning point of the match. That was when he wedged a shot up for par, the second straight hole he had won. He also took the 11th to square the match, and from there on there was no stopping him.

Burkemo also played fine golf except for a flurry of wild shooting from the 10th through the 15th hole. That was when he had three bogeys and lost three holes. From here on he shot 19 holes in 3 under par and couldn't gain an inch.

Chisox Leader Confident Club To Beat Yanks
CHICAGO (AP) — The Chicago White Sox were one up and two to go Wednesday as they took on the New York Yankees in the second game of a do-or-die three-game series with the defending champs of the American League.

The Sox manager, Paul Richards, reiterated his pre-series statement that the Comiskeyes "could win 'easily' the series in Chicago against the only team that holds the upper hand against them so far in 1954.

This view was pooh-poohed by the New York manager, Casey Stengel, who said that although Richards' view is "very interesting" the White Sox have given "no indication" so far that they can do it.

Richards' optimism was based on the Sox performance Tuesday night, when Virgil Trucks shut out the Yankees with five hits for a 4-0 victory. Trucks, winning his 14th game of the season—most any American League pitcher has recorded thus far—never was in any serious trouble.

The Sox triumph was witnessed by 53,067 fans—largest crowd of the season and the third largest in Comiskey Park history.

Richards said after the shutout that it was an indication that his third place White Sox have been "outlucked" against the Yankees in 1954 and that the 11 victories in 17 games by the New Yorkers against the Sox this season are no indication of the merits of the two teams.
