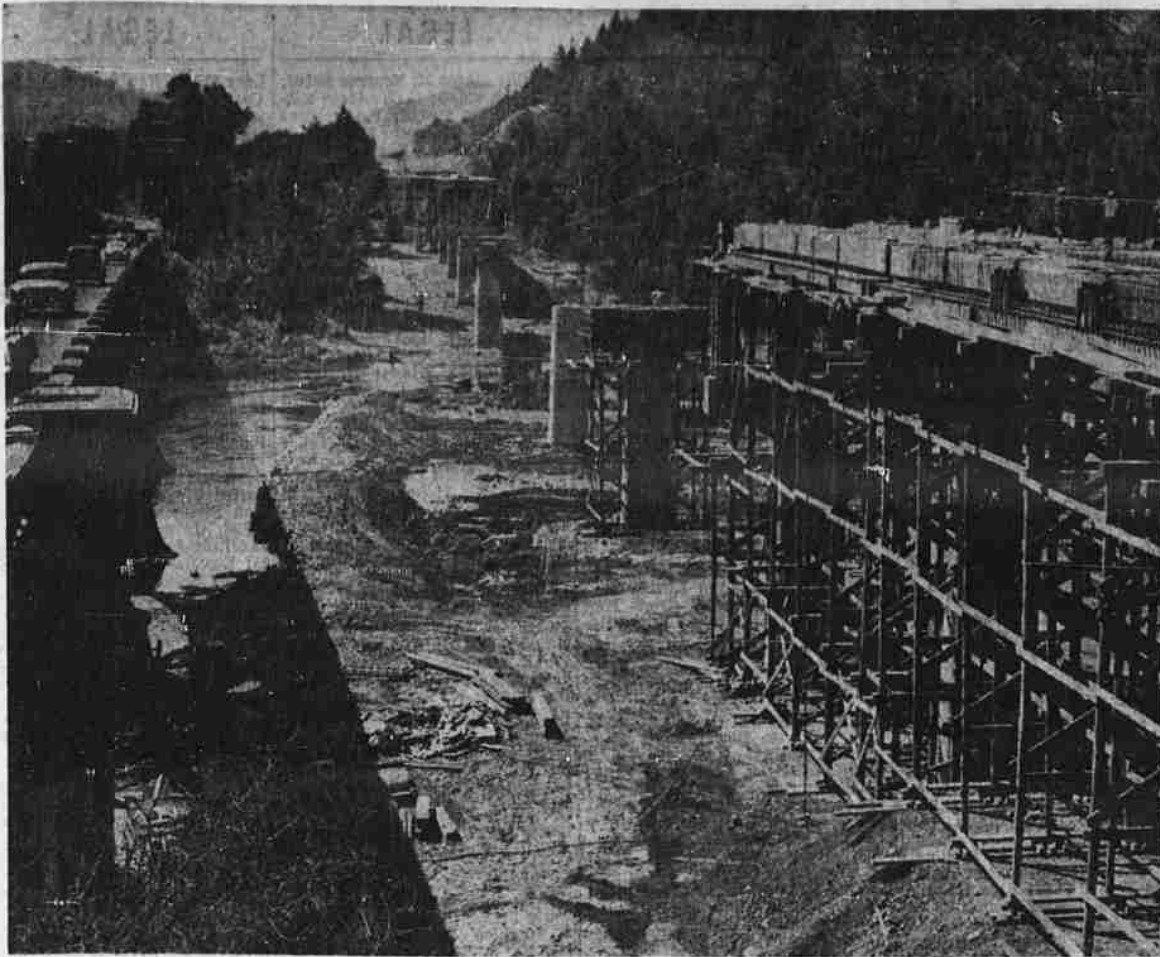

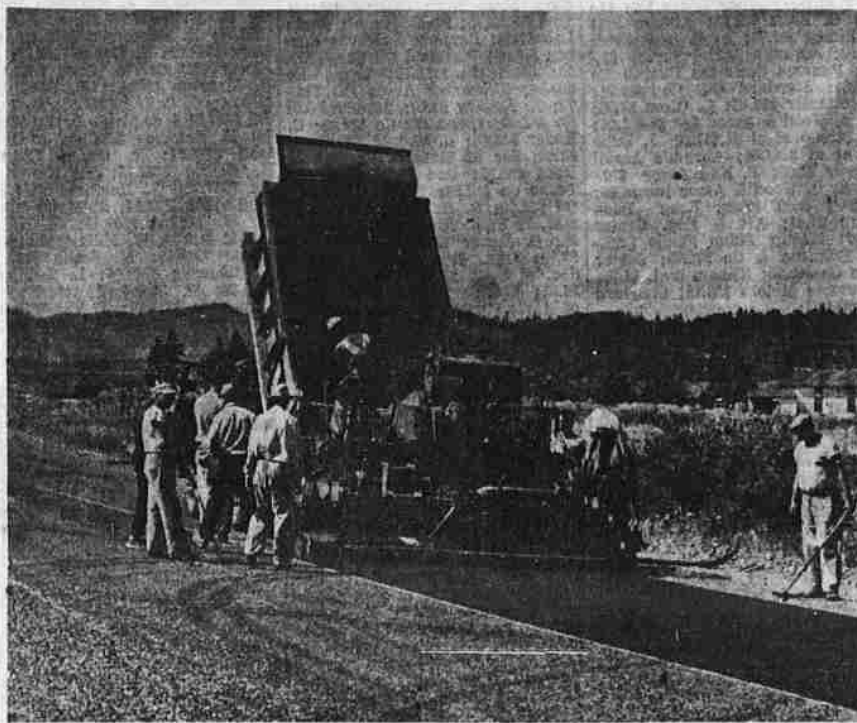
Baker Sheriff Hunts For Aged Prospector

Air Conditioners Spur Production Of Power

NEW YORK (AP)—With hot weather spurring use of air conditioners, electric power production set a new U. S. record last week of 9,103,000,000 kilowatt-hours, Edison Electric Institute said.

Output for the week ended July 24 compared with the previous high of 9,014,000,000 kilowatt-hours recorded for the week of Jan. 16, and 8,951,000,000 in the week ended July 17. It represented a gain of 7.6 per cent over the year-ago week's total of 8,460,000,000.

Most sections of the country shared in the increase over the like week of 1953. Comparisons included the Pacific Northwest up 1.6 per cent.

Mae West, Muscle Men Appear At Vegas Club

LAS VEGAS, Nev. (AP)—Mae West opened a two-week stand at the Sahara Hotel last night, selling the same kind of sexy entertainment that launched her career 30 years ago.

She appeared with half a dozen muscle men, including Dick DuBois, Mr. America of 1934, and a large crowd seemed to like what it got. This consisted of double entendre dialogue and some songs, notably "Frankie and Johnnie," which Diamond Lil sang with DuBois.

Piped Television Firm Drops Plans In Baker

BAKER (AP)—Inland Television Distributors, Inc., has given up its plans to pipe television into Baker homes.

The same decision had been reached by the firm at La Grande last week.

In both cases the firm withdrew applications that had been filed with city officials to put up a receiving antenna and lay cables to homes.

A spokesman for the firm said a strong signal was obtained at both Baker and La Grande, but other factors made it unwise to start the venture now.

Wedding Cake Suspect In Typhoid Death Of Boy

LOS ANGELES (AP)—A rice cake served at a wedding reception was under suspicion Wednesday as all city health department inspectors sought 200 guests who may have been exposed to typhoid fever.

An 11-year-old boy, Tim Nahn, died of the disease at general hospital, and seven other guests were admitted as typhoid cases.

Dr. George M. Uhl, city health officer, issued an emergency appeal Tuesday to the other guests to see their doctors or his office immediately.

Dr. Uhl said a rice cake served at the reception is suspected of having contained the organism which may have come from a typhoid carrier who handled or prepared the food.

The reception at the West Adams Presbyterian Church June 26 followed the wedding of Herbert and Diana Kang of suburban Whittier.

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
