The series starts with Hollywood holding a 2 1/2-game lead in the standings, so if the Padres are seriously thinking of dethroning the Stars, who have won two pennants in a row, it behooves them to sweep the series.

Hollywood missed several scoring opportunities Thursday night as it bowed to Oakland, 4-3. Careless base-running snuffed out two scoring chances but as late as the ninth the Stars still were threatening to win. They had the bases loaded when Lee Walls stepped up with two out and whacked Al Gettel's first pitch for a high pop fly.

Artie Schallack, who started for Oakland, and Mel Queen, Hollywood's starter, weren't around at the finish.

Bob Kerrigan of San Diego gave Portland 10 hits but beat them, 5-2, with some potent help from Padre batters. Big Luke Easter walloped a 400-foot home run, his third since donning San Diego livery recently. It was the fifth win this week for San Diego in Portland. Jeshie Heard, J. C. Flores and Lee Anthony pitched for Portland and were nipped for 11 hits.

Steve Nagy, a wily southpaw, pitched Seattle to a 4-1 decision over Sacramento. The only run off

him came in the first inning and it was unearned.

Los Angeles trampled San Francisco, 10-2. The Angels had two big innings, the fourth and the ninth. They scored five runs in each while Bubba Church was going along smoothly and pitching scoreless ball for eight innings.

Eddie Chandler, a former Angel, was batted out in the fourth and Al Lien took over, only to run into another big Angel rally. The Angels banged out 15 hits in one of their best offensive performances of the season.

Glide Peewees Shackle Riddle In Twin Shutout

The exciting two-team race which Roseburg and Glide are staging in the 12-year-old class of the Southern Division county Peewee league was thrown back into a first place tie between the two contenders when Glide shackled Riddle twice on Johnny Livingston's double-shutout performance in Thursday's round.

Livingston came up with two and three hitters in Glide's 13-0 and 2-0 triumphs that enabled Coach Jack Forsythe's team to make up a half-game difference on Roseburg's league leaders.

Roseburg, meanwhile, was also applying whitewash on Myrtle Creek as Jeremiah Haliday pitched a perfect no-hit 9-0 game. Haliday walked one man in the fourth, but he was accredited with a perfect performance when his mates produced a timely double play to wipe out the only Myrtle Creek batter to reach base.

In the 15-year-old half of the doubleheader, pitcher Dick Meredith gave up one hit in a second shutout stint which found the locals 7-0 winners at Myrtle Creek. Winston-Dillard made it a complete first division sweep over second division teams by taking 9-3 and 12-5 decisions respectively over Green in the 12 and 15 year classes. The latter win particularly had the effect of moving Coach Roy Harrington's squad into a threatening position to the league leaders. Eight errors by Green helped the Winston 12-year olds, who moved ahead of Myrtle Creek in the standings.

Yankees Push Indians With 10-0 Victory Over Chicago White Sox

Today is Casey Stengel's 64th birthday but he's going to have to wait awhile longer for a present from his athletes.

The New York Yankees didn't quite make it first place in time for the celebration. In fact, they haven't made it to first place any time this season although they've won more of their first 100 games than any Yankee club Casey had managed.

When they whipped Chicago 10-0 yesterday, they ran their record for the year to 67 won and 33 lost. None of the past five New York pennant winners has done as well.

New York trails Cleveland by a game and a half and the day-to-day question is how long can the two clubs keep up their sizzling pace.

Both Have Good Marks

During the last seven weeks the Yankees have won 37 out of 49, a .755 clip. The Indians captured 35 of 49 over the same period for a .714 mark, exactly equalling the best winning percentage ever compiled by an American League champion.

Who'll crack first? The man with the answer wins the jackpot. In 10 consecutive games with Cleveland and third place Chicago the Yankees won seven times. But two of the losses were to the Indians.

Yesterday, however, it was no contest. While the Yankees were routing the wishful White Sox, Cleveland collapsed before a Boston onslaught, bowing 10-2. The Red Sox had lost 15 out of 16 to Cleveland before turning on the league leaders.

Of the nine games played yesterday, four ended in shutouts. Whitey Ford held the White Sox to four hits in the Yankee victory. Vic Raschi, the ex-Yankee star now working for the St. Louis Cardinals, beat the New York Giants 8-0 on three hits, Corky Valentine of Cincinnati pitched a four-hitter against Philadelphia, winning 3-0 and Chuck Stobbs of Washington checked Baltimore on five hits in a 6-0 triumph.

Cubs, Braves Win

In other action Chicago defeated Brooklyn 6-5; Milwaukee won its seventh straight, 5-3 over Pittsburgh in 10 innings and Detroit took a doubleheader from Philadelphia 4-2 and 7-3.

Raschi was in complete control of the league-leading Giants. He gave up two bases on balls and struck out a pair. The only New York hits were singles by Willie Mays, Bobby Hoffman and Don Mueller. Ray Jablonski's bases-loaded double in the fifth was the big blow for St. Louis.

Pinch hitters flopped for Brooklyn as the Dodgers lost a chance to shave their two-game deficit. Manager Walt Alston used five and not one got the ball out of the infield. The final failure was George Shuba who grounded to first with the bases loaded and two out in the ninth. Hank Sauer and Ernie Banks homered for the Cubs.

The Braves had a close call in Pittsburgh. They tied the game in the ninth on three straight singles and added two more, including Hank Aaron's 12th home run, in the 10th.

Valentin not only pitched a shutout for the Redlegs, he was the batting star as well. He doubled twice, singled once and scored two of the four runs against the Phillies. The loss dumped Philadelphia into sixth place behind the Cardinals and Reds who are tied for fourth.

Feller Knocked Out

Boston wrapped it up early against Cleveland, routing Bobby Feller in the second inning after piling up a 5-0 lead. It was Feller's second loss and broke a seven-game winning streak for the veteran fireballer. Jackie Jensen

drove in six runs with two homers and a single. Ted Williams also hit a home run.

Detroit came from behind in both victories over the faltering Athletics. In the first game a two-run triple by Frank Bolling followed by a squeeze bunt by George Zuverink put the Tigers in front in the fifth inning. In the second game the A's jumped ahead 3-0 but were caught and passed in the third inning when Bob Nieman hit a grand slam home run.

A pitching experiment failed for the Baltimore Orioles. Bonus rookie Bill O'Dell was given his first starting assignment but couldn't get past the first inning. Two doubles, a single and a walk brought Lou Kretlow to the rescue but it was too late since Stobbs was in shutout form for Washington.
