

Mrs. Dexter Rice Dies In Hospital

Mrs. Dexter (Blanche) Rice, 76, widow of Roseburg's late prominent attorney, died at a local hospital early Saturday morning. Death came after a prolonged illness.

She was married in Roseburg Sept. 20, 1899, to Dexter Rice, who died almost exactly a year ago, on July 20. Mr. and Mrs. Rice celebrated their golden wedding anniversary in 1949.

Mrs. Rice was born at Yreka, Calif., July 14, 1878, the daughter of Edward and Emily Autenrieth, California pioneers. She came to Roseburg about 1890.

She was one of the founders of the Roseburg Commercial Club Auxiliary which was the forerunner of the present Chamber of Commerce. She was also active in Red Cross work in World War I and II, as well as the years in between. She was a member of St. George's Episcopal Church.

Surviving are a daughter, Mrs. Donald W. (Ira) Hellwell; a grandson, James D. Hellwell; a niece, Mrs. Robert (Phyllis) Browning, all of Roseburg.

Funeral services will be held in the chapel of the Long & Orr Mortuary Monday at 2 p.m. with the Rev. Alfred S. Tyson, rector of St. George's Episcopal Church officiating.

Concluding services and vault interment will follow in the Roseburg Memorial Gardens. Her body will lie in state at the mortuary Saturday and Sunday until 1 p.m. and Monday until 1 p.m.

Willamette River Takes Life Of Californian

Companions said Owens swam across the river without difficulty but disappeared behind an island while making the return trip.

A peptic ulcer may be either in the stomach or the duodenum. Such an ulcer seems to be produced by the gastric juice digesting away a small part of the gastric or duodenal mucous membrane which has become devitalized by impairment of the nutritional artery supplying the area. This impairment may be due to either constriction or a fold in the vessel, obstructing the flow of blood to the involved area of the stomach or duodenum.

Ulcers are most commonly found in those suffering from hypertension and extremely nervous individuals. There is also noted a hyperacidity, or over-acid secretion of the glands of the stomach with the consequent irritation and erosion of the mucous membrane of the stomach causing the ulcer in this type of individual.

With peptic ulcer there is pain and a definite point of tenderness in the upper area of the abdomen. The pain is usually characteristic—burning or boring. Eating relieves it, especially if the food is fat or oily. It is usually also relieved by taking an alkali, such as baking soda. It returns, however, when digestion is under way, or at least by the time the stomach or the duodenum is again empty.

In some cases the ulcer may erode into a blood vessel and cause a hemorrhage, which, if stomach may become so irritable that it ejects food nearly as soon as it is swallowed. Sometimes the ulcer is so close to the stomach outlet that it keeps it closed by constant spasm. In such instances, vomiting persists until treatment brings relief. Loss of weight is always a prominent symptom in ulcer cases. The individual becomes thin due to a nutritional deficiency and is often afraid to eat.

Perforation of the stomach or duodenal wall at the site of an ulcer may occur. It comes on very suddenly, with severe pain in the abdomen, shock, rising temperature and sometimes a chill. The abdomen usually becomes quite tender and very rigid and there will be vomiting of blood as a rule in severe cases.

Special diets and abstinence from smoking is important in the care of ulcer cases.

Senators Claim Danger In McCarthy Censure

WASHINGTON — Sens. Capehart (R-Ind) and Malone (R-Nev) said Saturday a resolution to condemn the conduct of Sen. McCarthy (R-Wis) involved an attack on the investigating powers of Congress.

But Sen. Lehman (D-Lib-NY), accusing McCarthy of "numberless outrages," said "History will honor us for a vote of censure and in my judgment our constituents will too."

The censure resolution was offered by Sen. Flanders (R-Vt), who accused McCarthy, chairman of the Senate investigations subcommittee, of conduct tending to bring the whole Senate into disrepute.

As the debate went into its second day before crowded galleries, Sen. H. Alexander Smith (R-NJ) declared he was convinced that President Eisenhower would "receive with enthusiasm" any offer by McCarthy to cooperate with the administration in hunting Communists.

Smith said he had urged McCarthy to write Eisenhower he would cooperate with the Department of Justice in ferreting out Reds, but the New Jersey senator clearly indicated that McCarthy had not accepted his suggestion.

Later McCarthy said that "if playing ball means quitting our investigation of communism, graft and corruption, that kind of ball I will never play."

Capehart urged, just before the Senate took an unusual luncheon recess, that the Flanders resolution be tabled and that the Senate get on with its legislative business.

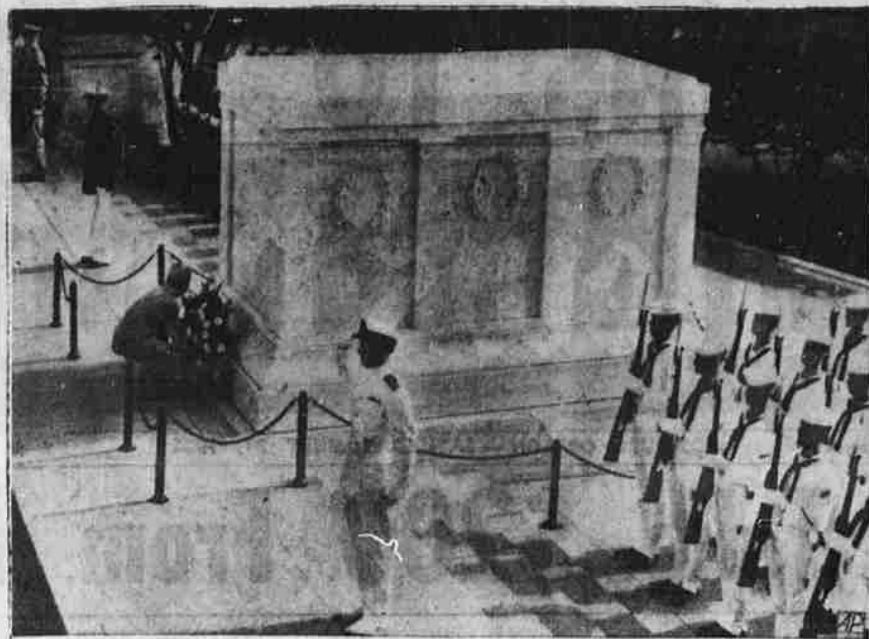

BPA-Copco Transaction Scored By Neuberger

WESTPORT — Sale of the Bonneville Power Administration's Redmond-Klamath Falls transmission line to California-Oregon Power Co. was a "bargain basement" deal, Richard L. Neuberger said here Friday night in a talk at a Democratic Party rally.

Neuberger, Democratic candidate for the Senate, said Interior Secretary McKay in a Portland interview called it a sale directed by Congress. This, Neuberger said, was not correct. Instead, he said, McKay and Sen. Gordon "put through" the sale.

Neuberger said the state of Washington had received a greater share of new industries than Oregon because of the difference in altitude toward power.

Fires Burn Uncontrolled Over California Areas

SAN FRANCISCO — Some 2,700 fire fighters battled brush and timber fires that raged over more than 18,000 acres in various parts of California Friday.

A large uncontrolled blaze burned some 3,500 acres near Ft. Ross in Sonoma County north of San Francisco. Forestry officials said it would take their 300-man crew "several more days" to get it under control.

Another Sonoma County fire, just east of Annapolis, blackened 2,000 acres of timber and was about half under control.

Manchester in adjoining Mendocino County was the scene of a 300-acre grass and timber fire.

The largest uncontrolled fire in the state burned 4,000 acres of scrub brush and grain near San Ardo in Monterey County. Strong winds hampered fire fighters in their attempt to get it under control.

Rogue Irrigation Job Gets Go-Ahead In House

WASHINGTON — Construction of the Talent Division of the Rogue River, Ore., Irrigation Project was approved by the House Friday, but only after long and rambling debates.

The bill, sponsored by Rep. Ellsworth (R-Ore), calls for a \$22,775,000 project, which would provide water for 17,800 acres, including 8,640 acres of land not now irrigated. It would include a 16,000-kilowatt capacity power plant and provide for rehabilitation work at the Medford and Rogue River Valley Irrigation districts.

Japanese Cabbie Finds Fortune, Refuses Reward

TOKYO — A Tokyo taxi driver returned about \$100,000 worth of bank checks and promissory notes—and refused a reward, police said today.

The driver found the package in the back of his taxi. He could have cashed many of the checks, police said.

He turned the bundle over to police who found the owner. Offered a reward, the driver, Hiroshi Oomika, 35, turned it down, saying "I only did the right thing," he said.

Lineman Touches Wire, Killed At Oregon City

OREGON CITY — Donald Saul, 29, of Oregon City, was killed Friday when he accidentally touched a high voltage power line.

Saul, an employe of Portland General Electric Co., was working on a pole in the Clackamas Heights housing project when the mishap occurred.

Other workmen attempted to revive Saul by artificial respiration. The widow and a two-year-old son survive.

every heard," Beecher concluded. He gave expansive credit to Executive Secretary Mrs. Mildred Herman for keeping the chapter operating through the dark days.

A report from Executive Committee Chairman Bob Dickey called the chapter's financial situation "the most discouraging outlook which Douglas County Red Cross has faced within present memory."

Future Brightened

He also saw a light in the future, however. He related that the campaign for emergency funds to tide the organization over to the next drive "appears well on its way to achievement." He said the chapter would work independently of the United Fund for at least the ensuing year.

He also reported that sub-chapters will be set up in the "several communities" of the county with all volunteer help. These sub-chapters would be responsible for routine Red Cross administration. They would also select local fund-campaign chairman and supervise drives. Mrs. Curtis Beecher is currently organizing the plan.

He recommended that reorganization be prosecuted with vigor, that chapter members be kept more informed, that the fund campaign for next year be laid well in advance, that a committee of the board of directors handle the drive instead of a single chairman.

On hand at the meeting to be informed of this chapter's troubles were the Rev. Charles Epple, Pacific Coast area advisory councilman, and Robert Jackson, manager of the Lane County chapter. Both came in conjunction with the Red Cross' policy of one chapter helping another in time of need.

Railroad Engine Hits Log Truck, Sent For Repairs

Considerable damage to the front of a Southern Pacific diesel engine and trailer at the Wilbur crossing Thursday is reported by SP Train Master Ted Bernard. The engine is in Eugene for repairs.

According to Bernard, the front end of the engine was smashed and the diesels caved in.

This is the second accident to occur at the crossing in the past week.

The train was pulling six cars and a caboose when it hit the truck and trailer that were crossing the track. Witnesses said the accident occurred about 1:30 p.m. The driver, Virgil Arnold of Yoncalla was uninjured, Bernard said.

Bernard added that the "reeb" of the truck and the "stinger" were broken. The truck and trailer are owned by Dupper & Reeves of Yoncalla.

According to a witness, Arnold was coming from Roseburg, en route to the Wilbur log pond. He apparently believed he had sufficient clearing and turned east to go to the pond. The witness said the engine struck the car at the connecting link between the truck and trailer.

Trainmaster Bernard said the engine was travelling between 25 and 30 miles per hour and came to a halt 300 feet after the collision. Most logs were thrown to the left of the track according to another witness. One was parallel in the middle of the track and another went crossways.

The train engineer was R. D. Wells, Bernard said.
