Carnival Attack Brings \$50,000 Damage Suit

Virginia Sibeck has filed a \$50,000 damage suit in Douglas County Circuit Court at Roseburg against Loren Roberts for injuries she received when allegedly attacked by a man in Roberts' employ.

The complaint names Roberts as owner of Roberts Amusement Co. The plaintiff charges she was assaulted by a man known to her only as "John Doe Whitey" on Aug. 9, 1953. The complaint states "Whitey" was operating a concession for Roberts.

The plaintiff claims she received a permanently injured right arm and asks \$50,000 general damages and \$774.25 special damages.

Army Issues Draft Call For 23,000 In October

WASHINGTON — The Army has issued a draft call for 23,000 men in October, the same number requested in the previous three months.

The October quota brought to 1,789,430 the total number of men drafted or earmarked for induction since the resumption of selective service in September 1950.

The Defense Department has said that draft calls will remain at about the 23,000 level for some months to come.

Camp Adair Buildings To Remain Until 1955

WASHINGTON — The Army has agreed not to take any action toward disposing of buildings at Camp Adair, Ore., until Congress reconvenes next year, Sen. Gordon (R-Ore.) said Thursday.

The senator said this would give Oregon and local communities time to work out agreements for transfer of title on facilities at the camp.

The Army recently had ordered quick disposal of facilities remaining at the camp site.

The 23-room home, Sagamore Hill, built by Theodore Roosevelt in 1884, has been opened to the public as a shrine for the former President.

Big Red Plant Put Under Fire

MOSCOW — One of the Soviet Union's biggest and most famous industrial plants — Moscow's Stalin Auto and Farm Machinery Works — has been severely criticized for inefficiency and for juggling production figures to give the appearance that it is fulfilling its production quotas on time.

It receives in the newspaper Moscow Pravda one of the severest dressings-down ever given to a major Soviet factory.

The criticism comes at a time when Soviet agriculture complains that the Stalin Works is not delivering adequate farm machinery and spare parts in the harvest season. The press says there is an "intolerable situation" in the ministry of machine building which must be remedied.

This year's harvest is extremely important to the Malenkov government. It is the first harvest since Malenkov promised the Soviet common man more to eat, drink and wear. It is important also for Nikita S. Khrushchev, first secretary of the Soviet Communist party who is director of the great programs to raise Soviet grain production by 40 per cent and hugely increase the nation's livestock population.

Settlement Reached In Suit Against Actor

LOS ANGELES — An out-of-court settlement has been reached in the \$20,231 battery suit brought against screen and TV actor Robert Cummings by a sheriff's deputy. The officer, William M. Conroy, alleged Cummings tried to serve him with a warrant in a civil suit and caused the deputy to be dragged and thrown to the pavement. Lawyers said the settlement was \$1,900.
