Meanwhile union and management representatives were preparing to resume negotiations Tuesday at the request of the Federal Mediation Service.

A spokesman for management said, however, that the region's fire industry did not intend to change its position—that the industry could not afford additional costs at this time.

The AFL union and the CIO woodworkers, who also are on strike, have asked a 12 1/2-cent hourly increase.

Chapman reported that the brotherhood was providing three Northern California AFL councils with \$50,000 in strike aid funds. The Central California Council received \$25,000, Northern California Council, \$15,000 and Redwood Council, \$10,000, he said.
