Fire District Inspections Set To Reduce Deaths

SALEM — A statewide home inspection program will be carried on by the state, cities and rural fire districts in an effort to reduce the heavy toll of fire deaths, State Fire Marshal Robert B. Taylor said Wednesday.

Taylor said 53 persons died in Oregon fires in 1953, 40 of them in home fires.

The total fire loss in the state was \$10,697,269, of which \$4,791,524 was damage caused by dwelling fires.

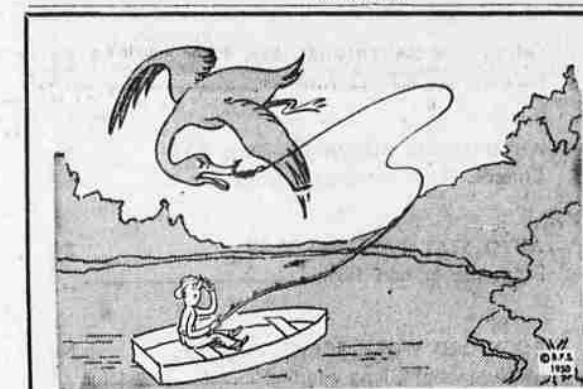
Cowboy Out Of Danger In Wyoming Hospital

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First Show Features 15 County Dogs

Douglas County Kennel Club members held their second club obedience match of the year in Roseburg recently, marking formally the beginning of their first year of operation as an organization.

Fifteen dogs of various breeds were entered in the two-division classification, novice and graduate novice classes, in the competition held at the County Fairgrounds Building.

Novice class winner was Mrs. LaWayne Handy's cocker spaniel, Jody. A Boston terrier, Nicky Lou, owned by Miss Leota Metzger of Sutherlin registered a perfect 200 score to win graduate novice class honors.

Interest in a kennel club program for the county was inspired by Tom Mason, Yoncalla dog owner, who marked the county's position as being the only political division in the state of any major size to be without such an organization.

From holding obedience training classes in his own home at Yoncalla through last Autumn, Mason and other followers of canine obedience training were able to lead the club to its formal beginnings early this year.

Meetings of the club are now held on the second and fourth Mondays of every month at the Fairgrounds beginning at 7:30 p.m. Obedience matches are scheduled every two months.

Permanent trophies are now awarded in two classes to owners of dogs winning an award three times in their classes. As the club grows from its present number of approximately 30 members, club members envision the formation of new and more developed classes of competition. More experienced members are now in the process of learning more developed training methods at club meetings to which interested persons are invited. Dog-owners are welcome to attend and join the organization.

Now known as the Douglas County Kennel Club, the local group's name must be changed before the club can secure membership in the American Kennel Club.

Rules of the AKC include certain regulations regarding the size of the area encompassed in a local organization's official title. By AKC standards, Douglas County includes too much land area to be suitable as club name.
