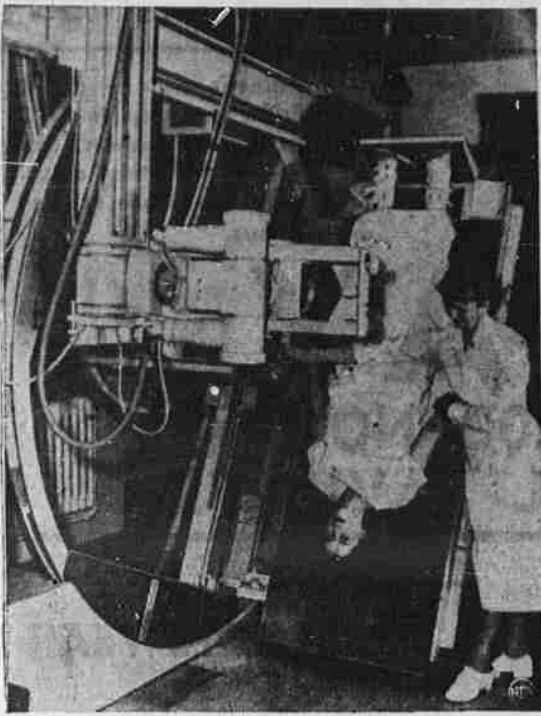

Motorcades In Pendleton, Walla Walla Set For Ike

WALLA WALLA, Wash. — The visit of President Eisenhower to dedicate McNary Dam Thursday, Sept. 23, will be the only appearance the chief executive will make in the Pacific Northwest this year. Harlan Peyton, Spokane, Republican national committeeman from Washington, said here.

Peyton made the announcement jointly with Mrs. Janet Tourtelotte, Republican national committeewoman from Seattle and Jesse Gard, Portland, Oregon National committeeman. All are in Walla Walla in company with Secret Service men to arrange for the President's visit.

Peyton said plans are being made for motorcade appearances in Walla Walla and Pendleton, in addition to the McNary dedication ceremonies, to permit people in the area to see Eisenhower.

Two opportunities to see but not hear the President will be offered in Walla Walla—when the Presidential plane arrives the evening of Sept. 22, and when the party leaves for the dam Thursday morning after an overnight stay here.

Departure is scheduled from Pendleton after dedication ceremonies Thursday and arrangements are being made for the motorcade to be in the Oregon city before going to the airport.

Portlanders To Ballot On Municipal Measures
PORTLAND — Measures providing for a 10-year municipal improvement program to be paid for with two million dollars in additional taxes annually and to broaden the city's tax base will be on the November election ballot here.

The City Council decided Wednesday to submit these proposals to the voters along with one to spend more money for street lighting.

The improvement program calls for new buildings and permanent improvements. The broadened tax base measure will include lifting of gross receipts license fees now paid by businesses.

Oregon FHA Construction Held For Study Of Law

PORTLAND — No more Oregon projects will be approved by the Federal Housing Administration until it gets legal interpretation of the new housing bill signed Monday by President Eisenhower, J. Guy Arrington, state FHA director, said Wednesday.

Action on loans also has been halted, Arrington said. No new commitments will be made and old ones will not be extended until the opinion is received. He expects that to take about three weeks. However, outstanding Oregon FHA commitments will hold.

According to Arrington the new act may have provisions that would void any commitment made before a legal interpretation.

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
