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Swim Meet Invitations Sent Cities

Invitations to participate in the Roseburg Junior Chamber of Commerce Swim Meet were sent to seven western Oregon cities Thursday according to Chairman Olaf Hansen.

Swimmers in Salem, The Dalles, Eugene, Springfield, Sweet Home, Drain and Cottage Grove are invited to enter the annual event.

Four events will comprise the evening program, Aug. 21. Water novices and champs from the competing cities will vie for honors in the breaststroke, backstroke, freestyle or "crawl" and the medley race. The latter, Hansen says, will combine the first three styles.

An age limit of 18 and under has been set by the Jaycees for girls and boys entering the meet. Entrants of 14 years and under will compete in the 60-yard races. Those 14 and over will swim a distance of 80 yards.

Hansen said that any swimmer who wishes may enter the 80-yard events.

He urged swimmers in this area to fill out entry blanks available at the Roseburg Swimming Pool if they wish to enter the contest.

The Junior Chamber meet will begin at 7:45 p.m. Aug. 21.

Newsboys Prepared For Bicycle Races

A feature of Friday night's regular hardtop auto races at the Roseburg Speedway will be the bicycle races slated between newsboys of The News-Review, Oregonian and Oregon Journal newspapers.

Three preliminary half-mile races will be run immediately following the hardtop trophy dashes. News-Review boys will compete in the first heat, Oregonian carriers in the second race and Journal carriers in the third event.

First three finishers in each of the qualifying races will ride in the final half-mile race with the top three finishers getting season passes to the hardtop programs.

Winchester Count Shows Fish Migration Favorable

Fish migration continues favorable in the North Umpqua River, according to the report from the counting station at Winchester dam.

The latest report, covering the period from July 15 through July 31, shows the migration of chinook salmon to be continuing satisfactorily. Summer steelhead movement is good, although not a record, while salmon trout are present in exceptionally large numbers for this period of the year.

The Hollywood Stars can thank their former teammate, Chuck Stevens, for being 2 1/2 games in front of San Diego in the Pacific Coast League standing Friday.

Stevens, who played first base for many years in Hollywood, was sold to the Seals early this season and has been in the pinch hitting role. Thursday night he stepped to the plate in the ninth inning with two runners on base and San Francisco trailing, 5-4. He connected for his first home run of the year to give the Seals a 7-5 victory. Ted Lyons, recently released by the Seals, relieved Bob Kerrigan in the ninth inning. Kerrigan was charged with the loss.

The Padres jumped away to a 4-0 lead in the first inning as the league's leading swatman, Harry Elliott, socked a homer with the bases loaded. Luke Easter also homered for Pads, as did Reno Cheso for the Seals.

Aging Frank Kelleher, Hollywood outfielder who is playing his last season of baseball, set the pace in Sacramento as the Stars won a slugfest from the Solons, 9-6. Kelleher hit home runs the first two times he came to bat, but Solon second sacker Hank Schenz pulled a homer with the bases loaded in the third to put his team back in the game after the Stars had taken a 6-0 lead.

George O'Donnell, who came to the Stars last week from Pittsburgh, was the winning pitcher. He took over in the fourth and kept the Seals well at bay. Hollywood accumulated 14 hits, Sacramento 10. Chet Johnson, who started for the Seals, suffered his 13th loss against six wins.

Lefty Tommy Byrne pitched Seattle to a 3-1 victory over Los Angeles. He was pretty much the whole show, hitting a home run for the first Seattle run in the seventh. He had a no hitter going until the fifth, when the Angels bunched two hits for their run.

It was Byrne's 15th win. He gave up only four hits, while his mates were combing Bobby Soier, Turk Lown and Bill Misan for 11. It was the ninth consecutive victory for the Rainiers over the Angels, who won the first four games between these teams.

Oakland whipped Portland, 6-4, as Don Ferrarese registered his 15th win. He needed help after seven innings and George Bamberger came to his aid. Jim Marshall homered for the Oaks, and Granny Gladstone and Jim Gladd for the Beavers.

Station Manager Leroy Hiatt reports KRRR is instigating a new program which will feature direct telephone reports from Gard Safley, manager of Salmon Harbor, Winchester Bay.

The reports will be recorded "almost with the hour." Hiatt said, to give listeners information on weather, bar conditions, fishing conditions and the Salmon Harbor derby.

The 15-minute program will be aired each Friday at 5:30 as long as the fishing season is on, Hiatt said.

Specific information to be broadcast will include temperatures, wind velocity, the 48-hour weather tides, catches being made, types of lures and where they are available, the number of derby entries to date, the heaviest fish recorded and the name of last week's derby winner.

Hiatt said information on the availability of charter boats and motel and hotel accommodations will also be given.

The program is sponsored by Fred Harder of Roseburg Printing Co., himself an ardent fisherman. News Editor Bob Grant will be the announcer.

American League Race Depends On Contests With 'Also-Rans'

The American League pennant chances of Cleveland, New York and Chicago now seem certain to be decided in games against the five also-rans rather than in hand-to-hand combat.

With less than a third of the season remaining, the schedule is running out of the so-called "crucial" Indians-Yankees-White Sox series. Cleveland has only five games left with the Yankees, who trail by a game and a half, and six with the White Sox who are five lengths back. The Yankees meet the White Sox just three more times.

But still to come for Cleveland are 13 meetings with Detroit. New York has 13 left with Philadelphia and Chicago faces Baltimore 11 more times.

Indians Have Luck
Cleveland leads the league today because so far it has had better luck against the also-rans than either Chicago or New York. The Indians have whipped the "lowly five" 57 times while losing only 14. Against the same outfits the White Sox have a 54-19 record and the Yankees 50-21.

None of the three title aspirants has any particular home-or-away advantage. Cleveland's remaining 50 games are cut right down the middle, 25 at home, 25 on the road. The Yankees have 24 in New York and 23 away. The White Sox have 25 in Chicago and 21 on the road.

If Cleveland continues to win at its current .692 pace the Yankees would have to win 34 of their remaining 47 games to tie. The White Sox would need 37 out of 46.

Yanks Gain Advantage
The Yankees gained a 9-8 season's advantage over Cleveland yesterday by winning the final game of a three-part series 5-2.

A double by Wayne Belardi and a single by Al Kaline ruined Bob Porterfield's shutout bid with two out in the ninth at Detroit but the Washington righthander choked off the rally in time for his 11th triumph. Mickey Vernon homered off loser Steve Gromek in the fifth.

Musial Pokes Away
Stan Musial, who always has looked upon Ebbets Field as a real home away from home, drove in seven runs in the Cardinals' one-sided victory in Brooklyn. Musial hit two home runs, his 29th and 30th, each with two aboard, and drove in another with a sacrifice fly.
