### Atomic Strike Talks To Resume

WASHINGTON (AP)—New efforts to eliminate the threat of another strike at two strategic atom and H-bomb material plants will be made at Oak Ridge, Tenn., Monday.

Another day of angling for a different approach to settle a four-month-old labor controversy brought an announcement Friday night from the Federal Mediation Service that negotiations would resume then.

E. F. Hitchcock, a federal mediator, arranged sessions between the CIO Gas, Coke and Chemical Workers Union and the Carbide & Chemicals Corp. Carbide operates the plants at Paducah, Ky., and Oak Ridge that produce the entire U. S. supply of uranium materials used in making the super bombs.

Earlier Friday the Atomic Energy Commission (AEC) turned down a union suggestion to intervene in the dispute. Chairman Lewis L. Strauss said any appeal should be taken to the President's atomic energy labor-management relations panel.

Some 4,500 union members quit both plants for four days early last month and have threatened a new strike without fixing a date. The CIO union already has rejected a 6-cent hourly raise recommended by the panel Strauss mentioned. Pay now ranges from \$1.58 to \$2.40 an hour. The union has asked at least a 14-cent hike.

An AFL union which represents 4,500 workers at two other Oak Ridge atom plants also has spurned the 6-cent offer, but has not threatened to strike.

Calcium is one of the most important minerals needed by all cells of the body. The normal concentration of blood calcium is approximately 10 to 11 milligrams per 100 cubic centimeters of blood. A particular and important effect of calcium is upon the nervous tissue. If the blood calcium falls, the nervous system becomes highly irritable and often results in muscular cramps. On the other hand, a high calcium content depresses nervous irritability. The proper balance should be maintained at all times for normal cell function.

Calcium is of course, required for bone and tooth formation. If the diet is deficient in this element, either or both may suffer. This is also true if the absorption of calcium is inefficient even in the presence of an adequate amount in the diet.

Growing children particularly require an abundance of calcium. During pregnancy and lactation there is likewise a greater demand for calcium.

There is of course much of the calcium ingested in our daily diet that is of an unusable nature, there is also the factor of need of other substances such as Vitamin D and Phosphorus to render calcium absorbable to the tissues. The acid-alkaline balance also is a factor in calcium absorption.

The excretion of calcium is partly through the kidneys but mostly excreted by the bowel. This con-

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### Montana Climber Hurt On High Peak

LIMESTONE, Mont. (AP)—A U. S. Forest Service crew rescued a Washington state mountain climber Friday who was injured climbing Montana's highest peak.

Ranger Ed Slusher identified the injured man as Jim Wasson, Seattle, one of three climbers who scaled the 12,800-foot granite peak in the rugged Tempest Mountains, 80 miles southwest of Billings.

They were the 18th, 19th and 20th to conquer the peak.

The two other climbers were identified by Slusher only as Clayton Bennett and a man named Patterson. Slusher said he did not have any other details on the three.

Wasson's shoulder was dislocated as the climbers were descending.

The trio took Slusher that shortly they left the top of the peak a thunderstorm struck the area. They said a bolt of lightning hit the peak at the spot where they had stood a few minutes before.

### Drunken Driver Fined; 2nd Case Hangs Jury

### Little Actual Change Noted As Strike Ends 7th Week

It was a week marked by renewed efforts of the Federal Mediation Service to find a pathway to agreement—an effort which failed.

There were reports of scattered settlements, some added back-to-work movements, some rejection of back-to-work proposals.

Federal Judge Claude McColloch at Portland Friday refused to interfere with the state court injunction banning AFL picketing of M and M Wood Working Co.'s four plywood plants in Oregon and California.

The Corvallis Lumber Co. Friday notified its striking employes it has a payroll of 135—that unless they returned to work they would be replaced in their jobs. The AFL union there promptly said it would resist by all peaceful means. The mill there has been trying to run behind the picket line but has been unable to get an adequate crew for more than token operation.

In Washington state, the Puget Sound AFL council reported it is prepared to spend "thousands of dollars" to relieve hardship among strikers.

In Oregon's Willamette Valley, businessmen of Sweet Home and Lebanon started circulating petitions asking Gov. Patterson to intervene in the strike in the hope of reaching a settlement.
