Funeral Set For Tuesday

Funeral services for LeRoy Cherryholmes, 24, will be held in The Chapel of the Roses, Roseburg, Tuesday, Aug. 10, at 10 a.m. Cherryholmes was accidentally killed Saturday morning when hit by an engine on the Southern Pacific Railroad track near Rowe Street. He was born Dec. 19, 1929, in Onalaska, Wash., and came to Roseburg with his parents at an early age. He was a veteran of the Korean War. Surviving are his mother, Dorothy Cherryholmes, Roseburg, and a sister, Mrs. Anthony (Laila) Anderson, of Upper Olalla. Chaplain Albert S. Peller will officiate. Interment will follow in the Roseburg Memorial Gardens. The Disabled American Veterans will hold graveside ritualistic services. The deceased will be given full military honors.

BETHLEHEM, Pa. — Four-year-old Bruce Parker was safe at home today after an accidental kidnapping experience that left him a little hungry and thirsty but otherwise unharmed. The youngster was found Saturday, still in the car which had been stolen from in front of a supermarket in Allentown, as he lay asleep in the back seat. Edward Diehl, returning from a hunting trip, discovered the abandoned car on a dirt mountain road three miles east of Lehigh, ending the 37-hour search. The child's mother, Mrs. Albert Parker, left the car keys in the ignition and police theorized the thief drove off in the car without even noticing the youngster in the back seat.

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company's action was "further proof of threats and intimidation against workers." The Corvallis Lumber Co. at Corvallis also notified its 135 AFL employees they would be replaced unless they returned to work by Tuesday.

Union officials there said they would take all possible "peaceful means" to prevent workers from crossing picket lines at the plant. Two more plywood plants went back to work in the Coos Bay area for a 5-cent hourly rise in pay.

Coquille Plywood Co. workers were the latest to vote to accept the nickel offer. The AFL workers there voted 144-20 to return to work at once. The pay increase, affecting about 300 workers, is not subject to later change.

The pay boost is subject to modification later at the other plant, the Menasha Plywood Co., which employs about 270 AFL workers. The increase will be changed if major plywood producers later settle for a different figure. The Menasha workers voted last week to be 100-0.

Florence Chadwick
Fails In Strait Swim

VICTORIA, B.C. — Florence Chadwick failed in her attempt to swim the Strait of Juan de Fuca Monday and was taken from the water, chilled and slightly ill, after approximately five hours of swimming. Battling extremely difficult rip tides and currents, Miss Chadwick had been able to swim only about seven miles toward her goal of Port Angeles on the American side. While she failed in her attempt to be the first person to swim the 13.3 miles water barrier between the United States and Canada, she still had the distinction of having gone farther and stayed in the water longer than any other person.

Shock From Bee Sting
Produces Man's Death

GREENUP, Ky. — "This sting is about to kill me," Samuel Jones of nearby Caroline told his brother when stung by a bee about 10 minutes before he died Sunday. Coroner Louis Wright ruled that death was caused by the bee sting. James Jones, the brother, said they were cutting down a tree when a bee flew up Samuel's sleeve. The two had been looking for wild bee honey. Wright said the 41-year-old farmer died from anaphylactic shock, brought about by toxin in the blood stream.

Toll Of Seeing Eye Dogs'
Poisoner May Go Higher

MINNEAPOLIS — Sheriff's officers were checking numerous tips today in their quest for the person who threw strychnine loaded wiener dogs into a kennel, killing eight dogs that were being trained to lead blind persons.

Deputy Sheriff Eric W. Stephens, in charge of the investigation, said nothing definite had been turned up.

Meanwhile, John L. Sinykin, training director for the Master Eye Foundation of America, feared about seven of 15 other dogs made ill Saturday by the poison would not survive.

Sinykin, who termed the poisoning as "the most inhuman act I've ever seen," knew of no enemies who might have poisoned the valuable animals.

Sinykin said the dogs that died had been valued at about \$30,000. Among them was Sir Lancelot, the national champion.

Offers of aid and messages of sympathy reached Sinykin from more than a dozen states.

St. Lawrence River Job
Will Commence Tuesday

MASSENA, N.Y. — The swift and powerful St. Lawrence River will be on its way to slavery Tuesday. At the touch of a button, dirt will begin to fly in a 600-million-dollar project to put the river's might at the beck and call of electric power consumers in nine states and Canada. By 1959 New York state and the province of Ontario expect to reap the first sparks from huge generating plants that eventually will turn out 12,600,000 kilowatts a year—more than Hoover Dam, the world's largest man-made waterfall.

Langlie Aid Requested
In Fir Industry Strike

KALAMA, Wash. — Twenty-two Kalama businessmen gathered here to approve and sign a petition to Governor Langlie asking him to "step into the Northwest fir industry strike situation." Their petition called upon him to appoint a fact-finding board to help bring about a settlement of the prolonged dispute. It was placed in the mails immediately, with the hope that it will reach the governor for him to consider Monday. A spokesman said the action by the group was a "spontaneous one."

North Bend Plywood
Workers Vote Return

NORTH BEND, Ore. — Menasha Plywood Corp.'s striking AFL employees voted Saturday, 160-9, to accept a 5-cent hourly pay increase and get back to work. In expectation of the result, recommended by the union negotiating committee, maintenance crews went into the plant at mid-week and the first shift of production workers will report at 7 a. m. Monday. The plant has 270 employees.

Word of the acceptance came from a union spokesman immediately after the vote. The 5 cents is subject to readjustment if major plywood producers later settled for a different figure.

At neighboring Coquille Sunday workers will vote on a 5-cent offer that is not subject to change. They earlier turned down one which could have been readjusted.

Licenses Of 19 Liquor
Taverns Suspended

PORTLAND — Nineteen establishments have lost their licenses for violations of state liquor laws, the State Liquor Commission announced Saturday.

Suspensions and reasons announced by the commission included:

Postal Pay Hike Bill
Faces Senate Dissent

WASHINGTON — The House Monday overrode its Republican leadership and the Eisenhower administration and passed a bill to give half a million post office workers a 7 per cent pay boost. The bill now goes to the Senate, where an effort is expected to cut the pay increase to 5 per cent and to apply it also to about one million other federal civil service workers.

Robert B. Bailey Goes
Into Veterinary Class

Sixty-four men, including Robert B. Bailey of Roseburg, have been selected for the freshman class in the school of veterinary medicine at Colorado A & M College at Ft. Collins, reports Dr. Floyd Crose, dean. All the successful applicants have completed at least two years of pre-veterinary medicine study in college. A number of them, including Bailey, did the work at Colorado A & M.

Reed College Accuses
Teacher; Two Absolved

PORTLAND — A disciplinary charge will be preferred against philosophy professor Stanley W. Moore, one of three teachers who refused to testify about reported Communist affiliations, the Reed College board of trustees has announced.

The other two, Lloyd J. Reynolds and Leonard Marzak, who cited the Fifth Amendment in refusing to testify at the recent House Un-American Activities Committee hearings here, were absolved.

Moore, now on a two-year leave from the college to do research, also invoked constitutional guarantees in refusing to testify at hearings of the same committee held in the East.

The trustees did not announce the nature of the charge being drawn up against Moore. However, Moore was quoted as saying in a telephone interview with a newspaper that he considered the single accusation the board made against him was non-cooperation.

The trustees accused him of refusing to give information about past or present connection with the Communist Party, he said.

Cargo Plane Crashes
In Alaska; Two Men Die

ANCHORAGE — Two men were killed when an Alaska Airlines DC3 cargo plane crashed in the wild Kuskokwim mountains, 250 miles northwest of here Sunday.

The Civil Aeronautics Administration identified the dead as Floyd Wach and George Nash, pilots of the plane. It crashed 25 miles northwest of McGrath, 14 minutes after taking off for Colorado Creek. Only the two men were aboard.

Klamath Man Fatally
Shot; Indian Accused

KLAMATH FALLS — Gene E. Erickson, 29, was fatally wounded by a gunshot Saturday and police Monday were holding a 29-year-old Indian in connection with the shooting. Dist. Atty. Frank Alderson said the Indian, Leon Pierson, had been booked on a murder charge. Pierson had been out of jail on bail awaiting trial on a federal arson charge, Alderson reported.

JEHOVAHS END MEET

PORTLAND — The four-day Northwest district assembly of Jehovah's Witnesses ended here Sunday. One of the features of the convention was a mass baptism of 300 persons in the Sandy River at nearby Viking Park Saturday. A crowd of 9,439 attended the final session. Total attendance was reported at well over 25,000.
