Kaiser To Build Two Big Plants

HUNTINGTON, W. Va. (AP)—Two Kaiser Aluminum and Chemical Co. aluminum fabricating plants, costing more than \$68,000,000, will be constructed in the Ravenswood area, Rep. Neal (R-W.Va.) said.

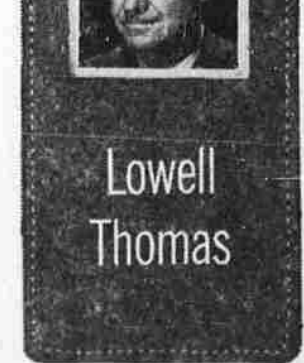
The Huntington Republican made this announcement to the Herald-Dispatch after conferring with Arthur S. Flemming, director of the Office of Defense Mobilization.

Neal said one of the plants, originally scheduled to be built in Kentucky but transferred to the Ohio Valley since it is a labor surplus area, will cost an estimated \$60,000,000.

The other plant will produce aluminum welded tubing and will cost \$1,734,000 according to Neal's statement.

At Oakland, Calif., officials of the Kaiser Company would not comment on the announcement, but said the company would have a formal statement on the new plants.

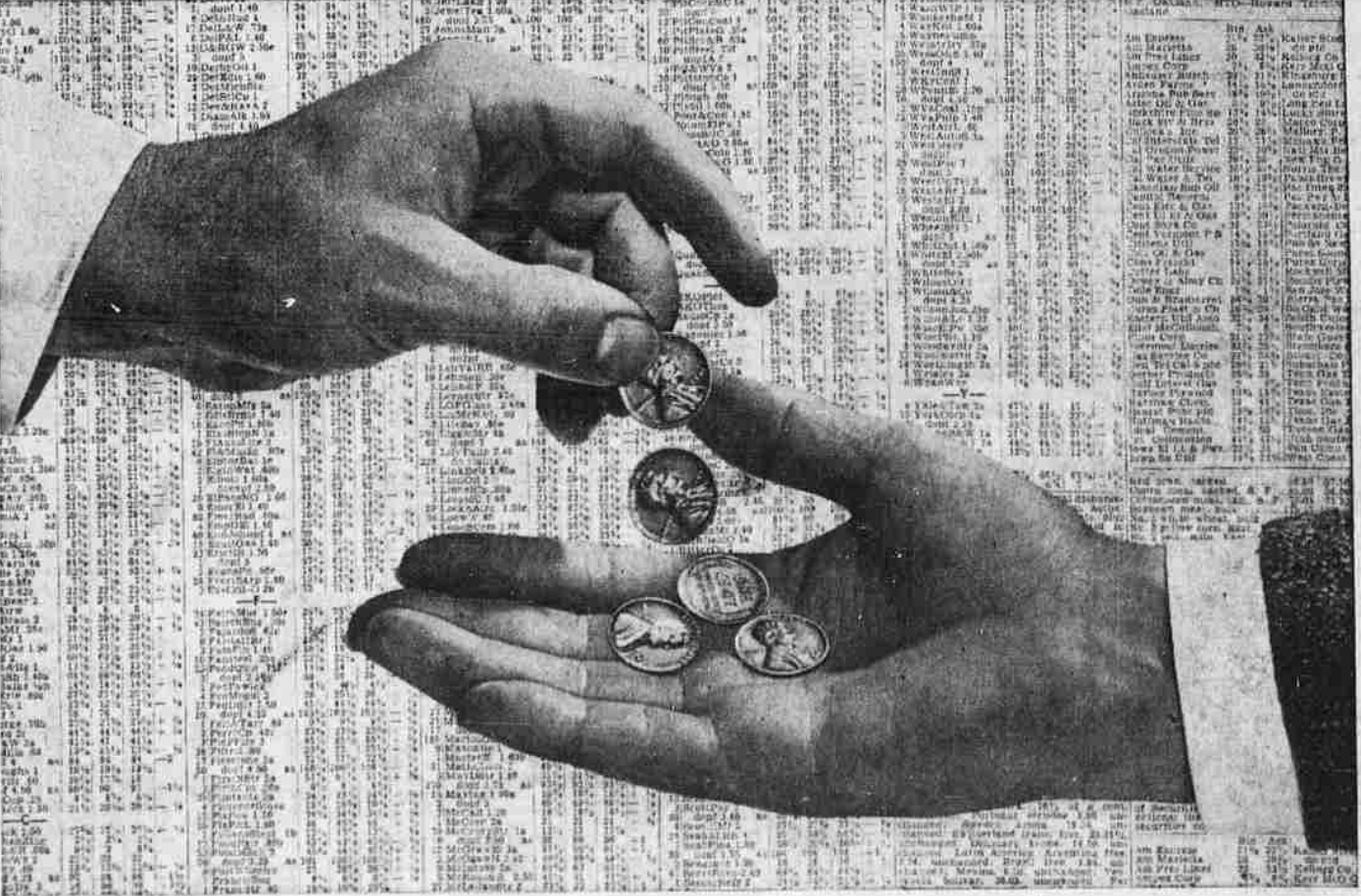
