Strikers Request Aid From County

BELLINGHAM (AP)—Feeling the pinch of seven weeks without work, striking plywood workers applied to Whatcom County commissioners for aid.

Led by Fred Cary, a group from the CIO plywood workers Local 9-330, International Woodworkers of America, said some of the men had been denied help from the veterans aid fund.

Commissioner Claude Manley said approval of at least two of the sponsoring veterans organizations—American Legion, Veterans of Foreign Wars, Disabled American Veterans and United Spanish American War Veterans—must be received before a veteran can receive help from the fund which is administered by the county.

Manley offered county road work to one striker faced with having his electricity cut off from his home and said as many road jobs as possible will be made available.

Mrs. Nora Downey, acting administrator for the local office of the State Department of Public Assistance, said many of the strikers are finding odd jobs to help piece out their incomes.

Although not eligible for unemployment compensation, the strikers may apply for state relief.

Two Loggers Killed When Guy Line Snaps
FLORENCE (AP)—Two men were killed early Monday in a logging operation near Ada, 15 miles south of here.

First reports said a guy line snapped, and either an A-frame used in logging or a heavy hook struck the two men. The victims were Chester Paul Snyder, 38, of Ada, and Virgil Saratt, 26, of North Bend.
