Arms By-Products Seen Future Of A-Materials

RICHLAND, Wash. (AP) — Amendments to the Atomic Energy Act now being worked out by Congress would permit creation of a "healthy industry that will contribute to the nation's economy while producing weapons material as a by product," a General Electric official said.

Wilfrid E. Johnson, general manager of the Hanford plutonium plant, told the Richland Kiwanis Club that the revised legislation would pave the way for a gradual change in the 12 billion dollar atom industry. The change, he said, would be from a weapons industry supported wholly by tax dollars to a privately financed industry helping to raise the standard of living.

General Electric is one of the private companies operating arsenals and laboratories for the Atomic Energy Commission. It operates the Hanford plant, the Knolls Atomic power laboratory and the aircraft nuclear propulsion project as a prime contractor.
