Plenty Of Corn Said Available For Livestock

WASHINGTON (AP) — Secretary of Agriculture Benson said Wednesday there will be plenty of corn and other feed for the nation's big livestock industry despite a 15 per cent drop, caused by drought, in the size of the prospective crop.

The indicated corn crop will not be large enough by itself to meet all livestock needs, but farmers have on hand from previous years a record supply on which they can draw, Benson said.

Some of this grain is held in the government's 6 1/4-billion dollar stockpile of farm surpluses, acquired under the price support program.

But, Benson added, the prospective small corn crop may put a brake on the current sharp up-trend in production of hogs and poultry.

In its monthly crop report Tuesday, the Agriculture Department said searing hot temperatures and dry weather during July reduced corn prospects 487 million bushels below its previous forecast of 3,111,000,000 bushels, and about 350 million below last year's harvest.

The adverse weather also hurt the prospects for some other crops, including soybeans, peanuts, sorghums, and hay. The aggregate volume of all crops declined, the department said, by about 5 per cent during the month.

Touhy's Liberty Ordered By Judge On Technicality

CHICAGO (AP) — Federal Judge John P. Barnes Monday ordered the release from custody of Roger (The Terrible) Touhy, 55, convicted kidnapper and prohibition era gangster serving 199 years in Stateville Prison.

In a 458-page decision the judge said that, for one thing, Touhy had not been afforded proper counsel. He released the prohibition era gangster, subject to the raising of a \$10,000 individual bond by members of the Touhy family, expected later in the day.

The government is seeking to appeal the ruling.

Touhy was convicted originally for the kidnapping of John "Jake the Barber" Factor July 1933. His sentence was 99 years. He was sentenced to 199 years for his part in a 1942 outbreak from the penitentiary.

Touhy and his brother Tommy headed up a gang which operated from South Carolina to California and whose exploits reputedly included murder, mail and bank robbery in addition to kidnapping.

The kidnapping sentence was imposed in 1934 and Roger has battled in the state and federal courts for his release most of the time since. He contended he was jailed on perjured testimony.

Touhy contended that Factor had wanted to appear as a victim of a kidnapping "to avoid returning to Great Britain to face charges of having swindled British investors of millions of dollars."

Sabrejet Pilot's Body Located By Fire Fighters

SHELTON (AP) — The body of an Air Force pilot, killed Monday in the crash of two F86D Sabrejets over the Olympic Peninsula, was found by forest fire fighters Tuesday morning. Wilmer Bryan, district ranger for the U.S. Forest Service reported.

Bryan said he received word that the 20-man crew found the body of 2nd Lt. Gordon S. Webber, 23, of Sandusky, Mich., approximately 17 miles west of Hoodport, a small community on Hood Canal.

The second pilot involved in the collision, 2nd Lt. Edward H. Gates, 25, of West Winfield, N.Y., parachuted safely to the ground and was picked up by a helicopter Monday afternoon and flown to a hospital.

Air Force officials said he suffered only superficial injuries.

The 20-man crew which located Webber's body was sent into the rugged Olympic Peninsula area to battle a forest fire, apparently started by one of the aircraft when it hit the ground.

The ground party had to work its way through mountainous, thickly wooded terrain to reach the scene of the tragedy. They were guided by loggers from the Simpson Logging Co.

The team from the 317th Fighter-Interceptor Squadron were on a routine training flight.

Multnomah Businesses Fail To Get Lower Tax

SALEM (AP) — Fifteen business firms in Multnomah County failed Tuesday in an attempt to get lower taxes on their inventories and merchandise.

The Oregon Supreme Court ruled that the Multnomah circuit court acted properly in dismissing their appeals from the order of the State Tax Commission.

Wadhams & Co. and 14 other firms argued it wasn't fair to assess their inventories at 60 per cent of true cash value, while assessing real estate at 25 per cent of true cash value.

The Supreme Court ruled that the court had no jurisdiction in the case.
