## 'Anything Goes' Is Entertaining Musical Feature

Hardest test facing a musical comedy is that matter of how well it wears its age.

Cole Porter's "Anything Goes" passed that test handsly Thursday night at Roseburg Senior High Gymnasium. Some minor revamping of song lyrics, coupled with dialogue changes, sprightly bridged a 30-year gap for the audience of 200.

Like all musicals written before "Oklahoma" the story pool was secondary to the songs. "Anything Goes" concerned a young socialite engaged to marry a titled Englishman, although actually in love with a broker.

Meanwhile, the broker was pursued by a night club singer who was a former evangelist. Eventually the broker won his socialite, the singer vamped the nobleman and comedy hero Public Enemy 13 charmed the audience.

But the real gems were the show tunes: "I Get A Kick Out Of You," "All Through The Night," "You're The Top," "Anything Goes" and "Blow, Gabriel, Blow." The bold, brassy and sexy singer Reno Sweeney, (Jeanette Stone) wrapped her numbers in a package. Her "Blow, Gabriel, Blow" (with an assist from the ensemble) stacked neatly alongside the first version by a singer named Ethel Merman.

Miss Stone was joined by romantic lead Billy Crocker (Paul McMillan), in a rendition of "You're The Top," which very nearly tore the roof off—the delight of the audience.

As socialite Hope Harcourt Valerie Chapman brought to Roseburg a voice with promise of future notice.

And, for a splendid comedy portrayal, the Rev. Dr. Moon, alias Public Enemy 13 (Winston Ross) must be cited.

All the way round, the Cascade Players' "Anything Goes" had its winking that more folks had been on hand to see it.

Musical was furnished by a live band. The play was directed by Frederick J. Hunter. Settings and lighting were done by Howard Ramsey.

## Increased Water Rates Are Asked For Roseburg

The growth of the area, adding to the costs of construction. An average of about \$90,000 a year in the past three years has been spent on new installations.

The company's proposal is the first request for a rate increase since the Oregon Water Corp. took over operation of the water system.

Comparatively, address showed, the new rates, if allowed, wouldn't be out of line with other Oregon cities. Base minimum rates in Bend is \$2 and in Coos Bay-North Bend is \$2.02. Both systems are municipally owned.

Private water systems ask \$1.75 in Springfield and \$1.30 in Albany.

The company, he said, also has run into difficulties in placing installations. In the Fairhaven District, new mains had to be moved last year when sidewalks were built over them. People in the district had petitioned the City Council to move sidewalks to curbside, a move not anticipated by the water company, Andrews explained.

Other recent expensive replacements have been made on Kane Street, Reservoir and Terrace avenues and Garden Valley Road, the latter in the vicinity of new highway construction.

Andrews pointed out that return on investment money has been low with the increase of operational and maintenance costs. He said that unless investors are offered a better risk, new capital will become more difficult to obtain.

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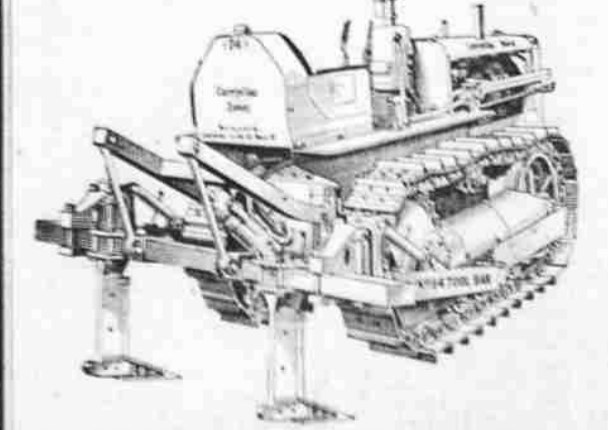
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
