The word Sciatica, as ordinarily used may be applied to a number of painful conditions along the course of the Sciatic nerve, which is the large nerve extending down the leg from the lower lumbar and sacral area to the foot. Sciatica as a rule involves only one side of the body at a time.

Sciatic symptoms occur in men, most frequently, in adult life, often during the years past middle age, but also occurs in women at times. Sciatica may occur after exposure, over exertion, or in the course of, or following infectious diseases, such as gout, rheumatism, diabetes, or diseases within the pelvis.

The pain of sciatica usually begins in the middle of the upper, fleshy part of the thigh, at the back and extends down the middle of the back of the leg, even to the foot. There are usually tender spots along this course, especially in the upper and middle area of the back of the thigh. The pain is usually intense, burning or boring in character, worse at night and upon walking. In the beginning it may be felt only after exercise or extreme exertion, or when the leg is held in certain positions. A characteristic sign of sciatica is noted when the individual attempts to rise from a chair, using the affected side and holding his back while he bends the painful leg. Walking becomes

quite difficult or impossible, even if the weight is borne on the toes with the knees flexed. The disease may last for months with occasional improvement followed by return of the distress, depending upon the cause and treatment of the involvement.

Neuritis in general is an inflamed condition of the nerves, occurring probably most frequently in the legs, arms and shoulders. When it occurs in these areas it is usually referred to as Sciatic or Brachial neuritis depending upon the nerves involved. Neuritis can, however, occur in any part of the body. When there is an inflammation of a number of nerves, the condition is called multiple neuritis or polyneuritis.

Brachial neuritis is similar in its symptoms, involving however the Brachial nerve which extends from the upper spinal area at the base of the neck, down the arm to its branches, the radial and ulnar nerves of the forearm and into the hand and fingers. Probably the most frequent distress of brachial neuritis is manifest in the shoulder and upper arm areas, usually with a tingling and numbness of one or more of the fingers.

Neuritis involvements are often the result of, or aggravated by a deficiency state, toxic condition of the body or by mechanical conditions exerting pressure upon the nerve roots. (Adv.)

Senate Votes Broader Social Security Bill

from \$85 to \$108.50. For a couple, the maximum would climb from \$127.50 to \$172.50.

The House voted to allow social security beneficiaries to make up to \$1,000 a year, compared with the present \$75 - a - month limit, without being penalized. The Senate put the top at \$1,200 a year and agreed to include in these earnings only what is received under employment covered by the social security laws. The House Bill would count earnings from any source.

The Senate also voted to lower from 75 to 72 the age at which all restrictions are lifted from outside earnings by beneficiaries.

The House bill calls for coverage of 3,000,000 farm operators, about 400,000 professionals and 150,000 federal workers — all of whom were cut out of the Senate bill by the Finance Committee. Furthermore, the House bill would blanket in some 1,300,000 farm hands — about half the number provided in the Senate bill.

The bill would cover some 3,500,000 state and local government employees and 260,000 clerks on a voluntary basis, 250,000 domestics, 100,000 industrial home workers, 50,000 in the fishing industry and — added in amendments last night — funeral directors and missionaries outside the country.

Applebox Derby Rules Announced By JC Chairman

Rules for next Saturday's Applebox Derby, sponsored by the Roseburg Chamber of Commerce, have been announced by John Guzzo, chairman of the derby.

The rules, applying to boys 13 and under eligible for the race, pertain to construction of the racers.

A weight limit is set, with combined poundage of driver and vehicle not to exceed 200. The racers must be kept under 65 inches in length, and wheel tread can't be over 32 inches.

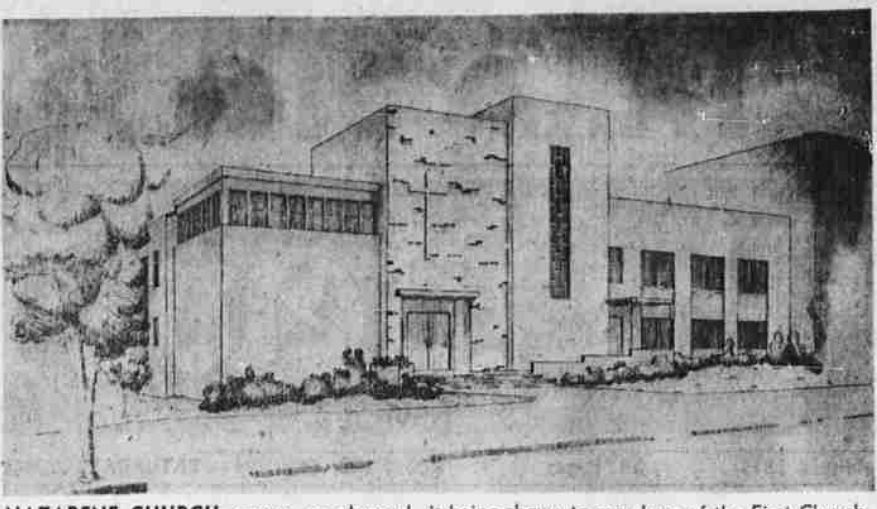
Each racer must have four wheels, none of which can exceed 12 inches in diameter. A brake is required. Rear of the racers can't extend more than 14 inches beyond the rear axle, and the car must clear pavement by at least six inches.

Each contestant must build his own racer with only advice from adults. Cost is restricted to \$15 or under.

Guzzo today asked that contestants owning official Soap Box Derby wheels from other years to trade them in for regular wheels furnished by the Junior Chamber of Commerce. This, he said, is to equalize chances of the racers. Inasmuch as the race isn't a sanctioned Soap Box Derby, the sponsors can't purchase official soap box wheels, according to Guzzo.

Wheels may be exchanged at Barker's Service Station, 603 S. Stephens St.

Rastvorov's Conference Hints At Policy Change

da fire with a splashy news conference in the Soviet zone of Berlin last Tuesday when Dr. Otto John, former West German security chief, denounced America and West Germany.

Rastvorov, as he went into action in Washington last night, was living proof that Communists shift allegiances, too — even well-trained and highly skilled ones like this lieutenant colonel in the MVD Secret Police.

Rastvorov even hinted at step number two in taking the sting out of the John defection: Possible arrests of fifth column agents planted "medium-high" in the Japanese government.

But a veritable barrage of Rastvorov-type Russians, it was understood, would be produced by the U. S. government shortly. At least four other Russian intelligence agents are reported to be in American hands — although none of them has attracted publicity.

Indeed, publicity heretofore has been the last thing either they or the U. S. government had wanted. The government has been interested in keeping the Russians guessing — did their man bolt to the West or just fall off a cliff? The Russian agents enjoyed the safety of anonymity.

Now, however, the strategy is understood to be: Bring them out in the open and let them tell their story so the world can see defection is a two-way street, with most of the traffic coming this way.

Gambler Held In Bank Robbery; 2 Others Escape

CAMP SPRINGS, Md. (AP) — A 24-year-old self-styled "gambler" from New York, was held today on a charge of robbing the Andrews Air Force Base Bank of \$126,638 as the search continued for two others.

The FBI identified the man held in lieu of \$50,000 bail as Clarence Duke McGann, Negro, New York City.

D. K. Brown, agent in charge of the Baltimore FBI office, said McGann gave his occupations as "gambler." But Brown said the suspect "just isn't answering any other questions."

McGann was arrested on a speeding charge shortly after three Negro gunmen cleaned out the vault at the air force base, just eight miles southeast of Washington, the biggest haul in Maryland history.

The arresting officer had not heard of the robbery until he took McGann into the Upper Marlboro Police Station to book him for speeding. When the officer, Sgt. Charles L. Perrygo, heard descriptions of the bank bandits he exclaimed: "I must have the other two out here."

But two companions in the car when McGann was arrested had driven off in the meantime. Brown said five of the eight persons in the bank identified McGann as one of the gunmen.
