

100 Expected On Roseburg Links Monday For Second Open Golf Tourney Rounds

High 1953 Placers Ruled Favorites In Pro Ranks

Most of Northwest goldfolds leading professionals and amateurs descend on the greens and fairways of Roseburg's Country Club beginning Monday for opening-round action of the second annual \$3,000 Roseburg Open Golf Tournament.

Tournament play for the 100-odd shotmakers expected to be on hand begins in seriousness Monday, but an eventful program is scheduled for the two days preceding the actual tourney.

Many early arrivals will be going through practice rounds both Saturday and Sunday, but Sunday's real gallery treat is a golf clinic featuring various trick shots and driving contests by many of the top Northwest pros who are on hand for the tournament.

The clubhouse green will be the site of the clinic and trick shots beginning at 5 p.m. with the driving contest off the number one tee to follow.

While the list of contestants has grown more impressive each day, Saturday's announcement gave rise to the hopes that defending Roseburg Open champion Bob Duden, just returned from the summer pro circuit, may be on hand to defend his title this week.

Duden Show Ponderous

Duden led all the way in an amazing display of golf and stamina to win last year's tourney with a 15-under-par 273 performance. His feats it will be remembered included an opening round record-breaking 10-under par 62, including a hole-in-one, and a par-breaking performance in a rain squall on the final 38 holes of play. This year's tourney will be conducted on the same basis of play with entries, both pro and amateurs, firing 18 holes on each of the final day of play Wednesday.

The play-for-pay ranks will vie for \$2,400 at stake in prize money.

Yakima Duo Triumphs In Pro-Am Tourney

EUGENE, Ore. — Veterans Joe Greer calmly holed an 18-inch putt for a birdie four Friday as he and Walter Shields, both of Yakima, won the Pacific Northwest Pro-Amateur tournament in a special four-hole playoff with Harvey Dunn and Don Krieger of Redmond, Ore.

The Greer-Shields duo had carried a 68 Friday to end in a 10-under-par 134 deadlock with Dunn and Krieger at the end of the regulation 36 holes. The Yakima men had a Thursday round of 68. Dunn and Krieger slipped from a 63 Thursday to a 71 Friday.

Bob McKendrick and Ad Huycke of Portland and Ron Caperna and Ralph Dichter of Astoria tied for third place with 135. Two other duos, Wendell Wood and Sid Milligan of the host club and Al Williams and George Harrington of Medford, Ore., were tied at 136. A Walla Walla pair, Lennie Stroup and Eddie Fiddes, was alone at 137.

Among other scores: Bob Pratt and Bunny Mason, Salem, 70-72-142; Ed Oldfield and Morris Hallmark, Roseburg, 75-73-148.

while the amateur field, led by defending champion Sid Milligan of Eugene, will be out for the \$600 in merchandise prizes. Milligan placed first among the amateurs and 11th for the whole field last year with a 72-hole total of 302 strokes.

Fine course conditions are expected to prevail this year as was the case for the tourney's baptismal year until the rains set in on the final day of play. Unless the unexpected befalls the tourney, conditions should be perfect for both players and spectators throughout this time around.

Rainfall Aids Fairways

In fact, Friday's light rainfall helped dampen any dry fairway spots which the summer sun has produced allowing every opportunity for a crisp game on the fairways.

If Duden cannot reach the scene this year, then the burden of favorite should be well dispersed among last year's high finishers, including local pro Eddie Oldfield, and several new but highly-ranked entries.

From last year's tourney, certain returnees are third-placer Oldfield, fourth place winner Eddie Hogan of Portland, Al Feldman of Tacoma, Johnny Langford, Portland and Joe Steiger, Eugene, who finished in that order for the first seven places last year.

Only Bob Harris, San Jose, Calif., pro and second-place finisher last year, is an uncertain entry. Harris was eight strokes off Duden's pace last year and of the entire field of some 75 entries, both pro and am, only the top four pros broke regulation figures for the 72 holes on the bouncy Roseburg links.

Feldman, Steiger and Oldfield are expected to lead the returning linksmen this year, but the role of favorite appears to have been cast to two newcomers from the state of Washington.

Greer Holds Attention

Joe Greer of Yakima, a veteran Northwest campaigner, two-time defending Pendleton Open champion and low finisher in the Oregon, Washington and Pacific Northwest Open tourneys, has drawn the greatest attention of observers. He along with Tom Beucher, Seattle, Wash., PGA match participant this year, are early co-favorites for top money in one of the Northwest's most lucrative and attractive tournaments.

Most distant entry received so far is that of Jim McCright, a pro from Nebraska. Other entries from closer to home wearing a dark-horse label are such well-knowns as Fred Hill, popular ex-Roseburg professional and one of the organizers in the tourney's beginnings last year; Harold West, round Oregon PGA champ and Hudson Cup player from Laurelhurst of Eugene; Al Zimmerman, high finisher on summer national pro tournament trail from Portland; Wendell Wood, Eugene, and Don Wilkie, Coos Bay.

Pros Bunny Mason of Salem, Ted Longworth of Portland, Elmer Allen, Bend, Ken Omlid, Cottage Grove, Mel Babicka, Eugene, Calif., Al Williams, Medford and Hogan of Portland are other entries who help establish this tournament as one of the year's top Northwest golfing events.

Heading the amateur list behind defending champion Milligan are Roseburg Invitational winner George Harrington, Medford; Bob Gasper, Cottage Grove; Ralph Diester, Astoria, and Roseburg low handicappers Maurice Hallmark, Joe Perrault, Ward Cummings Sr. and Ward Cummings Jr.

Play gets under way at 8 a.m. Monday. Gallery tickets may be purchased for \$1 on each of the first two days and admission of \$2 on the final day or via a \$3 season ticket.

San Francisco outslugged Sacramento for a 9-8 decision and got 16 hits to the Stars' 15, but Sacramento put off a three-run rally in the ninth that all but turned defeat into victory. Joe Brown, Sacramento outfielder, was the big noise with four hits in five tries, including a homer, and he drove in five runs. Bill Bradford, second of three pitchers, was the winner.

Caggy Steve Nagy hurled Seattle to a 4-0 victory over Oakland. The hard hitting Acorns got seven hits but Nagy spaced them. He also smacked a home run in the fifth inning over the right field fence.

Los Angeles clobbered Portland, 12-3, as Bubba Church coasted along in his eighth victory. The Angels clubbed three Beaver pitchers for 15 hits and Portland committed four errors.

PLATOONS NOT NEEDED

Pro Champ Lions Crush Collegians In Grid Test

CHICAGO — Two-platoon or one-platoon, the College All-Stars are helpless prey of the roaring Detroit Lions, two-time champions of the National Football League.

It was indeed an unlucky Friday the 13th for the collegians before 33,470 at mammoth Soldier Field last night as they took a 31-6 clanging from the ruthless Lions.

The efficient pros from the Motor City had been forced to play the limited substitution rule and junk their two-platoon system just for this nationally-televised contest.

Last year, with free substitution prevailing, the Lions whipped the All-Stars, 24-10.

With their stellar passing quarterback, Bobby Layne, riding the bench all the way, the Lions pounced on the inept collegians for 17 points in the first quarter and then won as they pleased.

Pros Used Lightly

No. 2 Lion quarterback Tom Dublinski, directing only 24 other pros used by Detroit Coach Buddy Parker, called his shots with deft skill and had the backing of a bristling defense that hamstringing the outclassed All-Stars.

When the All-Stars scored their only touchdown in the third period — on a five-yard end run by Notre Dame's Johnny Lattner — it was only because a Lion fumble on Detroit's five-yard line offered the opportunity.

Lion Margin Sliced

Lattner's touchdown shaving the Lion lead to 17-6 only prompted another slashing pro drive, covering 67 yards and ending with Carpenter's second touchdown, a one-yard blast, also in the third period.

The final Lion score in the fourth quarter brought further humiliation to All-Star Coach Jim Tatum of Maryland as end Jim Doran stole the ball from Notre Dame's Neil Worden and romped 36 yards to score.

Tatum used 48 of his All-Stars, but the theory of fresh players taking the steam out of the Lions under the one-platoon system just didn't work.

Heralded quarterback Zeke Bravowski of Georgia, property of the Chicago Bears, threw 14 passes and completed eight. The All-Star Kansas State, who carried six times for 34 yards, Switzer's 27-yard run from deep in his own territory in the second quarter provided the only collegiate offensive thrill. On defense, end Carlton Massey of Texas was the outstanding All-Star.

Stars Blame Lattner

The All-Stars in their dressing room thought the outcome might have been different if Lattner had not fumbled on the game's opening scrimmage play.

However, Leon Coach Parker probably sized up the whole game correctly with the comment: "The All-Star coaches got all they could out of those boys, but it just wasn't enough. They just weren't a good team. They were dead."

Parker also said the one-platoon system hurt the All-Stars more than it did the Lions. It certainly seemed that way, with the All-Stars outstrung, 250 yards to 62, and outpassed 111 yards to 82.

The game which marked the fourth straight pro triumph and 13th victory against six defeats and two ties brought gross receipts of \$445,650, including TV and radio fees.

The game's most serious casualty was halfback Chet Hanulak of Maryland, property of the Cleveland Browns, who suffered a fractured left arm early in the fray.

BLM Cinches Position In Twi Tourney Final

BLM eliminated the VA All-Stars from further contention in the Twilight League's double elimination playoff softball tourney and thereby established itself in the finals of the tourney against Copeco. The final score was 14-7 in the game played Friday at VA Field.

BLM's 13-run fifth inning proved to be the deciding factor as the winners opened up with seven hits including home runs by Hart and Thompson in this frame. The All-Stars made matters worse by committing all four of their game errors during this inning.

Up to the time of the BLM outburst, the VA's had held a 4-1 lead which appeared safe at the time. A second-inning home run by Don Mosher scored two of the losers' runs.

Copeco goes into the finals with an undefeated tourney record and with one win over BLM could clinch the tourney title to go with its regular season championship. BLM, one-time loser in the tourney to Copeco, must win two games to take it all. No schedule has been announced.
